## Veteran, Author, County Historian







We must gain control of our borders or our children and grand-children are going to live in a 3rd world country.



## Coal Dust: Snuff Dipper

Snuff dipper, snuff dipper, it's the story of my life;
Snuff dipper, snuff dipper, bet she'd make me a wonderful wife.

These words from the song "Snuff Dipper", written by Malcom Miller in the 1950s, are indicative of the popularity of dipping snuff in the mountains of Southern Appalachia, especially

among women. At that time, there was a social stigma associated with women smoking in public, and dipping snuff was somewhat more discreet and apparently was a preferred alternative.

I was exposed to snuff dippers from birth. My dad dipped snuff and always had a small can of Bruton snuff with him. Personally, I had considered it a disgusting habit since I was very young. It

was especially embarrassing when we would be in the car and my dad would spit out the car window at every traffic light. But, my worst experiences with snuff came through two women in my life.

The first of these female snuff dippers was my maternal grandmother, Nanny Freels King. She was the only grandparent still living when I was born, but because of her frail physical condition, I was never able to have a close relationship with her. Nanny had been widowed since 1927 and came to live with us in 1953 after the death of her youngest son with whom she had lived. She was a tiny woman, capable only of minimal physical activity and could barely walk from her bed to a recliner.

I can recall only two pleasures in Nanny's life – listening to Billy Graham on the radio on Sunday nights and dipping snuff. As the time for the Billy Graham radio broadcast neared, she would always say "Find Billy for me". I would then tune her ancient radio so she could listen to her "Billy". Even though she had very little money, Nanny always managed to send her "widows mite" to support the Graham broadcast.

When it came to dipping snuff, Nanny could hang in there with the best of them. Because she was an invalid, Nanny always had a cup sitting beside her chair for spitting. As the only boy remaining in the household, distasteful chores typically were my responsibility, and I often had to empty Nanny's spit cup. Disgusting!

I recall one day coming into the room with a small rubber ball. My

I recall one day coming into the room with a small rubber ball. My mother immediately told me not to bounce that ball in the house. My disobedient response was quick – bounce, bounce – right into Nan-

ny's spit cup!

Toys and playthings were scarce at that point in my life, and it was nothing short of a catastrophe to lose even a simple rubber ball. But, who wants to play with a rubber ball that has been dunked in someone's spit cup? Sadly, I fished the ball out of the spit cup and tossed it into the coal burning stove as directed by my mother. This was a hard lesson to learn and did little to change my opinion about the disgusting nature of snuff dipping.

My second distasteful experience with female snuff dipping involved my Aunt Sadie, wife of my uncle Conrad. It was "Decoration Day" when I was about eight years old and Aunt Sadie had gone with us to visit the Ritter and Coalhill cemeteries where our Futrell ancestors were buried. Officially, it is called Memorial Day, but back in the 1950s, it was still called Decoration Day by the old folks and was taken much more seriously than today.

I recall how we would cut rose petals out of crepe paper, use a

spoon to stretch them into the proper shape, and fasten several to a piece of wire to form an artificial rose. These were then dipped into melted paraffin to make them waterproof and used to decorate the graves in the cemeteries.

On this particular Decoration Day, it was extremely hot. But, in those days, no one had air conditioning in their cars. It was necessary to drive with every car window rolled down, even if the roads were dusty, to combat the sweltering heat. My dad's car was full of adults and kids as we were returning home from our visit to the cemeteries. Aunt Sadie was sitting in the front seat next to the window. I was lucky enough to be seated by the window in the back seat, immediately behind her. Well, at least I thought I was lucky to have the window seat to get more fresh air.

Suddenly, Aunt Sadie turned towards the open window – ptui! A dark stream hurled from Aunt Sadie's mouth. Horrified, I quickly jerked back from the rear

window, hoping to avoid getting a face full of Aunt Sadie's snuff-laden spittle. This episode was repeated numerous times as we continued our trip. I was a nervous wreck by the time we dropped Aunt Sadie off at her house in Coalfield. I vowed never again to sit behind a snuff dipper in the car!

Needless to say, I have never been tempted to take up the habit of dipping snuff, nor do I have kind thoughts about those who do. These traumatic episodes from my childhood have established in me a permanent bias against snuff dippers.

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Bruton was a popular brand of snuff and was used by Terry's father.

I kept praying and begging God to let something hit me like a ton of bricks to alert me to my calling for life. Days, weeks, months, and years passed. I looked up and





Dear Readers:

Over a decade ago, I was given the wonderful opportunity to work King Features Weekly Service to create The Kitchen Diva! food and lifestyle column. Editor Jim Clarke helped me to craft 800 words, including a recipe, into a user-friendly and, hopefully, entertaining format each week, year

in and year out. This is my last column for King Features, and I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Jim for being such an extraordinary editor, the King Features Weekly Service staff and all of you for your interest and support of my work.

I've enjoyed reading your emails, searching for recipes that you loved and lost, and answering questions about your cooking dilemmas. I feel like I've made thousands of new friends over the years. I can't thank you all enough for the privilege of doing what I

When I started The Kitchen Diva column, I was transitioning into the culinary world after writing more than 100 children's books and visiting schools and presenting speeches at literacy conferences all over the U.S. and Europe. My love affair with studying culinary history, writing about food, creating recipes, publishing cookbooks and doing cooking demos as The Kitchen Diva! is an odd turn of events considering I was never a great cook.

So, dear readers, as a tribute to my mother, Angeline, who LOVES collard greens, I'm sharing one of her favorite recipes with you. Enjoy, and "see" you soon!

# ANGELINE'S EASY COLLARD GREENS

- 1 large bunch (about 10 ounces) collard greens
- 3 tablespoons olive or vegetable oil
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded, ribs removed and thinly sliced
- 1 yellow onion, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
  - 2 tablespoons balsamic or red wine vinegar
- 1. Wash the greens in cool water to remove any dirt. Cut the thick central ribs out of the collard greens. Stack the leaves on top of one another. Starting at one end, roll them up into a cigar-liked shape, then slice across the roll to make the greens into thin strips about 1/8-inch wide, and cut again lengthwise.
- 2. Place a large, heavy bottomed skillet over medium-high heat. Add the olive oil and heat for a minute. Then add the greens and all of the rest of the ingredients except for the vinegar. Cook the greens, stirring every 30-seconds to combine the ingredients and cook them through, about 8 to 10 minutes.
- 3. Transfer the collards to a serving bowl, sprinkle them with the vinegar, stir and serve immediately. Serves 4.

### Joe Biden's Afghan Withdrawal Folly

Barely a day passes without additional news of Taliban gains in Afghanistan.

Perhaps the Afghan government and its forces will prove more resilient than many expect, but if the country continues its slide toward chaos or, worse, the Taliban rapidly take Kabul, President Joe Biden's decision to withdraw a residual U.S. force will look like an amateurish, unforced error by a man who prides himself on his foreign policy experience and acumen. With his top military leadership opposed and credible warnings that Kabul could fall within months after a withdrawal, Biden went ahead with it anyway on the basis of what an aide has called "his gut."

So far, indications are that the president would have been better off heeding his military advisers than his viscera. The Afghan war has, of course, stretched on for two decades and become a holding action satisfying to no one. But the cost to the U.S. of sustaining 3,500 troops in the country without losing anyone in combat for more than a year hasn't been high compared with the entirely plausible downside of Islamist extremists allied with al-Qaeda sweeping to power again in Afghanistan. The desire to pull out of Afghanistan has been an area of rare Biden-Trump agreement. Then-President Donald Trump's foolhardy ceasefire deal with the Taliban in February 2020 set the predicate for Biden's withdrawal. It would have taken some determination for Biden to reverse the U.S. promise in that deal to withdraw its forces by May 2021, although the Taliban's transparent bad faith provided plenty of occasion for it.

Biden says not to worry. The U.S. will continue to provide "over the horizon" support, i.e., from a distance, for the Afghan government.

This is likely a pipe dream, and nothing about Biden's poorly thought-out drawdown lends any more credibility to it. The CIA has been struggling to figure out how to maintain intelligence-gathering capabilities in Afghanistan. There will be no targets to strike from "over the horizon" if we don't have the assets on the ground to find them.

Ideally, the U.S. would locate some other base next door to Afghanistan, but there are no good options in the neighborhood. Conducting operations from the Persian Gulf eight hours away isn't much of a substitute. In congressional testimony, Gen. Kenneth McKenzie, the head of Central Command, said the long-distance missions would be "extremely difficult to do," but "not impossible."

The U.S. withdrawal has had other troubling loose ends. The contractors who have worked with the Afghan Air Force to maintain its planes are leaving, too, potentially stripping Afghan forces of air support.

The fate of the Afghans who have assisted U.S. forces is uncertain, although under political pressure here at home, Biden has committed to getting them out.

Biden wants to provide \$3 billion in security assistance to the Afghans, but who will do the training with that money? The allies are leaving, with the administration anxious to get the Turks to stay to secure Kabul International Airport, without which we won't be able to maintain our embassy.

As the bad news has piled up, the Biden administration has tried to provide reassuring signals. But are the Afghans, and the Taliban, not supposed to notice that nearly all of his forces have already withdrawn?

One justification for leaving is that it will free up resources for us to concentrate on the growing threat from China. It's not as though the 3,000 ground troops are going to relocate to East Asia, though, and make a difference in the balance of power there. On top of this, if there is an unraveling in Afghanistan, controlling the fallout will become a consuming issue for the U.S. military. Biden has gotten his drawdown. Now, he may reap the whirlwind.

# Make Summer Sand Candles

Like most people, I enjoy taking long walks on the beach. I love the feel of sand under my feet and the way it stretches for miles before me. And then I suddenly feel inspired, thinking of the ways sand can be used in decor and crafts. That's when I know it's time to go home and have some more fun.

Here's a popular sand craft kids enjoy at day camp year after year. The adults melt the wax and the kids create the molds and add decorations for state-of-the-art sand candles. With a child's touch, they're whimsical, spontaneous and useful.

### To make candles at home, you'll need:

- Clean, damp sand in a bucket or sandbox
- 1 pound box of paraffin wax (available in canning section at many markets)
- 1 saucepan
- 1 tin can, such as a large soup can with lid removed. (Pinch rim of the can with pliers to form a spout for easy pouring)
- Candle coloring or stubs from colored candles (optional)
- Candle wicking (available at craft stores)
- Pencil or sticks
- Tiny trinkets, stones or shells (optional)

Here are a few examples of what the VA's Fourth Mission has accomplished in all 50 states plus territories:

- -- Provided 935,000 pieces of Personal Protective Equipment.
- -- Admitted 488 non-veteran cit-

the damp sand, about 3-4 inches wide. Pat the sides and base of the depression to make a very firm mold for your candle. Press several trinkets into the mold, if you wish.

2. Meanwhile, an adult should fill a saucepan with a few inches of water and set the tin can in the center. Put a chunk of paraffin in the can, and add candle stubs or coloring, if you wish. As the water gets hot, the wax will melt. Stir occasionally, keeping a constant eye on it, since it is flammable.



3. An adult should carefully pour the melted wax into the sand mold. While the wax is still liquid, place a length of wicking down the center of the mold with at least one inch of wicking exposed at the top. Hold the wick in place until the wax begins to harden. Then, prop the wick with a stick until the wax is completely hard. Or, tie the wick around the middle of a pencil and let it rest across the top of the mold with the wick in the wax.

4. When hard, gently lift the candle out of the sand mold. Brush off excess sand from the candle and embedded trinkets with an old toothbrush, leaving some sand on the surface for a natural look.

Note: An adult should always be present when burning candles.

izens to VA medical centers for treatment.

## **Historically Speaking**

### A brief history of the Oak Ridge Health Department

Jim Harless contacted me regarding yet another unique story about Oak Ridge. He personally was involved in the Oak Ridge Health Department as it evolved and wondered if I would like to document that history in Historical Speaking. Of course, that interested me. Jim has been most helpful by sending me a lot of details of this unusual organization's history. He also introduced me to "Dog Tag" art, which he invented.

What makes our Health Department unusual? Like many other aspects of our city, the Health Department first began during the 1940's as a part of the unique Oak Ridge experience. Each Manhattan Project site created a new city of workers and their families. Part of what the Army faced was how to provide for the health of these quickly forming cities.

Oak Ridge led the way as it was the first site selected by the Manhattan Project's General Groves on September 19, 1942. Right away this once peaceful valley and ridge river bottom land and its group of communities changed drastically. People who were accustomed to city living and had never considered living in East Tennessee moved into what some called "Dog Patch!" Yet, they expected health services just as any other community would.

By November 1942 construction was underway in Oak Ridge (Site X) and throughout the first months of 1943, the city, soon to be known as Oak Ridge, was being built right along with three government facilities. The Y-12 electromagnetic separation plant and X-10 graphite reactor both of which started construction in February 1943 and

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new city rose from an original planned number of 13,000 to 50,000 by the summer of 1944 and to an eventual swell of 75,000 by August 1945. Also expanding were the Army's efforts to provide the whole range of health services as they strived to meet the growing health related needs of the city and the workers. At the three facilities and in the city, all looked to the Army for necessary health related care and services.

A 50-bed Army hospital was built and staffed in 1943 as one of the first major community healthcare service efforts. The first baby was born on November 8, 1943. Red Cross "Gray" Ladies served as the pioneering secret city's first volunteers at the new hospital. The hospital served the community and the federal facilities.

During the Manhattan Project, like everything else, healthcare and other health related services were provided by the Army. Although some civilian jobs were created as needed, the Army took care of the population in every way possible.

The comfort and care of the population was a key strategy for attracting scientists to work on the critically important work of creating an atomic bomb. No expense was spared and nothing needed to assure the success of the project was withheld. General Groves literally had a "blank check" and he used that authority to assure the workers and their families were well taken care of...health care and other health related services being no exception.

After the war ended in 1945 and the Atomic Energy Commission was formed to take control of the nation's atomic energy program from the Army, several changes occurred as a part of the transition from Army to civilian control. However, health care and health related services continued to be provided by the federal government until the city was incorporated in 1959.

The transition from a secret city in 1949 brought many changes and would lead to radical changes in the Oak Ridge Health Department, especially related to how it was funded. The first phase of the three-phase history of public health services in Oak Ridge funded by the federal government ended with incorporation of the city in 1959.

Jim Harless, who worked for the city of Oak Ridge from 1973 to 1985, most of that time supervising environmental health for the Municipal Health Services Department, says, "While most unique, the Oak Ridge Health Department, has seen a great deal of change over time.

Originally, the City of Oak Ridge had the only municipal funded health department in Tennessee. It came about in a bit of an unusual way..." Oak Ridge may well

Federal Staff of the Public Administration Service (PAS), the federal contractor operating Oak Ridge like it was a city, worked to pull together an initial draft charter in part during 1957 and 1958." This was in preparation for incorporation as the federal provided health services program was fast coming to an end with the plans to incorporate the city.

Jim notes, "...Mr. R. D. Hutcheson, Commissioner of Health, State of Tennessee, and A. Shipley, Regional Health Director met in Nashville on January 29, 1958, with PAS staff D. B. Henry, and R. D. Stover. The meeting came forth to say the future needed Public Health services could be furnished by Anderson County Health Department, but 'there seemed to be general agreement among these officials, however, that the additional expenses to the county for providing health service to Oak Ridge should be borne solely by Oak Ridge." This is what was most unusual and still seems strange to me. No other city in Tennessee was required to pay for health services and pay taxes as well.

This arrangement was and remains to this day to have been the single such arrangement ever made in Tennessee. I am not sure why Oak Ridgers agreed to it and continued to fund public health over the years. Maybe there was no choice at the time.

Jim further states, "Consideration apparently was not given to the fact that Oak Ridgers already were making a sizeable contribution through their tax payments to the operation of the Anderson County Health Department. The original charter PAS had worked up called for a contract city-county health operation. This is reported in the charter plan in 1958..."

Jim goes on to say, "City planners of the early times had anticipated a city-county contract, shown in the initial charter, in which costs of health operations were shared. When the State officials designated Oak Ridge to be the "sole" payer, the City rapidly set up a Committee on Public Health and Welfare for short-term planning for Oak Ridge. The results of that final report are found in their document, dated May 1959."

Jim also cites references for his conclusions, "Other year to year city operations of health, the funding of health, and the relationship of the City to the joint State/Anderson County health department, was reported at length in the 60-page Budget document, per David Ammons, (1982) by report and MEMO to M. Lyle Lacy III, February 20, 1981.

He continues by saying, "Oak Ridge was, by 1958 and 1959, operating using a State-City working verbal agreement, even if the city did not feel it was a fair agreement, the effort began moving forward. The City was moving to cooperate with a City Health Department. At least they would have some control over a City Health operation. Over time, with the Oak Ridge City Public Health and its city residents paying costs for many years, but NOT without asking the State/County Health office for help in funding or manpower for Public Health, multiple times over the years."

"But, finally over two decades had passed and the City did, soon after that, convince Anderson County or the joint state operation to come into Oak Ridge to begin Health service delivery to Oak Ridge citizens and residents by the 1983 time period. A former Regional Director from Knoxville, now retired, attended and told me the State officials tried to get Oak Ridge city to continue to participate or offer some funding to city-county health, but Oak Ridge declined, feeling it had paid and operated health services for 25 years and that was enough.

Jim Harless concludes, "Mr. Dave Ammons was perhaps, the most active City staff person, as Research and Budget Director, who acted upon and worked to deal with what he described as an inequity." Dave Ammons deserves considerable credit for ending the practice of forcing Oak Ridge to fund its health services and the transition to the last of the THREE government operations phases of Oak Ridge public health.

For nearly 25 years, from 1959 to 1983, the Oak Ridge Health Department, a function of the city and funded by the city, provided excellent public health services to include environmental monitoring, restaurant inspections, day care services inspection, school inspections, animal control and a multitude of other health related services. Those individuals who worked as nurses, supervisors and health workers are understandably proud of the many years

of exceptional services.

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The present arrangement began about 1983, and continues to the present date. There is reason to feel the County-State operation will be the final and long lasting Oak Ridge service provider of Public Health services.

Mr. Art Miller, District Director, Anderson County Health Department, provides insight into the history of that organization and relevant information about present day practices that include Oak Ridge. The Anderson County Health Department seems to have begun with three employees, a doctor and two nurses in the 1930's.

Beginning in the 1980's when phase three of Oak Ridge health services came into being, the Anderson County Health Department provided services to Oak Ridge at locations in Oak Ridge until 2005 when both health departments combined in one new location at 710 N. Main St. in Clinton. Services increased and costs decreased.

Art says, "The staff now numbers 49 and primary care for the uninsured has been added. The dental clinic is state of the art and has tripled in number of patients seen. Since moving in 2005, a large conference room has been added along with office space for primary care. A third dental clinic room is to be added this summer. Anderson County Health Department sees over 20,000 patients a year but public health touches everyone every day." Their web site is: www.healthdept.org.

This article has attempted to provide a brief history of a most unusual arrangement whereby Oak Ridge was required to pay for public health services. In doing so, I have focused on the three phases of how health services have been provided to citizens.

Another of the many interesting and unique facts that should be captured as well is the association between the Oak Ridge Health Department and the Environmental Quality Advisory Board. Jim says that was one of the unique things he found when he arrived in Oak Ridge in 1973. EQAB was created October 19, 1970 as a temporary board and made permanent March 12, 1973, according to records found by Jackie Bernard.

Over the years, the working relationships and partnering efforts have helped assure Oak Ridge environmental concerns are addressed. One just has to look at the record of the City of Oak Ridge dealing with the mercury contamination of East Fork Poplar Creek to see examples of such joint cooperative efforts.

There is also the relationship to Earth Day. Jim

wanted to time this brief history of public health in Oak Ridge to publish just before Earth Day 2009 to bring additional attention to the importance of each of us doing all we can to protect our home planet for the long term.

The Ephesian Dilemma

The Ephesian Church is one of the two churches to have two letters addressed to it. The first by Paul the Apostle to the Gentiles and the letter Jesus Christ dictated to the church's founder, and writer of the book of Revelation, one of the sons of thunder, John the Apostle.

We will begin our study with the letter Jesus Christ dictated to an Angel to be delivered and written by John. The seven letters to the seven churches, are the most important teachings a member of God's kingdom can rightly divide.

The word Revelation is singular not plural. It is one revelation of Jesus Christ's true church, as labeled by Messiah as his bride. He being masculine, the word Ephesus is a feminine pronoun. It is understood as "My desired one." It is the Apostolic Church founded by John and admonished by Jesus Christ and Paul. Ephesus is a city on the coast of western Turkey in modern Izmir province. It enjoyed a geographic position as the center of Pagan Greek worship. The Temple of Artemis was in Ephesus. Greek life revolved around the veneration of created deities. Ephesus is the feminine goddess of fertility. Her roots can be traced to the cult of Semiramis in Babylon. She is most often depicted posing with reindeer, for she is the deity Americans call mother nature. John the Apostle set up shop in Ephesus after escaping persecution in Jerusalem.

Ephesus was first settled by the Lydian Greek colonists in the 14th and 13th centuries, BC. It is where the Greek life was full. There was a theatre, a gymnasium, a massive library, and the Temple of Artemis. It was considered the most modern city of it's time. Greek life in western Turkey was centered in Ephesus for a long time. It would be conquered by Cyrus the great who allowed for the worship of Artemis to continue. It would be re-conquered by Alexander the Great and Hellenization took on renewed life as he funded the construction of the city. At the time of John and Paul, Ephesus was the center of Roman life in western Turkey. The ancient Jewish people had settled in Ephesus and at the time of the Apostles, there was a prominent Jewish synagogue in the city center. This is a paradigm of our Jewish ancestor's fate as God chose to destroy their temple in Jerusalem, and send them packing around the entire globe. The diaspora begun in 70 AD is drawing to a close as I pen these words. Israel is in the land and prospering, America finds itself under the abandonment wrath of Yeshua, and the Laodicean Church has manifest around the globe. Where the carcasses lie, there the eagles shall be gathered.

Paul the Apostle, lays the groundwork for the admonishment Jesus Christ would issue in Revelation 2. Ephesians 3;18 is Paul's remedy for the problem they had. Paul tells the church to allow their whole breadth, width, depth and height to be sanctified to the will of God the father. The Church of Ephesus was only getting three of them right.

Depth, width, and height are easy for most professing Christians to sanctify. It is church attendance and ministry outreach. But what about breadth? The word breadth in the original koine Greek translation was understood as a great expanse of time. To cross the breadth of the ocean requires a sea captain to spend a lot of time learning to navigate the entire breadth of the ocean expanse. Breadth to the Greek mind, has nothing to do with church, it has everything to do with how much time you spend alone with Jesus Christ.

Paul the Apostle laid out in Ephesians what God sees as true membership in his kingdom of Jew and Greek peoples. John was reminded to issue the rebuke for what they were getting wrong. The Ephesian church was going to church every week. They chose the Roman model for worship on the venerable day of the Sun. Sunday. God's sabbath will always be Shabbat. Friday evening to Saturday evening. It is one of two days that Jesus Christ will be in the temple during the millennium. The other is the new moon. Sunday is the day the Roman Caesars gave slaves the day off. Six days shall a man work and on the seventh he shall rest. Sunday is the first day of the work week in God's Bible. It has never changed. Men changed in their haste to assimilate to Roman, Pagan traditions.

Ephesus is where many Pagan traditions migrated into church worship services. Roman holidays began to be venerated by Ephesian Christians, and time spent earning income became more important than spending time with Jesus Christ. Alone in prayer and supplication with thanksgiving. And in the sanctifying work of the study of scripture. This is why there is absolutely no power in the Gospel being taught in today's denominational churches. They are ok with Roman holidays and church tradition started by our ancestors. They are fine with lukewarm Christianity.

Jesus Christ admonished the Ephesian church with the words "YOU have lost your first Love". He was speaking to John the revelator and an amazing recipient of the love of Christ. It is John who introduces the world to the agape love of Jesus Christ. It is John who was entrusted with the care of Jesus Christ's mother

Mary. She is buried in Ephesus right beside John the Apostle today. Since Jesus Christ saw fit to entrust John with the care of his mother, and the admonition of the Church, he must also be the one who can provide Christians with the remedy to our dilemma.

1 John 5:4,5 is the remedy for those who have an ear to hear. Do you have an ear to hear what the Spirit is saying to the modern Ephesian Church? For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world but he that believes Jesus Christ is the Son of God. Hallelujah!

The Ephesian letter is a letter that should give us Biblical hope. It was at Ephesus that Christ introduces us to the prophetic timeline of church history. Ephesus denotes the Apostolic Church age. It begins with the calling of the twelve and ends with the martyrdom of Polycarp in Smyrna. He is the bishop John anoints at Ephesus to be over the Church of Smryna and the second church Jesus Christ addresses in his letters to the seven Churches. Smyrna is the place where Gentile persecution begins to occur in western Turkey.

The Ephesian letter finishes with the practical application of Christian faith. We are commanded to put on the full armor of God. Having our loins girt about with truth, having on the breastplate of righteousness, our feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace, taking the shield of faith, the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the spirit which is the word of God.

At the time of the writing of Paul's admonition to the Ephesian Church, Rome was the world superpower. The sword the Roman legionnaire would take into battle was the two-edged gladius. Our Bible is one message with two edges over two testaments. Mercy is the message of the Old Testament, and grace is who appears in the New Testament. He has a name. It is Yeshua ha Messiah or Jesus Christ in English. He preached salvation from a Hebrew hermeneutical perspective gleaned while he was writing the Old Testament in eternity past. He is the author and finisher of our faith. He is the Lion of the tribe of Judah. He is the Alpha and the Omega; he is the Aleph and the Tau. He is our redeemer. He is coming soon at the sound of the trumpet to retrieve his bride and bring her to heaven to receive her mansion. He will return to this world with his bride at the end of the tribulation to receive his kingdom and inheritance. He is alive forever more. Hallelujah! The Ephesian Church had become so adept at church attendance once or twice a week, they were now ok with not spending time with Messiah. John could not wait to see Christ in the Gospel period. After the resurrection, church attendance became more important that personal relationship to Jesus Christ. It was comfortable having people see you at church. Outward piety, replaced inward conviction. Jesus Christ is upset.

The one thing the Ephesians were getting write was that they hated any type of church hierarchy. Relationship to God was personal. The Nicolaitans were the precursors to the Pope, bishops, priests, deacons, and lay people who started a government where men lorded over the lives of believers. It was a cult started by the deacon Nicholas in Acts 6. The words can be derived from two Greek words. Nicao: to rule over, and Laity: the people. There is one mediator between God and man, the Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus Christ hates any type of church hierarchy where men set up other men who appear outwardly pious but inside, they are ravenous wolves. The only person to earn a wage from Christ's crucifixion and the Gospel was Judas! Christ condemned the need for government in church.

The reaction of the Roman government was to begin wholesale persecution of Gentile Christians in Asia minor beginning with the martyrdom of Polycarp. It would not end until Constantine married government to the Christian Church at Pergamos. Persecution was the lot for professing Christians from Stephen through the current persecution of believers in Africa and other countries where government as God leaves believers in Christ with no other option than death. This week we humbly honor the five military servicemembers who were killed in a terrorist attack six years ago on July 16, 2015 in Chattanooga, TN. The names of this five servicemembers and the details that took place on that horrific day are listed below.

Marine Corps Lance Corporal Squire K.
"Skip" Wells (21)
Marine Corps Sergeant Carson A. Holmquist (25)

Marine Corps Staff Sergeant David A. Wyatt

On July 16, 2015, Muhammad Youssef Abdulazeez opened fire on two military installations in Chattanooga, Tennessee. He first committed a drive-by shooting at a recruiting center, then traveled to a U.S. Navy Reserve center and continued firing, where he was killed by police in a gunfight. Four Marines died on the spot. A Navy sailor, a Marine recruiter, and a police officer were wounded; the sailor died from his injuries two days later.

On December 16, following an investigation, former Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) director James B. Comey said that the shootings were "motivated by foreign terrorist organization propaganda."



The shootings began shortly after 10:30 a.m. at the Armed Forces Career Center in a strip mall located on Lee Highway. The Center recruited personnel for branches of the United States military, including the U.S. Army, the U.S. Air Force, and the Tennessee National Guard. There, Abdulazeez fired 30 to 45 shots into the office from inside a silver rental Ford Mustang convertible, wounding a U.S. Marine. He then escaped and led members of the Chattanooga Police Department on a six miles pursuit. At the time of the first shooting, only seven

people, including the wounded Marine, were inside

Reserve center on Amnicola Highway in Chattanooga, where he rammed his vehicle through a security gate. He drove to one of the center's buildings, where the Inspector-Instructor staff of Mike Battery, 3rd Battalion, 14th Marines and sailors were working.

Abdulazeez first fired at it, then charged inside and continued firing, fatally wounding a U.S. Navy sailor. Abdulazeez then exited the building through the back and entered a fenced motor pool area, where he shot several Marines. Three to five minutes after the second shooting began, he reentered the building, where he fired upon responding police officers. He was eventually fatally shot by five police officers (Officers Keven Flanagan, Jeff Lancaster, Sean O'Brien, Lucas Timmons, Grover Wilson III) outside the facility.

# Law Enforcement Officer of the Week

We honor fallen Lubbock County, TX Sheriff's Office SWAT Member Sergeant Josh Bartlett who was shot and killed during a barricade at a home on July 15, 2021.

Earlier that morning, the subject had been stopped by a Texas Highway Patrol trooper for reckless driving and attempted to bait the officer into a confrontation. The subject returned home after the encounter and began walking around the neighborhood with a firearm at about 1:15 pm.

When officers with the Levelland Police Department arrived, the man opened fire on them and then barricaded



himself inside. The regional SWAT team was requested as the subject randomly fired shots from the home.

Sergeant Bartlett and three other members of the SWAT team were shot as they engaged the subject. Sergeant Bartlett was transported to Covenant Medical Center in Levelland where he succumbed to his wounds. Several other team members were wounded, one critically.

The subject was taken into custody at about 11:30 pm.
Sergeant Bartlett leaves behind a wife and three sons. The family just celebrated his youngest son's teenage birthday just two days prior.

### Huge revenue loss from decline in audits

A government agency reported that a decline in audits of wealthy taxpayers has resulted in potential loss of nearly \$2 billion. IRS Commissioner Charles Rettig told lawmakers the actual tax gap could approach or exceed \$1 trillion per year. He said that when wealthy taxpayers evade their obligations, the costs are borne by taxpayers who follow the law

The IRS has had a decline in staffing and a decline in resources. Charles Rettig said that the IRS has lost 17,000 enforcement personnel over between 2013 and 2018. The number of audits of high-income returns that closed in fiscal 2019 was only 29,610 compared to 47,024 in fiscal 2015.

The IRS defines high-income taxpayers as people whose positive income was at least \$200,000.

A report by the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) noted that a program that focused on wealthy taxpayers was discontinued in 2017. The report noted that when high-income taxpayers were audited it averaged more dollars per hour than any other audit strategy.

U.S. Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen has said that if the IRS were funded appropriately and able to crack down on tax cheats, the government would be able to collect more revenue without raising taxes.

"The tax gap is huge, and I think we would have a fairer tax

system and collect more tax revenue without the need to raise rates if we resourced the IRS properly to be able to address this issue," Yellen stated during testimony before the Senate.

"Every dollar spent on IRS enforcement reduces at least three or four dollars to the federal budget essentially, but it is not something that gets scored. When we look at budget increases, there is a little bit of controversy here. We had the president and the White House come out and say, the IRS needs 80 billion, and we are prepared to fund them \$80 billion over the next decade. We would use that to enhance their technology and to do some significant hiring and training at all levels. What's happening more recently, though, is that Congress started looking at it and saying maybe we should give them \$40 billion, not \$80 billion." Said Patti Burquest, principal, and Washington national tax leader at RSM US.

The IRS has requested an \$80 billion investment over the course of a decade, which would allow the IRS to increase its enforcement and crack down on tax cheats.

The senate is negotiating a bipartisan deal that includes \$40 billion to boost audits with a goal of raising \$100 billion more in tax collections.

## Romans 11 part B

(Romans 11:25-32) Israel's partial hardening: the following declaration is one of the most misunderstood in this document, if not the entire New Testament. It is the favorite text for the misguided national-conversion-of-Israel theory. According to the dispensational dogma, Israel is to be "re-gathered from all nations, restored to her own land and converted" (Scofield Reference Bible). Paul wants his readers to understand this "mystery," the reality of Israel's future, which was obscure in the writings of the prophets.

Paul states that "a hardening in part has befallen Israel." (a) The hardening was manifested in their utter refusal to believe in Christ, in spite of overwhelming evidence (Jn. 11:47; 12:37-40; Acts 4:16). (b) "In part" acknowledges there was a "remnant" that did believe (v. 4; 14), as reflected in the conversions on Pentecost (Acts 2:38). (c) The expression, "has befallen," involves a verbal tense that suggests an attitude initially engaged and then sustained. As one scholar noted, it was not a "temporary insensibility." (d) The terminal point is described as "until the fulness of the Gentiles be come in." This is key to understanding this passage.

The expression, "fullness of the Gentiles," denotes the accomplishment of Jehovah's purpose among the Gentiles (or the "nations"). In other words, Israel's hardness will remain until the end of the present dispensation. This hardening of the bulk of Israel will continue "throughout the time of the Gentiles" (until Christ's return, Lenski). There is a similar phrase in Luke's Gospel. Christ, alluding to Jerusalem's impending destruction, declared that the city would be "trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled" (21:24). The expression, "trodden down," is in a tense that hints of prolonged hardships (though not necessarily uninterrupted) for Jerusalem (and what she represented---the nation). Again, the phrase, "times of the Gentiles," represents the current age. It implies a previous "times of the Jews." When they rejected the Messiah, that age of prominence (called a "reign") (Matt. 21:43) ended. It was superseded by "the times of the Gentiles"---the Christian age. It is clear that physical Israel is to be the recipient of divine retribution throughout the Christian era.

What, then, is the meaning of "and so all Israel shall be saved" (v. 26)? Since the hardening of Israel was not total but only "in part," there was still hope that many Jews might be saved. How? Those that are saved will be saved by their acceptance of the gospel (10:12-16) and their surrender to the Deliverer from Zion (v. 26). The word "so" is an adverb of manner, meaning "in this way." Hence, it is in the way of obeying Christ that "all Israel"

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(who are saved) may be saved. There will be no exception to the divine procedure! This passage does not affirm a nation-wide conversion of the people of Israel. The following quotation (v. 26-27) is from Isaiah 59:20; it confirms this interpretation. (a) The Deliverer is Christ. (b) He comes "out of Zion" as per dispensational theology). (c) The deliverance is by means of Christ's "covenant" (Jer. 31:31-34; Heb. 8:8). (d) The prophecy is fulfilled in the "taking away of their sins" (as on Pentecost)--not by the return of Christ.

It is true that the Jews are the "enemies" of the gospel, but they are still beloved of God because of their heritage, and the Lord longs for their inclusion into the "elect" (v. 28). Jehovah does not regret the blessings poured out upon the nation of Israel in centuries gone by, even though the Jews have, in large measure, rejected his Son (v. 29). Just as the Gentiles obtained mercy (by having an extensive opportunity to hear the gospel following the Jews' rejection), it is the apostle's hope that the mercy that has been extended to the Gentiles might somehow influence the Jews to reconsider at the gospel of Christ (v. 30-31). Verse thirty-two suggests that even though the Lord has "shut up" (allowed, tolerated) disobedience, his mercy still is available to all willing to accept it. Note that between verses thirty and thirty-two the terms "disobedient" and "disobedience" are both used twice. This graphically underscores Paul's definition of "faith" as used in this letter. His conception of faith is a universe apart from the modern Protestant theory.

(Romans 11:33-36) God be praised: this chapter and the end of the doctrinal section of the book are concluded with an anthem of praise concerning God Almighty. A collection of divine attributes is depicted respecting the "depth" and "wealth" of these qualities. The Lord's knowledge and wisdom are applauded. The former refers to the limitless scope of what he knows; he is omniscient (1 Jn. 3:20). The latter alludes to the consummate skill with which his knowledge has been and is exercised---both in material creation and in the "new creation" through Christ.

His judgments exceed human analyses, and his ways are "beyond tracing" (trackless"). Ignorant humanity would do well to acknowledge this and cease their silly criticism of the Almighty. Job certainly learned this lesson. No one can fathom the mind of God nor serve as his advisor (though many attempt to). The Lord is not indebted to us, and his gracious gifts are not the result of

his repayment for anything we have done on his behalf. God is the source, agency, and goal of all things. May he be glorified eternally. So be it!

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

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# Sen. Yager urges citizens to take advantage of Tennessee's new and traditional sales tax holidays

NASHVILLE -**State Senator** Ken Yager (R-Kingston) today encouraged citizens to take advantage of Tennessee's new and traditional sa-

les tax holidays which are set to begin at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 30th. The 16th annual tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers will run through 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, August 1st; while a new sales tax holiday on food, food ingredients, and prepared food will remain in effect through the end of the day on Thursday, August 5th. The new holiday includes the qualified sales of prepared food by restaurants, food trucks, caterers

and grocery stores.

Sen. Yager says the new sales tax holiday on food is intended to provide relief to all Tennesseans. He said the sales tax relief for prepared food will also aid restaurants which have been especially hurt by the effects of the pandemic.

"The traditional sales tax holiday, which occurs before students go back to school each year, helps parents, students and teachers with expenses in preparation for the fall semester," said Senator Yager, who supported passage of the legislation. "But people of all ages, not just students, can realize sales tax savings on clothing, shoes, computers and other supplies. It will also support local businesses and jobs."

"This year, we have added another sales tax holiday to provide relief to all

Tennesseans by extending a full week of no sales tax on food from both restaurants and grocery stores," continued Yager.

In addition, Sen. Yager said legislation passed by the General Assembly this year provided a sales tax holiday on gun safes and safety devices. The year-long holiday began on July 1, 2021 and ends on June 30, 2022 and helps encourage safe storage of firearms.

"I urge all citizens to take advantage of the sales tax relief offered this year and shop at local small businesses and restaurants during this time. I look forward to the positive economic effect it will have on our economy," Yager concluded.

Some of the information I retrieved indicated that Costa Rica has one of the highest literacy rates on the globe and more schoolteachers than police officers.

One quote I will use from an internet source is the following: "Costa Rica provides the perfect combination of relaxation, adventure, culture, fine cuisine and wildlife." Are you ready to go on vacation after reading the above information? Well before you book your flight let me tell you what reality is in the coun-

try. Although Costa Rica is often forwarded as an example of a modern and successful Latin American nation, it has many problems which are conveniently disguised by savvy travel ads.

I personally visited Costa Rica in July of 2019 for five weeks as a part of a study abroad program to learn how to speak Spanish. I lived with a family of modest means in the city of San Jose that had been selected to be hosts for the university. They did not speak one word of English! My first hint that the internet might have steered me astray was the fact that their small one-bathroom house had razor wire surrounding the perimeter of the roof. My fears were further confirmed when the padre of the house would not leave



after dark unless he was accompanied by at least one other person.

I interviewed many local citizens on the topics of free health care, taxes, crime, and the economy. I discovered that the free health care wasn't a bargain. Many of the citizens would tell me stories of waiting over six hours to see a doctor in the emergency room. There were even tales of people dying while waiting to see a doctor!

On the topic of crime, it did not take long before I realized that I was not in Kansas anymore. During my visit, the State Department issued a warning to stay away from the streets near the U.S. Embassy. Apparently,


occurring in Costa Rica during my stay that the government was instituting new taxes which had the whole town of San Jose in an uproar.

The last comparison I will make between Costa Rica and America is identification requirements. I am certain that experience would convince even the skeptics that we live in the greatest country on earth and enjoy freedoms that others can only dream of.



rival drug gangs were having an armed dispute. This was especially concerning considering the American embassy is the one place you want to be able to access if you encounter trouble in a foreign country.

I vividly remember reading the report of one federal cabinet member who somehow maintained a three-million-dollar mansion on an \$82,000 salary. She was later discovered of diverting public funds to buy and maintain her palatial home.
