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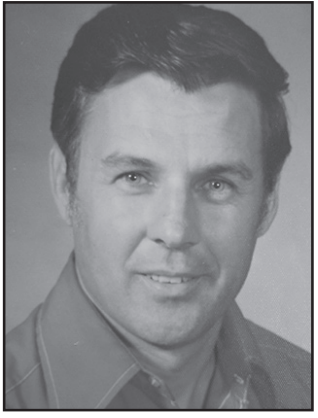
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More Precious Memories

A few Saturday's ago, I was watching former Governor Mike Huckabee

His dream came true because he made it to the biggest country music station in the nation and soon, he was on the Grand Ole' Opry, announcing.

Cookeville station (WHUB) he called me up and said, "Mr. Redmon I'm going to play the record "Watching Scotty Grow" by Bobby Goldsboro and dedicate it to you, Wanda and your son Scotty. My son Scott was one year old. Later on, Keith invited me backstage of the Grand Ole Opry where I could meet all the stars.

I wish I had saved more of the papers that the students wrote for me, but you can't keep everything. Mack Brown wrote that in the future he hoped to be the head football coach at a major university. His dream came true because he was the head coach at North Carolina, and Texas. His team won the national championship

on the News Max Station. I like Huckabee because of what he stands for and also because he always has interesting programs. As I sat there watching the program Huckabee said, "Now our announcer, Keith Bilbrey will tell us a little about our next guest." I almost fell out of my seat when Keith came on the screen. Here was another former student that I had at the senior high in Cookeville in the late sixties.

Keith's family was close friends with my wife Wanda Stringer. Keith's sister Carol was Wanda's best friend. I had Keith in my sociology class his junior and senior year and at one time he didn't like an assignment that I gave to all my students.

Historically Speaking Dortha Byrd and the Smallest Library in the U.S.

When I receive a call from John Rice Irwin I know I am in for a treat and often a potential Historically Speaking column. It is always delightful to talk with John Rice. He has more knowledge about East Tennessee than anyone I know. He can take a person's last name and tell them in which East Tennessee county their ancestors likely lived.

This time he wanted me to know about a lady who operated the "Little Library" in Back Valley, near Coalfield. What he told me was fascinating. Dot's name is Dortha Byrd. Her daughter, Barbara Cannon, worked for John Rice when he was the Superintendent of the Anderson County Board of Education.

That is how John Rice learned of Dot and the "Little Library." As he has often done, John Rice, thinking Dot should be recognized for her dedication, proceeded to help promote her story. He loves to do that to this day! He helped get the story on local media with Gene Patterson's help and the story even was published in the National Inquirer as the "Smallest Library in the U.S."

This publicity led to even more interest and eventually an appearance on the Johnny Carson show with the resultant payment used to start a fund that led to the creation of the Coalfield Public Library! Also, eventually the Little Library was moved to that location as well, where it stands proudly today!

As we talked more about Dot's story, John Rice indicated I should go meet her for myself. So, I did. What a delight!

I drove to her home and enjoyed one of the most memorable interviews. She is a delight to listen to and she obviously loves to tell the story of her life and the "Smallest Library." I think the reason the "Little Library" is now known as the "Smallest Library" may be the National Inquirer's choice to use "Smallest" in the title.

Without prompting she talked non-stop for the entire interview. Sharp as a tack, she is! Her memory is amazing! This is undoubtedly one of the most memorable interviews I have ever experienced.

She told me that her grandmother's house was a "Sears and Roebuck house" in Kansas. She has brought a handmade shingle from that house with her to Tennessee. She keeps it in plastic to show kids what a handmade shingle looks like. That is just how she is, always thinking of what benefits the children. She also told me of her parents, her Dad's black lung disease, her mother's health issues and how she and her husband took care of them. Dot shared many other interesting aspects of her life as a nurse as we sat at her kitchen table. Such as, of course, the story of how the Little Library came to be.

But the most enjoyable part of the interview was her telling about the trip to be on the Johnny Carson show. First, she was called by the David Letterman show. She thought it was a crank call and hung up on them twice. She then called

her daughter Barbara and told her about what she thought must be crank calls. At Barbara's prompting when they called again, she told them she was waiting to be called for the Johnny Carson show.

That actually happened just a few days later when NBC called. She hung up on them twice before the lady calling said, "Please don't hang up again, Mrs Dot, this is not a crank call, we want you to be on the Tonight Show with Johnny

Carson." Dot said, she replied, "Who is Johnny Carson?" The Tonight Show hostess finally convinced Dot they would pay her and also pay to fly her to Burbank, California and they needed her to come that day. Dot said she told the lady, "I can't go now, I'll have to wash my face first."

So they agreed to delay a week, so off she went!

You should have seen her delight when I asked her to tell me about the airplane ride. She explained that when she arrived at the airport there was no plane available. Her traveling companion, Louise (Walls/Scarborough) Crowe and her daughter, Barbara, who was there to see them off, told the agent they did not know how he would do it, but Dot was scheduled to be on the Tonight Show and just must get to Atlanta to catch a scheduled flight.

Dot said, she thought he found an airplane close enough to turn it around and bring it back to the airport. As they were being loaded, a team of golfers were also trying to get to Atlanta to play in a tournament and were going to miss their playing time. There were just enough seats on the airplane for Dot, Louise and all the golfers! She took considerable delight in recalling the team would not have made their tournament if not for her!

There were other stories she told me, such as the time she was asked to teach a class of third grade students at the Coalfield school. Well it did not go well as the youngsters were chewing tobacco, dipping snuff and spitting on the floor. She would not have that and things got out of hand as she attempted to keep order.

She said the students began fighting among themselves, so she went to the principal to get help. She said he just

laughed at her and that made her mad. She said, "I will have your job!" She immediately filled out a petition (she said she had learned how to do that in high school) and got all the teachers to sign it.

She said, "He got fired that night!"

Dot also told how she helped save the vocational school funding when they needed a female student in the small engine repair class to keep from losing funding. She went there after work and put on an apron and she worked in the tool room to check out tools, which to her was much like checking out books. So she did that for the entire course and funding was retained. What an amazing person and what a joy to listen to her tell about her exploits!

She thinks the world of John Rice Irwin, because of his efforts to bring attention to the Smallest Library. What started out as a way to provide books to Back Valley went from obscurity to national recognition and it all started because John Rice saw something he thought needed to be known by others. That is just like him! He would surely recognize the potential for good that could come from publicizing Dot and her Little Library.

Over the years, recognition of the Little Library has come in numerous ways. The most recent happened last May, 2019, when a special event was held to place a historical marker at the Smallest Library. Joani Trout, Annetta Watson and Cathy Bird provided the details about the latest honor provided Dortha Byrd and the Little Library.

The next Historically Speaking column will conclude the Dortha "Dot" Byrd saga with the details of the placing of that historical marker and the events of that special day for the "Smallest Library in the U. S."

Oak Ridge was created as a part of the Manhattan Project in 1942 to help stop World War II. The atomic bomb, Little Boy, fueled by uranium 235 separated at Oak Ridge helped to do just that.

Oak Ridge began in war, has continued to support our nation's efforts through the Cold War, and even now in the age of terrorism. Oak Ridge has also produced nuclear medicine, nuclear power and fuel for the US Navy nuclear submarines and ships.

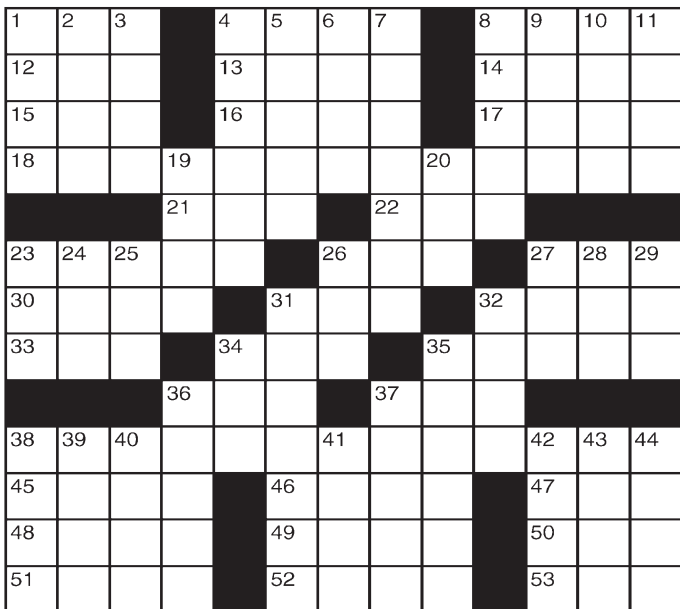

brough for sharing the following story.

On the birthday of her late father, Carlos Whaley, Vera Scarbrough received news last week from the US Army that would have been an unprecedented present for her dad. The army is in the process of trying to recover remains of Carlos's first cousin (Vera's second) Captain Milton (Doc) Whaley.

Doc, as he was called, grew up in Oakdale, on Snow Hill Rd, where his family's cemetery lies. Doc was like a brother to Carlos. When he left on a train going to serve in WWII, in the spring of 1941, Carlos, Doc's bride of six months, Polly Woodward of Petros, and also friend and neighbor, Jeanette Snow, along with many others, waved goodbye. Doc's family and friends, now all deceased, never knew that would be the last time they would see Doc.

He was sent to Bataan,, Philippines, almost immediately; he survived the infamous Bataan Death March, walking every day, back and forth on the 80 plus mile peninsula. After several months, Doc's unit became weak and emaciated causing General Edward King (under General MacArthur) to surrender his unit to the Japanese. Doc and his men were put on a ship, taken to a prison and later secretly moved to Formosa. Without sophisticated secret

intelligence at that time, US dive bombers unknowingly attacked the ship twice where Doc and his unit were held, not aware American POW's were aboard. Doc survived the first attack, swam to shore, was again captured and put on another ship that would be bombed the next morning.

The US ARMY lists Doc's death as January 9, 1945, and his remains were never recovered and reportedly lie in the Takoa Harbor. "Our aim is to return what remains we are able to trace through DNA," said the Army genealogist who contacted Ms. Vera. She went on to say, "Recovery time could take a year or maybe several, but we will bring him home." "

Even though I never knew Doc, I have heard his heroic story all my life. When he is placed in his final resting place, the family now (all immediate family is deceased) and those who follow will rejoice that their hero has come home," said Ms. Vera. Morgan County Genealogical Society member Cliff Owens recently visited the Whaley Cemetery where he mowed and is giving attention to grave markers and clearing

around them Ms. Vera went on to say.

As always, we have much to pray about. Although life is different, we are still blessed and much to be thankful for. Please pray for our nation, our leaders, our churches and pastors, our schools, teachers and students and our homes. There are many sick in our communities, some we know about and some we don't. Pray for their health. Pray for the ones who have lost loved ones. Pray for our military men and women. Pray for our missionaries, especially those on foreign fields. Most of all, pray for the lost.

Hebrews Chapter 11

(Heb. 11:1-3) the meaning and confidence of faith: this chapter constitutes the greatest discussion of biblical faith ever published. It begins with a definition of faith in the abstract. Faith is the assurance (substance, the underlying support) for things we cannot see; it also is the conviction (persuasion based on evidence) of things not seen. Faith is used in two general senses in Scripture---subjective faith (one's personal belief) and objective faith (a body of divine revelation). Both senses may here merge. The patriarchs of the past possessed confident faith, but one grounded in the solid testimony that had been conveyed to them (v. 2).

On the basis of reasonable (evidence-supported) faith, we understand that the universe came into being and was coordinated by the word of God (Gen. 1:1; Psa. 33:9). No material object can make itself; thus, it was made by something else. The cosmos exhibits design, hence was crafted by Mind, which implies constructed of pre-existing matter (v. 3); it was spoken into existence. The verb said is found ten times in Genesis 1. Modern science provides absolutely no evidence of an eternal, or spontaneously self-created, universe.

(Heb. 11:4-7) faith of the pre-flood world: the expression, by faith, found eighteen times in this chapter, is used qualitatively in verses four through thirty-eight, mostly associated with action verbs. It is conviction expressed in obedience, and not mere trust alone. By faith Abel, son of Adam, offered a sacrifice more excellent than his brother's, who was rejected. That example testifies to the nature of genuine faith---it obeys. By faith Enoch, who walked with God (Gen. 5:24), was taken into heaven apart from death (v. 5).

Without the type of faith that trusts God and submits to his will, one cannot please the Lord. Faith involves believing the Creator exists and having confidence in his promised reward for those who seek such in obedience (v. 6). By faith Noah was moved with godly reverence, and he prepared an ark according to divine directions (Gen. 6:22). He and his family were spared the universal flood. His example of faithful obedience also condemned his rebellious contemporaries who rejected his teaching (v. 7; 2 Pet. 2:5).

(Heb. 11:8-22) the faith of the patriarchs: when Abraham, founder of the Hebrew nation (Gen. 14:13), was called by God to leave his home and journey into a land of which he knew nothing, his faith prompted him to obey (v. 8). Similarly motivated, he along with Isaac and Jacob sacrificed a stable home, to live in tents---looking to a heavenly reward (v. 9-10). As a result of her faith, Sarah was able to conceive a child when she was about ninety years of age, because she trusted Jehovah to keep his promise (v. 11). The promise was fulfilled to Abraham as well, through he was almost a hundred years of age; he would be blessed with numberless offspring (v. 12).

These noble souls of faith had not seen the promise when they died, but they knew it would be realized eventually, and they had the vision of a destiny beyond the sunset's radiant glow. The promise was fulfilled through Christ in Abraham's spiritual progeny (v. 13). There is a country better than this, though millions know nothing of it and care less (v. 14). Abraham and his people had no yearning to return to Mesopotamia; they were confident of the better heavenly abode prepared by God---one beyond our present ability to contemplate. How thrilling that the Lord God was not ashamed to be called their God. May it be so with his people today (v. 15-16).

The example of Abraham's offering of Isaac is given special attention. The patriarch was tested, being commanded to offer up his only son as a sacrifice--

through whom that vast company of offspring would come. How could he compute that seeming impossible equation? It was simple; he knew that if the bloody act was consummated, God had the power to raise that son from the dead, thus keeping his promise. In a manner of speaking, that is exactly what happened, because Abraham already had determined he would obey his Lord and sacrifice his son (v. 17-19). Both Isaac and Jacob followed in their father's steps---operating by faith. Abraham's great-grandson, Joseph, did the same (v. 20-22). What grand men of faith these were, to whom we are so indebted for the faith we now share with them!

(Heb. 11:23-31) faith in relation to national Israel: now comes Moses upon the scene. By faith his parents hid the infant for three months from the wrath of Egypt's king, perhaps having been given some hint of the destiny of the child. The baby was fair unto God (Acts 7:20), and his parents were not afraid of the pagan king. In the providence of Jehovah, he was adopted by Pharaoh's daughter and educated in Egypt. When Moses was about forty (Acts 7:23), his faith prompted him to refuse his Egyptian environment of sin and cast his lot with the Lord's people. He considered his role in the messianic hope more valuable than Egypt's treasures (illustrated somewhat by the lavish King Tut discovery); his eye was upon a greater reward (v. 24-26).

Moses' faith led him to forsake Egypt, not out of fear, but on account of his trust in the real, though invisible, God (v.27). He obeyed Jehovah's laws, the Passover, which ceremony previewed the death of the Lord Jesus (v. 28; 1 Cor. 5:7). Through their collective faith, the Israelites were led across the Red Sea, as the Egyptian army was destroyed (v. 29). Though Moses died east of Jordan, the Israelites went forward with the conquest of Canaan, an example of which was the destruction of Jericho (v. 30). Even a pagan woman adopted the compelling faith of Israel. Rahab's obedient faith secured for her a place in Christ genealogy (v. 31; Mt. 1:5).

(Heb. 11:32-40) other heroes of faith: others are enshrined in the hall of faith, the champions of Israelite history were numerous, and it taxed the author's ability to deal with the ancient record. There were judges, Gideon, Barak, Samson, and Jephthah, who punctuated the dark ages of Israel's history (of more than three centuries). These were luminaries such as King David, along with other prophets (v. 32). Their acts of valor are legendary. Military leaders subdued kingdoms (David and Solomon), feats of courage and strength were evident (v. 33; Dan. 6:22), and miraculous deliverances occurred (v.34; Dan. 3:25) as a result of steadfast faith. At times the dead were raised (v. 35; 1 Kgs. 4:34), but an ultimate better resurrection was envisioned (v. 35).

But faith has its price, as well as its reward. On account of their faith, some were ridiculed and whipped (v. 36; Jer. 20:1-6). Others were stoned (v. 37). Tradition has Isaiah sawn asunder. Uriah was slain with the sword (Jer. 26:23). Some were without decent clothes, were destitute, and abused (v. 37). The word treated them as unworthy, but the assessment of the Lord was quite to the contrary, as they wondered about in desolate places (v. 38).

But all of these, because of their obedient faith, won Heaven's approval. Yet none of them received their reward in this life (v. 39). The Lord God had something better in mind for them. They must wait until the time of Christ's return, when both they and we will be made complete by our resurrection to be with the Lord forever (v. 40). This is a book of betters. Morgan County Today is honored to recognize Staff Sergeant (SSG) Christopher Fairchild as this week's veteran of the week.

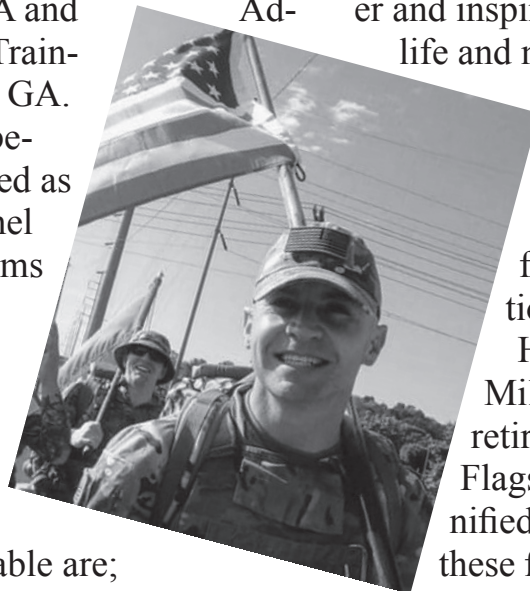

Law Enforcement Officer of the Week

This week Morgan County Today will honor those who serve our community as law enforcement rangers in the United States Forest Service. We will honor them by educating our readers on their duties and responsibilities.

Law enforcement rangers and special agents enforce federal laws and regulations governing NPS lands and resources. These personnel can also enforce some or all state laws on NPS lands. As part of that mission, LEOs carry firearms and defensive equipment, make arrests, execute search warrants, complete reports and testify in court. They establish a regular and recurring presence on a vast amount of public lands, roads, and recreation sites. The primary focus of their jobs is the protection of natural resources, protection of NPS employees and the protection of visitors. To cover the

vast and varied terrain under their jurisdiction, NPS employees use numerous types of vehicles, horses, aircraft, UTVs, ATVs, snowmobiles, dirt bikes and boats. Other Duties and Responsibilities Emergency medical services: rangers are often certified as wilderness first responders, wilderness emergency medical technicians or paramedics. Rangers operate ambulances and respond



to medical incidents ranging from bumps and bruises to heart attacks and major trauma. Firefighting: rangers are often the first to spot wildland fires and are often trained to fight wildfires; in some parks, rangers also carry out prescribed fires and fight structure fires. Search and rescue: the wilderness aspect of many areas of the National Park System offers unique natural hazards for visitors. Search and rescue trained rangers help visitors with injuries or illnesses

suffered in remote wilderness areas or who become stranded in technical environments like swift water and high angle rock. These rangers are often expert climbers, boaters, or managers of the Incident Command System. Searches can range from children who wander away from Visitor Centers to expert climbers who suffer a major accident while climbing.

Line of Duty Deaths Since 1913, 41 Law Enforcement Rangers have been documented by the United States Department of the Interior to have been killed in the line of duty. According to U.S. Department of Justice statistics, National Park Service Law Enforcement Rangers suffer the highest number of felonious assaults, and the highest number of homicides of all federal law enforcement officers.

New IRS programs to overcome stimulus delays

Millions of taxpayers have already received the full amount of their stimulus. However, a significant number of people who are eligible for stimulus are frustrated because they have seen nothing or only part of the amount they

had expected to receive.

It has been four months since the stimulus checks began and many people are wondering when they will receive their money. Some of the stimulus has been held up by glitches, programming errors and math errors on some tax returns.

Reasons for missed stimulus also include families with a spouse who owes back-due child support and victims of identity theft. Hundreds of thousands of lower income families didn't receive an extra \$500 for qualifying children ages 16 and younger due to an IRS tool's programming error in April and early May. Fortunately, some of that money finally began arriving in the mail in early August.

The Taxpayer Advocate Service is working with the IRS to help people receive pay-

ments who have had delays.

In a major reversal, the IRS now says many parents who missed a deadline to request the \$500 stimulus payments for their children can still use the non-filers tool to get their money this year.

The IRS is taking new steps to help people who didn't receive \$500 for each child. It will reopen the registration period for people with children who didn't receive money for each child under the age of 17.

The IRS is urging people to use the IRS.gov Non-Filers tool starting August 15 through September to enter information on their qualifying children if they didn't receive the \$500 per child earlier this year. Anyone who has used the Non-Filers tool after May 5 does not need to take further action. The IRS will automatically make a payment in October.

However, people who received Social Security, SSI, RRB or VA benefits and have not used the Non-Filers tool to provide information about their child, should register online by September 30 using the Non-Filers: Enter Payment Info Here tool which is available on the IRS website.

Anyone who misses the Sept. 30 deadline will need to wait until next year and claim it as a credit on their 2020 federal income

tax return.

Other Non-Filers can still get a payment, but they must act by October 15 to receive their payment this year.

Anyone who misses the October deadline will need to wait until next year and claim it as a credit on their 2020 federal income tax return.

The IRS is working to resolve cases where a portion or all of an individual's payment was taken and applied to their spouse's past-due child support. People in this situation do not need to take any action.

The IRS is also working on a systemic solution to reissue payments to surviving spouses of deceased taxpayers who were unable to deposit the initial EIPs paid to the deceased and surviving spouse.
