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Gain of Function Research and U.S. Dollars

If you keep up with the politics on Capitol Hill, you may recall that Senator Rand Paul and Doctor Fauci had a heated exchange over the subject of Fauci's support and previous

Michael Nance testimony concerning Gain-of-Function research and the lab in Wuhan China.

Dr. Rand Paul has been an increasing critic of Dr. Fauci using terms like, "Dr. Anthony Fauci and the Lockdown Mafia." Recently, Dr. Paul requested that Dr. Fauci be criminally investigated concerning Senate testimony in which Fauci testified that the National Institutes of Health (NIH) never funded Gain-of-Function research at the Wuhan lab with U.S. dollars, which Senator Paul emphatically asserts is a lie.

Dr. Fauci testified in May of this year stating: "There's no way of guaranteeing that," when asked by Republican Sen. John Kennedy if the Wuhan lab may have used U.S. dollars in Gain-of-Function research. The actual exchange by Senator Kennedy and Dr. Fauci is the following: Kennedy: "Dr. Fauci, I believe you have testified that you didn't give any money to the Wuhan lab to conduct gain-of-function

research. Is that right?" Fauci: "That is correct."

Kennedy: "How do you know they didn't lie to you and use the money for gain-of-function research anyway?"

Fauci: "Well, we've seen the results of the experiments that were done and that were published—and that the viruses that they studied are on public data bases now. So, none of that was gain-of-function, so—" Kennedy: "How do you know that they didn't do the research and not put it on their website?

Fauci: "There's no way of guaranteeing that, but in our experience with grantees, including Chinese grantees, which we have had interactions with for a very long period of time, they are very competent, trustworthy scientists."

After reading this entire exchange, unlike Dr. Fauci I was more than a little suspicious and decided that Gain-of-Function research was a worthwhile topic of discussion. What is Gain-of-Function research and why do scientist think that this is a worthwhile endeavor? The answer to that question is interesting and in my opinion is fraught with risk and reward.

"Gain-of-function" is the term in common use for biological research that has as its goal to increase the virulence and lethality of pathogens and viruses. Gainof-Function research is typically government funded; its focus is on enhancing the pathogens' ability to infect different species and to increase their deadly impact as airborne pathogens and viruses. Allegedly, Gain-of-Function research is conducted for biodefense purposes, or to be prepared if a super virus like Covid-19 creates a pandemic. Conducting experiments associated with Gain-of-Function are a risky endeavor. Pathogens and viruses that have been enhanced during experiments have the potential to escape the lab. Although Gainof-Function's stated purpose is biodefense, once a virus is enhanced or upgraded by science, it is a weapon that can be used for biological warfare, or line the pockets of any company that is on the leading edge of developing a vaccine.

What are the alleged benefits of Gain-of-Function research? Some of the stated benefits are:

• Identify viral strains that demonstrate evidence of infection and transmission and being the likely source of a future pandemic.

• Develop vaccine seed stocks to have ready and available if pandemics from these strains arise. This could save millions of lives if the scientists already have the roadmap for a vaccine at their fingertips.

• Scientific knowledge resulting from these experiments are huge and could have beneficial impacts on world health.

There are many questions that everyday Americans are asking about this topic, and some of these questions have long-term implications. If the United States was funding Gain-of-Function research and the risks were understood, why would we allow the development of such dangerous super viruses in China? It is well-known that China is both an ideological and economic adversary to the United States. What were our leaders thinking to provide money to develop these potential weapons of mass destruction inside Chinese borders? That is if that really happened, the jury is out, but the circumstantial evidence is piling up.

Here are some interesting assertions from Factcheck .org

• In 2014, the NIH awarded a grant to the U.S.-based company to study the risk of the future emergence of coronavi-

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ruses from bats. The project was renewed in 2019, for another five years. In April 2020 the program was cancelled— three months after the first case of the coronavirus was confirmed in the U.S. The grant cancellation occurred during the time when President Donald Trump questioned the U.S. funding to a lab in Wuhan.

• The Wuhan lab has studied bat coronaviruses for years, specifically their potential to infect humans. Previous coronaviruses have originated in China, specifically the severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS). This led to global outbreaks in 2003. The SARS virus is thought to have started in bats, and then transferred into humans through intermediate animals, hence the reason that coronaviruses have been widely studied in China.

Dr. Fauci responded on the many questions about China after his Capitol Hill exchange with Dr. Paul. He responded in a fact-checking conference, which was hosted by PolitiFact.com. Fauci stated: that it would "almost be irresponsible" to not collaborate with Chinese scientists given that the 2003 SARS outbreak originated in China. "So, we really had to learn a lot more about the viruses that were there, about whether or not people were getting infected with bad viruses."


Regardless the cause of the virus, you can be confident that eventually the truth should find its way to the surface in the current pond of misinformation. The debates over the origin are ongoing. In May of this year the Journal of Science published a letter from 18 scientists who indicate that although the virus leaking from a lab is unlikely, "more investigation" is needed and "Theories of accidental release from a lab and zoonotic spillover both remain viable," they also wrote. "Knowing how COVID-19 emerged is critical for informing global strategies to mitigate the risk of future outbreaks."

In any event, I am concerned about Gain-of-Function research being supported by the United States in Wuhan, China. The Chinese government has demonstrated that they are not a friend to the United States. They constantly launch cyber-attacks and often position themselves to oppose the U.S. in foreign policy opportunities. Why would anyone think that we should fund any research inside the borders of China that could be used against us a weapon? Let's hope they all wake up in Washington D.C.!

Morgan County Purchases New Garbage Truck with Volkswagen Grant

Morgan County's Solid Waste department has a new garbage truck. After nearly two years of trying to find funding to purchase a new one that has a price tag of more than a quarter of a million dollars, Morgan County was awarded a \$129,000 grant from Volkswagen and secured an additional \$133,048 through the Governor's Grant.

"This is a big deal for Morgan County. We were able to purchase this \$262,000 garbage truck at no cost to our property taxpayers. We've been patiently waiting to find a way to fund this huge endeavor," said Morgan County Executive Brian Langley, who applied for the VW grant and received the Governor's Grant last year.

The need for a new truck became more obvious during recent months with nearly \$30,000 in repairs to keep the current garbage truck, a 2012 Mack, on the road picking up garbage at the convenience centers, schools and businesses. The new truck will replace a 1992 Mack that currently serves as the backup truck, but is barely fit to make the close pickups around the City of Wartburg.

Langley said the County had thought they had secured a garbage truck through the Tennessee Department of General Services in late 2019, but at the last minute a federal agency secured the truck away from Morgan County. Finally, in October of 2020 Langley applied for the Volkswagen Grant and got news in the spring that Morgan County had been awarded it. They had to wait until the contract was finalized and signed in August and managed to get it through these two grants," said Langley.

The new vehicle purchased is a Mack Terrapro 40 yard front-loading garbage truck. It was put out on the road late last week.

> "This is a top of the line truck and we are pleased to have it. One of our main goals for the solid waste department has been to replace these old trucks and outdated and aging equipment without being a burden to the taxpayers," said Morgan County Solid Waste Director Keith Kilby.

Langley praised the effort of several people that helped during the grant application and even after it was submitted to state officials.

"This was a collaborative effort in getting the Volkswagen Grant and I want to thank Senator Ken Yager, Representative John Mark Windle, my

assistant Bret Pallotta, Solid Waste Director Keith Kilby, Finance Director Crystal Garrett, and our County Commission for all their help," said Langley. "It means a lot when you have all these different people working together towards one goal."

Political Decisions and the Future of Afghanistan

President Biden recently made the decision to remove U.S. Troops from Afghanistan. According to a NBS News outlet he was quoted as saying: "We did not go to Afghanistan to nation build, It's the right and the responsibility of the Afghan people alone to decide their future and how they want to run their country."

That statement by the President does not resonate with everyone that has a grasp of the long-term dangers of a Taliban dominated nation.

Iowa Sens. Chuck Grassley and Joni Ernst both agree that the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Afghanistan could lead to a Taliban controlled Afghanistan. Ernst, who is a combat veteran from the Iraq war, was recently quoted as saying that the "withdrawal of troops was haphazard and an attempt to score a quick political headline."

In an ironic political twist, even former President Trump sup-

George Bush's concerns are not without merit, and I can confirm that the life of women will be harsh under the Taliban. I personally spent time with a lady who lived under the Taliban regime a couple of years ago. Born in Afghanistan, she was a true patriot of liberty who risked her own life in the pursuit of the same.

Her name is Angela Niazmand and two years ago she was a co-worker with my wife. We asked her to join our family for our Saturday football party. After being introduced to Angela I learned that she was from Afghanistan. Learning this, I could not pass up an opportunity to interview her and learn about Afghanistan. I was unprepared for what I was to learn about her life and struggles in this far away country.

Angela was born in Kabul Afghanistan, during the Soviet Union's occupation of the country. She was born into a large family of very modest means. According to the customs of the region she was married at a young age and had her first child at seventeen years old. Not long after, she became a widow, her husband dying of leukemia. During this time, the Taliban tyranny dominated the country. Their policies were draconian as women were concerned. Academic books were not allowed in the home under their regime. Angela had a couple of books, which she hid in a closet wall. In the 1990's her passion for education led her to teach school in a cellar under her house in Kabul. It was a dangerous affair to teach school under the Taliban, especially for a woman. She would have the students hide their books in a bag and travel to the house one by one, staggering their arrivals in an effort to avoid the attention of the Taliban authorities. Angela survived the Taliban regime and her efforts to educate the children were not discovered by the repressive regime. She would later go on to obtain her master's degree, and the last time we spoke she was living in Canada working in the education field. Despite the humanitarian risk to a Taliban controlled nation, there is serious security risks to the United States. As before, if the Taliban gain de-facto control of the country it will become a safe haven to religious zealots who disagree with the American way of life. The final reason that the expeditious and hasty departure from Afghanistan appears to be a mistake is American credibility. This move sends a message to future perspective partners in conflict that the U.S. cannot be trusted. Many of our most talented military leaders warned both Trump and Biden about totally leaving Afghanistan to their own devices without a negotiated peace, but both presidents adopted the political expedient solution. Let's hope and pray more soldiers do not have to bear the burden of dislodging extremists from Afghanistan in the not-so-distant future.

ports the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan saying that leaving is: "a wonderful and positive thing to do," Trump is also quoted as saying: "I made early withdraw possible by already pulling much of our billions of dollars and equipment out and, more importantly, reducing our military presence to less than 2,000 troops from the 16,000 level that was there,"

It is true and tragic that many U.S. soldiers have been killed or wounded in the U.S. efforts to rid the country of the repressive Taliban regime. However, we all must remember the circumstances that led to the invasion of Afghanistan. It was Afghanistan that offered a safe haven for those terrorists who attacked our country, and we cannot afford to allow that to happen again, regardless the cost.

Although most Americans support former President Trump and current President Biden's position to leave Afghanistan, many do not understand that the U.S. was only maintaining a small force in the country. Over the last decade the military presence of the U.S. has been reduced from a peak of 100,000 in 2011 down to only 2500 at the beginning of 2021. This small force was crucial in deterring the Taliban by training the indigenous forces and having the vast support system of the U.S. at their fingertips.

In mid-July of this year former President George W. Bush made statements concerning the troop withdrawal and predicted that the consequences will be "unbelievably bad," especially for Afghan women

This week we honor Medal of Honor Recipient David "Mad Dog" Dolby as the veteran of the week.

Dolby joined the Army from Philadelphia at age 18, and by May 21, 1966, was serving in the Republic of Vietnam as a specialist four with Company B, 1st Battalion (Airborne), 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st **Cavalry Division** (Airmobile). On that day, his platoon came under heavy fire which


killed six soldiers and wounded a number of others, including the platoon leader. Throughout the ensuing four-hour battle, Dolby led his platoon in its defense, organized the extraction of the wounded, and directed artillery fire despite close-range attacks from enemy snipers and automatic weapons. He single-handedly attacked the hostile positions and silenced three machine guns, allowing a friendly force to execute a flank attack.

Dolby was subsequently promoted to sergeant and awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions during the battle. The medal was formally presented to him by President Lyndon B. Johnson on September 28, 1967

Dolby's Medal of Honor citation reads: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty, when his platoon, while advancing tactically, suddenly came under intense fire from the enemy located on a ridge immediately to the front. Six members of the platoon were killed instantly and a number were wounded, including the platoon leader. Sgt. Dolby's every move brought fire from the enemy. However, aware that the platoon leader was critically wounded, and that the platoon was in a precarious situation, Sgt. Dolby moved the wounded men to safety and deployed the remainder of the platoon to engage the enemy. Subsequently, his dying platoon leader ordered Sgt. Dolby to withdraw the forward

rejoin the platoon. Despite the continuing intense enemy fire and with utter disregard for his own safety, Sgt. Dolby positioned able-bodied men to cover the withdrawal of the forward elements, assisted the wounded to the new position, and he, alone,

attacked



enemy positions until his ammunition was expended. Replenishing his ammunition, he returned to the area of most intense action, single-handedly killed 3 enemy machine gunners and neutralized the enemy fire, thus enabling friendly elements on the flank to advance on the enemy redoubt. He defied the enemy fire to personally carry a seriously wounded soldier to safety where he could be treated and, returning to the forward area, he crawled through withering fire to within 50 meters of the enemy bunkers and threw smoke grenades to mark them for air strikes. Although repeatedly under fire at close range from enemy snipers and automatic weapons, Sgt. Dolby directed artillery fire on the enemy and succeeded in silencing several enemy weapons. He remained in his exposed location until his comrades had displaced to more secure positions. His actions of unsurpassed valor during 4 hours of intense combat were a source of inspiration to his entire company, contributed significantly to the success of the overall assault on the enemy position, and were directly responsible for saving the lives of a number of his fellow soldiers. Sgt. Dolby's heroism was in the highest tradition of the U.S. Army.

Law Enforcement Officer of the Week

This week we honor fallen Chicago Police Department Officer Ella G. French. Officer French was shot and killed on Saturday, August 7, 2021 while she and her partner conducted a traffic stop of a vehicle containing three subjects.

During the traffic stop, one of the subjects opened fire, striking Officer French and her partner. Despite their wounds, the officers were able to return fire and wounded one of the subjects. Both officers were taken to the University of Chicago Medical Center where Officer French was pronounced dead. Her partner was admitted in critical condition.

All three subjects in the vehicle fled



and the third subject was taken into custody the following day. Officer French had served with the Chicago Police Department for almost three and a half years and was assigned to the Community Safety Team. Officer French was only twenty-nine-years-old and is survived by her mother and brother Andrew French.

Andrew French said, "their mother, who adopted the two of them, gave them everything she could growing up while instilling in them the important values of being kind and helping others in need. She raised us to be of service. To care. To have integrity."

I said, "No Kelly I don't" and nonchalantly I was throwing small mud balls up in the air. I didn't really know who put the mud in Kelly's boat and it wasn't me. I was as relaxed and unconcerned as I could be. I kept throwing mud balls up into the air until one came down and hit Kelly on top of his head. I'll never forget the look on his face when this happened and he probably will never forget the look on my face.

He didn't say a word; just came over, picked me up, and threw me into the coal pit. In a way I was proud of Kelly because he usually stayed very calm when we got together and wouldn't fight. I should have been more careful and maybe I was too nonchalant. I don't think either one of us stayed mad at each other longer than a day or two. Kelly began to trap muskrats around the coal pits to make a little extra money. He would check his traps every morning before going to school; skin the animals and put them on a board to dry. One time he really got lucky and trapped a mink. He was so excited he brought the mink over to our house to show it off. I don't know how much money he made but I know he worked hard at it. One day when all four Mud Creek Boys were together, we decided to go on the hillside by Kelly's house. The corn had been gathered and when you pulled the corn stalks up a lot of dirt came up

The Mud Creek Boys spent a lot of time at the coal pits or the pastures up until they were fifteen-years-old or until they got involved in sports at Central High. We

with them. We liked to fight with these stalks. On this day another boy from the neighborhood joined us and usually when he came down, we had to run him off because of his cursing. We warned him before we started playing. One of the Redmon boys hit the Heidel boy in the side of the head with the dirt-filled corn stalk. The boy started cursing and called the Redmon boy every bad thing he could think of. The



Redmon boy who was as strong as Charles Atlas told him to apologize but that only made it worse.

The Redmon boy came at the Heidel boy and knocked him down and the boy kept calling him S.O.B. or worse. It had rained that morning and made a lot of mud holes around Kelly's house and the barn. The Redmon boy cleaned every mud hole with the Heidel boy but every time he came up, he was still

cursing. Kelly's family was standing on the porch enjoying the show as they passed on their horses, mud and water flying and curse words still coming out of the Heidel boy's mouth. I'd like to tell you about another group of Mud Creek Boys who had some good times at the coal pits. Two were my younger brothers and the other were Allen's nephews. They even went out to the prison farm pond; caught some bass there and transplanted them into the coal pits because the coal pits were a good place to fish. One day I was called by a man who asked me to come up and take a picture of a

big bass he had caught at the mouth of Obed. I was working for the Morgan County News at the time so I went up to Bullen's Store and took a picture of a 7–8 pound bass. I asked the man again where he caught the fish. He said, "Mouth of Obed." But the next day I was back at the store and Raymond told me he caught that bass in the coal pits. His picture never did make it in the paper. I don't like a liar.

> The Mud Creek Boys #2 did have some problems on the coal pits. The problems came from a big boy who liked to bully the smaller kids. When it got too bad the boys would invite their big brother Glen over to take care of the bully. Well, he really took care of Mr. Bully. He picked him up by the seat of the pants and threw him into the pits. When he came out, he would pick him up and throw him in again. I guess the bully soon learned not to bully when Glen was around. You know at one time I hated to see grandpa's pasture tore up by coal strippers but on the other hand a group of

young boys sure did have a great time there. When I think about those days, I often think of what my mother said one time after I had killed a whole day at the coal pits. She said, "Tommy, I wish you had a fish sideways in you." I said, "Mom, that wouldn't feel too good." * On Sept. 3, 1935, a new landspeed record is set by Britain's Sir Malcolm Campbell on the Bonneville Salt Flats of Utah. Campbell and his 2,500-horsepower Bluebird motor car made two runs over a 1-mile course at speeds averaging over 301 mph.

* On Aug. 31, 1959, Brooklyn Dodgers left-hander Sandy Koufax strikes out 18 batters, setting a new National League record for most strikeouts in a single game.

* On Aug. 30, 1963, a "hot line" between Moscow and Washington goes into effect to speed communication between U.S. and the Soviet Union and help prevent the possibility of an accidental war. Although never used, it did provide a useful prop for movies about nuclear disaster, such as "Fail Safe" and "Dr. Strangelove."

The Biden Blowout is Just Beginning

A trillion dollars used to be a lot of money, even in Washington. Now, a trillion-dollar spending bill is a trifle barely worth arguing over and the stuff of bipartisan consensus.

Oscar Wilde famously said that nothing succeeds like excess, but even he might blanch at the shameless profligacy that is America's new normal.

In their wisdom, Senate Republicans decided to help President Joe Biden pass a portion of his blow-out fiscal agenda, a \$1.2 trillion infrastructure bill that is a prelude to an even bigger, vastly more consequential \$3.5 trillion reconciliation bill.

The infrastructure bill itself is, as fiscal analyst Brian Riedl of the Manhattan Institute notes, "one of the largest non-emergency spending bills of the past 50 years."

Republicans told themselves that only about half, \$550 billion, is new spending, and that by going along they can take the heat off of Democratic moderates Kyrsten Sinema and Joe Manchin, who are being constantly pressured to ditch the filibuster.

Perhaps, but there's no doubt that the GOP has blessed, and lent a bipartisan imprimatur, to a portion of the president's hoped-for historic spending spree. In so doing, they have taken at least a little ownership of an agenda they should want no part of.

Republicans will have much less influence, and perhaps none, on the next spate of spending, which is the so-called "soft" infrastructure (aka, a wish list of progressive social programs) after the "hard" infrastructure in the bipartisan bill (roads, bridges, rail). Under the reconciliation process, tax and spending bills evade the filibuster in the Senate, so Democrats can pass whatever they want so long as they hold all 50 of their senators.

The sheer numbers here are jaw dropping. Including the \$1.9 trillion so-called COVID-19 relief bill from earlier this year, Biden wants to spend nearly \$6 trillion in three measures passed within months of each other. In 2019, by point of comparison, the entire federal budget was \$4.4 trillion (and at the time, President Trump wasn't exactly tightening the country's fiscal belt).

The tide of new spending will add to already extraordinary levels of red ink.

The White House projects that the U.S. debt will reach 109.7% of GDP this year, higher than at the end of World War II when we had abandoned all fiscal restraint to win an existential struggle against two expansionistic totalitarian empires.

The Senate instructions for the reconciliation bill say that only half **Exposure Presumptives** of it has to be paid for. Democrats will claim a dog's breakfast of purported savings and painless revenue increases, but the bulk of the new dollars will have to come from a tax increase that easily could rank as one of the biggest ever.

The parameters of the reconciliation bill were crafted by the socialist chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, Bernie Sanders, and it shows.

The priorities read like crib notes from his old presidential campaigns. The bill would add new government programs for the young and the old, from universal pre-K to tuition-free community college, to family and medical leave, to expansions of Obamacare and Medicare.

for Particulate Matter

The Department of Veterans Affairs has created a list of three presumptive conditions related to particulate matter exposure. Specifically, it will now cover asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis, but only if you served in a covered area and had one of those conditions within 10 years of leaving the military. Locations and dates of service are specific: Afghanistan, Djibouti, Syria and Uzbekistan during the Persian Gulf War, from Sept. 19, 2001 to the present: or the Southwest Asia theater of operations, from Aug. 2, 1990 to the present. It covers Iraq, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, the neutral zone between Iraq and Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Oman, the Gulf of Aden, the Gulf of Oman, the Persian Gulf, the Arabian Sea, Red Sea and the airspace above these locations. With particulate matter exposure, they're talking about the

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open burn pits, in which there might have been petroleum, munitions, plastics, metal, chemicals, medical and human waste and more. In some cases, however, the exposure was sand, sand and more sand, or smoke from oil-well fires, aircraft exhaust, dust, fuel ... the list goes on. August 17, 2021 **Historically Speaking** Oak Ridge's professional baseball teams – The Oak Ridge Bombers -Part 2

The last Historically Speaking column concluded amid Ted Yakimchick's column, SPEAKING of SPORTS. He had just chided a Knoxville sportswriter for his article covering the professional baseball team, the Oak Ridge Bombers. Now the Oak Ridge sportswriter turns his attention to the local fans and in no uncertain terms gives them much the same raking over the coals.

"Yak" concludes with, "Let this be said here and now: This column is standing behind the Bombers, lock, stock and barrel, come you-know-what and high water. The town needs a pro ball club it it's to take its place with other communities in the vicinity. Towns smaller than Oak Ridge have flourished with both professional and amateur ball."

"And while we're on our thoughts on the pro ball club, here's a suggestion to those self-interested individuals who think Oak Ridge should stick to amateur baseball only. Get off the dime, fellows. This town is bigger than you think it is. Stop riding and belittling the pro club. They deserve the same chance you've had for the past four years."

Obviously, there was tension between amateurs and professionals in Oak Ridge, huh.

In reading the research collected by Jack Bailey to help me prepare this story on Oak Ridge's professional baseball team, I also happened upon documentation of Oak Ridge's earliest ball team. It was a softball team.

The 1943 team sponsored by the USED Sunshine Fund was the first Oak Ridge team fielded and played in the Knoxville league. The abbreviation of the sponsor "USED" was used as if the author assumed this abbreviation needed no explanation. Unless it is the Special Engineer Detachment, I don't have a clue. Even then, what does the "U" stand for? Readers, do you have any idea?

Ted Yakimchick said the team was formed BEFORE the town was named Oak Ridge! He named the following players on that original USED softball team, "Members of the old team still at Oak ridge can be counted on one hand...Bill (Clem) Hatfield, now with AIT (I am sure that acronym meant something at the time), Benedict (Nature Boy) Rowland, now a Carbider, Frank Blakely, John Cardwell, and the writer..."

"Yak" went on to say, "That 1943 softball season definitely took its toll among the aforementioned Oak Ridgers. Hatfield hasn't played softball since then, having retired in favor of poker; Rowland has since taken to coaching girls' basketball teams; and Blakely, Cardwell and the author are barely holding up in slow pitch ball...time marches on!"

Now back to the first professional baseball team in Oak Ridge. The Bombers continued to struggle to gain scoreboard in deep right field, and the last time the Northey smash was seen it was beyond the board and still gaining altitude. Someone said the ball landed in the Clinch (river) just below the Elza railroad bridge" (Now, Jack Bailey observed that this little exaggeration amounted to a stretch of the home run distance of about two miles!)

There was another renowned home run hitter that Jack Bailey told me about when we were discussing Ron Northey. Like Ron Northey, this hitter was also a left-handed power hitter. However, he had a most unusual name, Bill "Swish" Nicholson. He was called "Swish" because of his habit of quickly swinging his bat just before the pitch.


Bye, Bye, Bombers

Another interesting note about the Bombers was the manager, Hobe Brummitt. He sparked the ire of fans and often seemed to be into it with the umpires. In Newport, fans threw pop bottles at him. It was said that none of the other teams' players or the other Mountain States League cities had any love for ole Hobe. He had been active in baseball for 25 years when he came to manage the Bombers.

An example of Hobe getting thrown out of the game, and then even out of the ballpark happened when Umpire "Red Russell was said to have "added color to the game" when in the seventh inning he ejected Bomber manager Hobe Brummitt from the ball game. The trouble all started when catcher Fernandez caught a pop foul and when relaying the ball to Pinky Doyle, dropped it. Umpire Russell made the decision that Fernandez dropped the ball, and the batter was not out. Russell tossed Brummitt off the playing field and later out of the park.

By June 9, 1948, barely three months after the team officially came to Oak Ridge, news had it that the Bombers, even while leading the league, might pull out of Oak Ridge because of "financial difficulties." Read that "low gate!" The largest audience to see them play was 800. Oak Ridge then had a population of 35,000 and was the largest city in the Mountain State League.

By June 10, 1948, while not yet officially revealed, the scuttlebutt on the street had it that the Bombers would be leaving Oak Ridge even before another home game. They were rumored to be transferring to Hazard, Kentucky, a town with a population of only 15,000.

When officially announced, Bombers President bob Broome explained, "Our gate receipts have been far below the minimum required to support a professional baseball team...and we felt justified in making this move."

Broome further commented that he knew the team would have a tough time in Oak Ridge as the amateur clique had tried hard to keep them out of Oak Ridge and also Oak Ridgers had a background of four years of free, or dirt cheap, at most, admissions to athletic events at Oak Ridge. So, he was not surprised that the effort to bring a professional baseball team to Oak Ridge had not succeeded in the long run.

Old "Yak" laid into Oak Ridgers in his column of June 18, 1948, when he said, "The plight of the Oak Ridge Bombers is a good example of what governmental subsidy leads to. The Bombers, as a free enterprise movement, can't compete with the Santa Claus parties the Government is sponsoring at Oak Ridge to keep the A-bomb makers contented. Perhaps if the baseball team remained at Oak Ridge, there would have come a government plan to pay the Oak Ridge 'fans' regular wages for nine innings and time and a half for all extra innings, and double time for Sunday games. Oak Ridgers then would fill the park."

Thus ended the first attempt to bring a professional baseball team to Oak Ridge, but it was tried again a few years later with a team named the Oak Ridge Pioneers...Ah, but that is yet another Historically Speaking story!

acceptance and fan support. A telling indicator of the typical Oak Ridge attitude that may even remain today is found in the following observation from a newspaper column, "Just out of curiosity we asked several dyed-in-the-wool baseball fans why Oak Ridgers weren't giving more support to the Bombers.

The answers all seemed to have the same ring, which indicated there might be more truth than fiction in 'em. Oak Ridgers, says the man in the bleacher, have had nearly everything they've wanted for practically nothing all these years, and when it comes time to pay for something for a change, they pull the zipper on the pocketbook." Insightful, huh!

On June 6, 1948, the Oak Ridge Times (having replaced the Oak Ridge Journal), reported on an unusual home run, "The fence surrounding Oakwood Park will now provide a yardstick for measuring the prodigiousness of home run clouts. To the best of our knowledge and memory, the most distant blow ever witnessed at the Oakwood lot came off the bat of Ron Northey, chunky ex-Philadelphia Phillie now with the St. Louis Cards, when he appeared with the Moore General Hospital team several years ago. There used to be a




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intended to be obedient and just forgot. Perhaps the temptation to immediately go out and play was just too great. Whatever the reason, I immediately went outside to play wearing my new suit.

Another benefit of my dad's new job was replacement of the old ice box with a new electric refrigerator. Remnants of the discarded ice box still lay just beyond the yard – there was no garbage pickup in our community, nor was there even a dump to take garbage to – it typically just piled up somewhere on the property.

Well, the old ice box laying just beyond the yard was great to hide behind when playing hide and seek, or "whoopy hide" as we called it. But, that old ice box had some sharp edges, just the right kind to really mess up a new suit. Sure enough, my playtime soon ended with a rather significant snag in my new suit. I had been caught in my act of disobedience.

My mother was not pleased at all! In retrospect, I think she was hurt more by the loss of the suit than she was by my



front porch in pain and bloodied until my parents came home, my sense of dread increasing by the moment as I wondered how I would face them in the light of my disobedience.



Look at this dessert! It's a Pavlova, named after legendary Russian ballerina Anna Pavlova after touring Australia and New Zealand in the 1920s. It's a texture lover's dream, with meringue that's crispy outside and marshmal-

Gradually add 1 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, beating continuously at medium-high speed until sugar is dissolved and stiff peaks form. (This will take about five minutes. At stiff peaks, the



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To serve — Whip the cream to soft peaks, adding 1 tablespoon sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Fill the center of the meringue with whipped cream and top with berries. Serve immediately, to great accolades.

For individual pavlovas — Follow the directions above but divide the meringue into 6 or 8 portions. Use a spoon to shape small circles with a dip in the center to hold toppings.

MERINGUE TIPS

— Make absolutely certain that no egg yolk gets into the whites, because any trace of fat prevents them from whipping up. Use metal or glass bowls, not plastic. Fresh eggs make better meringue. Choose a dry day to make your meringues, otherwise they'll suck up whatever moisture is in the air and never quite set up properly.

— You know those pasteurized egg whites sold in cartons? You can't make meringue with them. The heat of the pasteurization process damages the proteins of the egg, so they can't create the volume needed to make a stable meringue. Want to guess how I learned that?

No cream of tartar? No problem. Substitute an equal amount of lemon juice. Lemon juice is an acid and cream of tartar is an acidic byproduct from the process of making wine. Adding acid to the egg whites strengthens the egg foam and helps prevent collapsing.
While pavlova is guaranteed to impress, it's easy enough to make just because. And you deserve it.

- *4 egg whites, at room temperature*

meringue will look gorgeously glossy and hold sharp, distinct points if lifted with a spoon.) Add the vanilla and blend once more.

3. Spoon meringue onto the prepared cookie sheet, using the circle as your guide. Build up sides with the back of the spoon leaving a depression in the middle. Place in 300 F degree oven, and immediately reduce heat to 250 F. Bake for 60 minutes, then *without opening the oven*, turn the heat OFF and let it sit in the closed oven for another hour. Let cool. Carefully remove the meringue from the paper and place on a serving plate.



Romans 15

Romans (15:1-13) unity and Christ's example: after discussing the potential conflict between the weak and strong, it is only natural that Paul should emphasize the need for unity within the body of Christ. Clearly, the greater degree of responsibility will rest upon the stronger. They must divest themselves of any vestige of self-centeredness and help bear the infirmities of themselves of any vestige of self-centeredness and help bear the infirmities of the weak. The infirmities result from their lack of perception of the difference between essentials and nonessentials. Those who seek to put others first contribute to the building up of the church. Christ is the supreme example of subordinating himself to others, as reflected in Psalm 69:9; he suffered the consequences of humanity's hostility toward God. Can we not, to a far lesser degree, suffer inconveniences for other (v. 3).

While the Old Testament law was cancelled by the death of Christ, there still are hundreds of valuable lessons to be learned from that library of sacred literature. In fact, those things were written for our learning that through those examples we might develop endurance. Additionally; through the comfort of the Scriptures, we embrace a greater sense of hope (v. 4). God himself is most patient with us, and from that we ought to gain comfort, thus being patient with one another according to the will and example of Christ (v. 5). It is tremendously important that Christians operate with a united front, speaking the same thing, that God may be glorified. Therefore, receive each other just as Christ received you (v. 6-7).

Jesus did not come for one segment of the human family to the exclusion of the other. He came to serve the Jews, thus fulfilling God's promise to the fathers, and likewise to the Gentiles, that they might glorify God for his mercy (v. 8-9). Four citations from the Old Testament---two from Psalms, one from Deuter-onomy, one from Isaiah---are cited to show that this unity was to find its fruition in the church of Jesus Christ (v. 9-12). The absurd notion that these texts must await their fulfillment in the so-called "millennial reign" of Christ is utterly without support and would have had no compelling force in Paul's plea. "May the God of hope fill you with joy and peace by your faith (which comes by listening to his word) (10:17) as you, by this means, are empowered by the Holy Spirit."

(Romans 15:14-21) Paul's reason for writing: as emphasized earlier (1:8), the Christians in Rome had a wonderful, widely acclaimed reputation throughout the empire. Paul, therefore, had confidence in them as godly people. He believes they are "good" (prone to kindness) and "knowledgeable" (skilled in Christian graces), and therefore are qualified to admonish one another---likely toward unity in the Lord. Paul writes with the authority of an apostle but with the heart of a brother in Christ, a partaker of the same grace both shared. He reminds them of their common bond and of his divinely appointed ministry of bringing the gospel of God to the Gentiles. He draws the picture of a priest offering sacrifice to God (v. 16,). He hopes his work among the Gentiles is accepted since they have been "sanctified" by the Holy Spirit, by means of the gospel and their response to the same (Eph. 5:26). Paul gives glory to God for his role in ministry in word and work (v. 18), both of which were empowered by the Holy Spirit by means of signs and wonders (v. 19), His ministry had spanned from Jerusalem in the east to Illyricum (formerly Yugoslavia) in the west---some fourteen hundred miles. In this region he had "fully" proclaimed the gospel, attempting to focus his efforts where others had not preached. He was a trail-blazer, not a trail-follower (v.20).

Paul quoted from a messianic portion of Isaiah (52:15). It speaks of the Gentiles who had not been exposed to a direct preparation for the coming Messiah, as the Jews had. Later, however, through his ministry in particular, they were able to "see" and to "understand." Two important points: (a) Understanding is necessary for the reception of the gospel (Jn. 6:44-45; Mk. 16:15-16). (b) Isaiah's prophecy points to the Gentiles' acceptance of the gospel in the Christian age, not to the Lord's Second Coming (as some speculate).

Romans 15:22-29) travel plans: Paul had wanted to visit the Roman saints many times but had been hindered. Since he had so thoroughly evangelized the region mentioned above, he proposed a journey to Spain. En route he would plan to stop in Rome. These saints would refresh his soul by their zeal, and perhaps even help him financially on his further missionary travels (v.24; Tit. 3:1-3). But before he could come, he must complete his trip to Jerusalem from where he was in Greece (Acts 20:2). He was conveying a contribution from churches in Macedonia and Achaia to the poor among the Jerusalem saints (v. 25-26). Little did he realize that from the time of this letter until his arrival in Rome, it would be some four years, and the trip would not be without great difficulty. He would visit them bound with a "chain" (Acts 28:20).

The mostly Gentile saints in Achaia and Macedonia had taken pleasure in sending this gift, for they felt under obligation to their Jewish brothers for the gospel. They had been spiritually blessed; it was but a small matter to return the favor with material support (v.27). When this task was accomplished, he would travel on to Spain and likewise visit with them. He was confident that in so doing he would be richly blessed by Jesus (v. 28-29). The trip from Corinth, eastward to Jerusalem, and then from Jerusalem back westward, and finally on to Spain, would involve about three thousand miles. The tough apostle was a tireless traveler. We complain about four or five-hour jet flight!

(Romans 15:30-33) a request for prayers: Paul believed in the power of prayer---his own and those of his brothers in Christ--for he urged his fellow saints to "agonize" with him in prayer, be motivated by their faith in Christ and love of the Spirit. Surely these words cannot be read without thinking of the Holy Spirit as a personality! The apostle's prayer had a three-fold thrust: (a) that he might be delivered from the "disobedient" Jews in Judaea; (b) that this contribution he was bringing from Gentile Christians would be graciously received by the Jewish saints in Jerusalem---a potentially stressful situation; (c) that his desire to come to Rome would be granted by the will of God, and that together they would have time for "rest."

In the apostle's case: (a) He was delivered from the disobedi-

this matter (v.17). There is no direct operation of the Spirit in the sanctification process.

While others are worthy of praise for their work on behalf of Christ, for his present purpose he will discuss only matters pertaining to himself. Note again that the Gentiles' acceptance by God depended upon their obedience, as motivated by Paul's

Column IRS Error In Recent Notice

update from the Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS). The letters were sent to inform people of corrections the IRS made to their tax returns. However, the IRS did not inform taxpayers that they only have 60 days to dispute the error in question.

The IRS has sent about 5 million "math

error notices" that neglected to inform peo-

ple of their full legal rights, according to an

"Omission of this critical piece of information was beyond just bad customer service; it was a clear infringement of a taxpayer's right to be informed and right to a fair and just tax system," the TAS wrote in a blog post.

According to the TAS, the faulty letters were issued to people who claimed the Recovery Rebate Credit on their tax returns. The credit was for people who didn't get their first or second stimulus checks, or the full amount they were allowed. The credit enabled them to claim missed amounts of stimulus on their returns and receive them as part of a tax refund. Many people were mistaken about the amount of stimulus they had previously received. Consequently, there were many returns with math errors.

If you received a math error notice from the IRS, you have a right to dispute it within 60 days. An automatic abatement can be requested, during which time the IRS must reassess its correction. It's extremely important that people are made aware of the 60-day window.

The notices sent regarding the math errors are either a CP11 Notice or a CP12 Notice. These notices do not even include the

If you read the news, you know there are serious questions about how well the vaccines we're been taking actually protect against COVID. Especially worrisome is the protection they offer against the Delta variant that's sweeping the world. Those in authority seem to be flipping a coin each day, depending on who you listen to. Some days we can throw caution to the wind and go about our business, and other days we need to continue to beware. There's talk of going back to the indoor mask mandates, and that's likely one step away from again limiting the number of people allowed in

stores at one time, or so I imagine. If those things happen, it won't be like it was in March 2020. Back then we were all scared to death. We'd spread out in the grocery aisles, staying far away from other people. We wore that mask at all times when out and about, and we respected all those 6-foot markers on the floor. We certainly didn't sit down at a restaurant table for four and take off our masks, or head to the gym.

Now, having lived through that whole horrible year, people are tired of it all, and we're eager for a normal life. We think that because so many people have had the vaccination, that surely we'll be safe. I fear that this time, however, if the mask mandates come again, it will be even more dangerous than it was last year, because we've gotten too casual, careless and passive about our safety. My short to-do list involves buying new masks and more hand sanitizer, renewing my grocery curbside pickup account ... and saying no to an invitation to join a dance group. How about you? Are you ready for what's likely coming?

term "math error" on them. Consequently, they are confusing to many taxpayers.

Fortunately, the IRS is giving people who received a faulty letter more time to respond. According to the TAS, the IRS will send supplemental notices to affected taxpayers and start the 60-day window over again with the new notices.

Keep in mind that even though the IRS should have informed people of the 60-day window, you will still need to resolve issues on the math error notices. If the IRS made an error with the credit, you will still need to provide documentation to prove your eligibility.

The IRS makes mistakes. If you are eligible to receive the credit with your refund, and it was denied by the IRS, you should consider your options. The options are too complex for this article. However, more information can be found about resolving your issue at the Taxpayer Advocate Service website, or you can contact a qualified tax professional.

Keith Henry led the Coalfield football program for thirteen years, with his brother Jared serving as offensive coordinator for a couple of years before becoming defensive coordinator. During that time, the Jackets achieved 115 wins with only 48 losses for a .706 winning percentage. This is second only to the .778 record of Coach Pat Cotter, who coached only one season in 1962.

Napier is a product of the Coalfield program, where he was honored as 2013 defensive lineman of the year for District 4A and named to the 2013 All-State Team for Class A. Napier's Coalfield teams won three District 4A championships and were three-time State Semifinalists. As a testimony to his toughness, Benson started in all 51 of his career games at Coalfield. After being red-shirted during his freshman year at the University of Tennessee by Coach Butch Jones, Napier transferred to Tusculum University where he had a highly successful career as an offensive lineman. Benson started in every game for the Tusculum Pioneers for four years – a

Napier's performance on the field was matched by his performance in the classroom – he maintained a 3.35 cumulative GPA while majoring in math and was named to the National Football Federation's Hampshire Honor Society.

Napier will celebrate his 26th birthday just five days before the season opener with Wartburg. Coupled with the loss of some key players to graduation, being one the youngest and least experienced head coaches in the entire area presents Napier with a tough challenge as he strives to keep the Yellow Jacket program on track.
