

Strategy for substantially increasing your cruise deduction

In 1982, the tax law limited the amount of deductions for cruise ship conventions and meetings. Additionally, there were several other limitations. However, you will learn that there is a way for you to avoid the strict rules and limited amount of deductions.

It is important to know the cruise ship deduction rules. The amount of the deduction is limited to \$2,000 a year. This includes

the cost of the cruise, convention, and travel to get to the cruise port.

The law requires that you attach a signed statement to your tax return. The statement must include your total days on the cruise ship, the hours you devoted to the business activity and the program of the scheduled activities.

To make matters worse, you need to attach to your return a written statement signed by an officer of the sponsoring organization, the daily schedule of business activity and the hours you attended.

The ship must sail under the U.S. flag, and the ports of call are required to be in the United States or its possession.

Fortunately, there is a way to avoid the \$2,000 limit and take a cruise on the ship and the destination you want. This is how it works:

Take a cruise and have a four-hour meeting on land at the last port of call. If the meeting lasts for four hours, the day qualifies as a business day. The days spent traveling from your home to the meeting and the days traveling home after the meeting are travel days. The travel days qualify as business days. Con-

Christmas Dinner in a Parking Lot

My senior center is going to hold its annual Christmas dinner outdoors in the parking lot. If that doesn't bring a tear to your eye about the sad state of our world now, nothing will.

Santa will arrive by limo behind the fire truck, we're told, and will make his rounds through the tables set up across the asphalt, little elves at his elbow passing out presents. Students from the high school choir will sing while others from the culinary arts classes (they'll get extra credit) will hustle the food and drinks outside and serve it. Parking will be wherever you find it around the neighborhood.

In the middle of December? In New England?
Why, some of us wanted to know, did they not simply use

the town's rec center? That large space would allow the tables to be spread out, with plenty of parking right outside the door. Best of all, it's indoors where there's heat. But no, they decreed, the dinner has to be next to the senior center where the kitchen is.

A poll of friends indicates a mixed review of this whole idea. One laughed and said no, he absolutely would not be there. Another said he'd been recruited to set up tables and bring the decorated tree outside, hoping he can find an extension cord long enough to plug in the lights. One adventurous soul decided she will indeed be there, wearing a down comforter over her winter coat, which will be over several other layers of clothing, including snow pants. (She's also bringing a Thermos of hot coffee and is practicing eating while wearing gloves.)

One only hopes someone has put the town plowtruck driver on notice. He might be called upon to plow out the parking lot that day before the dinner.

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sequently, every day of your trip would be a business day and would be deductible.

By taking the cruise ship to the business meeting and having the meeting on land in the tax-law-defined North American area, you can deduct the entire cost of the convention. This includes the cost of transportation to the cruise port and the cost of the cruise if it is less than the daily luxury water limits. The daily limit is more than the typical cruise ship cost, and you can find the information by googling "daily luxury water limits."

The tax-law-defined North American area includes over 30 islands and countries. You can google "tax-law-defined North American area" to find all the locations.

For example, you could use this strategy to fly from your home to Miami and stay overnight. Then take a seven-day roundtrip cruise to a Caribbean Island and have a business meeting with your business associates or employees on the last island. Since the meeting is on land, you are not limited to a U.S possession. If the food is included in the cruise price, you can deduct the entire cost of the cruise. This allows you to deduct the entire cost of the travel, meeting and the cost of the cruise.

This strategy eliminates the \$2,000 limit, excessive IRS paperwork requirements, and limited possibilities imposed by the U.S. cruise ship requirement. Fortunately, you can use this strategy to choose any cruise ship and go to destinations in over 30 locations.

Your Career Questions: Final



This week's question comes from Teresa in Wartburg, TN: Should I send a thank you letter after my job interview?

When it comes to the topic of job interviewing, most publications—whether books, articles, or newspapers—highly recommend you send a "thank you" note afterwards. There is normally a specified time frame each author suggests for taking this step after the interview has ended. Some experts are adamant it should be right after the interview, others have stated you have a maximum of a 24-hour window, and some often argue that it's reasonable to take up to 48 hours to send a note.

I would argue that 48 hours seems a bit too long and right after isn't always feasible. The Hot Seat generally recommends sending the note within a 12-hour time frame. Why? Technology controls most of our lives today. Most smartphones are equipped with email features. You can easily submit a "thank you" email right after the interview via your phone, tablet, or a laptop. Just do it and get it over with. Besides, the longer you procrastinate, the greater the chance of forgetting to email it at all. I would send a note the day of the interview or later that evening. This effort is one more thing that sets you apart from


your competition. A prompt "thank you" note may show the hiring manager you're excited about the position and enjoyed the conversation.

Compose a handwritten "thank you" after the interview. I always write both an email communication within a 12-hour window and a handwritten thank you note.

Have a blank thank you card with you and fill it out immediately after the job interview. The hand-written note doesn't need to be a novel. A paragraph or two will completely suffice. Your detailed letter will be composed and sent via email. A common excuse I hear is, "but my handwriting is terrible". Well, my own handwriting looks like chicken scratch from a one-legged bird. It's absolutely terrible! That's no excuse for me not to leave a handwritten note for the hiring manager. My handwriting is still terrible, but I can take my time to make it look as legible as possible. With handwritten notes, the gen-

eral rule of thumb is that it's like the bad Christmas present Aunt Kathy gives you each year: it's the thought that counts.

Not many people write notes nowadays, which makes them even more distinctive. The best place to leave the handwritten note is underneath the meeting room door after the interview, with a receptionist, or someone who can be



There are several thank you letter templates and examples floating around on the Web. While these boring pre-formatted, unoriginal examples are readily available, your note still needs to be customized to you, the job, and the interview that took place. It doesn't need to be a cookie cutter note you copy and paste. Do you think the interviewer has seen that same template before? Do you want to give the impression that you are sloppy, lazy, or uninterested in thanking the interviewer for their precious time? Make sure you customize your thank you email after the job interview.

see. He served in the 2d Battalion, 11th Marines, 1st Marine Division as a U.S. Navy Corpsmen. His rank was Hospital Corpsman Second Class.

David won a University of Tennessee Alumni Scholarship and attended classes from 1963-1966. He joined the U.S. Navy in 1966 and attended the Naval Hospital Corps School in San Diego. Ray served aboard the U.S.S. Haven. He requested a tour with the Fleet Marine Force and went to Camp Pendleton for Battlefield training. He was sent to Vietnam with the Marine Division in 1968. Bobby Ray Memorial Elementary School in McMinnville named in his honor. The U.S.S. David R. Ray, commissioned in 1977, is now in the mothball fleet in the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard.

Below is his Medal of Honor citation.

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a HC2c. with Battery D, 2d Battalion, at Phu Loc 6, near An Hoa. During the early morning hours, an estimated battalion-sized enemy force launched a determined assault against the battery's position and succeeded in effecting a penetration of the barbed-wire perimeter. The initial burst of enemy fire caused numerous casualties

among the Marines who had immediately manned their howitzers during the rocket and mortar attack. Undaunted by the intense hostile fire, HC2c. Ray moved from parapet to parapet, rendering emergency medical treatment to the wounded. Although seriously wounded himself while administering first aid

> to a Marine casualty, he refused medical aid and continued his lifesaving efforts. While he was bandaging and attempting to comfort another wounded Marine, HC2c. Ray was forced to battle two enemy soldiers who attacked his position, personally killing one and wounding the other. Rapidly losing his strength as a result of his severe wounds, he nonetheless managed to move through the hail of enemy fire to other casualties. Once again, he was faced with the intense fire of oncoming enemy troops and, despite the grave personal danger and insurmountable odds, succeeded in treating the wounded and holding off the enemy until he ran out of ammunition, at which time he sustained fatal wounds. HC2c. Ray's final act of heroism was to protect the patient he was treating. He threw himself upon the wounded Marine, thus saving the man's life when an enemy

grenade exploded nearby. By his determined and persevering actions, courageous spirit, and selfless devotion to the welfare of his Marine comrades, HC2c. Ray served to inspire the men of Battery D to heroic efforts in defeating the enemy. His conduct throughout was in keeping with the finest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.


I must go on. It won't be easy but I've faced many hardships in my life. Pray for Robin, for me and the family.

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

Joe Biden's Incredible Shrinking Presidency

Joe Biden was never exactly a colossus bestriding the Earth, but he's been getting smaller by the day.

A Washington Post poll over the weekend suggested that his presidency is, for now, a smoking political crater. It had him at a 41% approval rating, despite the passage of his long-sought infrastructure bill that was supposed to buoy him and his party.

Even more striking, the survey found that Republicans lead Democrats on the generic congressional ballot by 10 points, 51% to 41%, an unprecedentedly strong showing for the GOP that forecasts an earthquake, tsunami, and maybe a few more natural disasters for Democrats come next fall.

And who can be surprised? Biden is stumbling, out of touch, and weak. Two of his major initiatives, at the border and in Afghanistan, created completely avoidable catastrophes. He has given no sense of being in control of events or even his own party. He is an accidental president who is running smack into his own inadequacies and absurd pretensions.

No one in Washington over the last four decades ever said that Joe Biden was just the man with the foresight, wisdom and deft political touch to lead the free world.

No, he was an average senatorial bloviator whose first two presidential campaigns flamed out in embarrassing fashion, before he hit the jackpot when Barack Obama choose him as his running mate in 2008.

Showing the advantage of hanging around for a very long time, Biden won both the 2020 Democratic nomination and the presidency by default. In the primaries, the former vice president looked good in comparison to Bernie Sanders, and he ran in the general on not being Donald Trump.

Now, Biden is allied with Bernie Sanders, who helped write the first version of his Build Back Better plan, and Donald Trump no longer looms as large as Biden's foil.

The best case for Biden's presidency was that he could be a kind of consensus caretaker -- restoring a sense of normality and maintaining a low profile while riding in the slipstream of improving economic conditions and a diminishing pandemic.

Instead, he's been carried along by the left-wing tide of his party and repeatedly engaged in unconstitutional executive overreach. On top of it all, he's brought his own brand of incompetence, exemplified by the botched pull-out from Afghanistan.

His foremost mistake was overestimating an attenuated electoral mandate for pedestrian governance as a permission slip for passing nearly the entirety of the progressive agenda in the space of less than a year

Not only has there been sticker shock over the price tag of the Biden agenda, but it has little connection to things people truly care about. The infrastructure bill polls well, but no one goes about their daily lives worried about the alleged crisis of crumbling bridges and tunnels.

Meanwhile, the Build Back Better bill started as a \$3.5 trillion grab bag of everything that progressives want but couldn't get in the infrastructure bill. Passing as much spending as you possibly can before you lose Congress a year from now, which is essentially the rationale behind Build Back Better, is not a compelling reason for a historic spate of federal spending.

That legislation has been pared down to largely a child care and climate change bill. That's an unnatural pairing that came about not because those are the top two things that the public wants from Washington, but because they happen to be what Democrats think they can pass.

Only now is the White House trying to argue that the infrastructure bill and Build Back Better will address real public concerns, namely the supply chain disruptions and the inflation that is outpacing wage growth. This is clearly a tendentious, after-the-fact argument.

The White House can hope that the supply chain bottlenecks ease and inflation declines, but Biden's disastrous first year speaks to a more intractable problem with the lackluster occupant of the Oval Office himself.

Twist, Shape and Bake Healthy Bread Bears

Baking bread is just plain fun when your preschoolers shape prepared dough into adorable bear shapes. Toss in simple math along the way too, as your pint-size bakers divide the dough into halves, fourths and even sixths to form the bear's arms, legs and snout. They'll watch the dough rise before their eyes, and they'll love "painting" the bears with an egg wash before you pop them in the oven.

Serve them warm, drizzled with some honey from a little pot for a memorable afternoon treat.

Ingredients for two 8-inch-tall bears: One loaf of prepared frozen breach

- One loaf of prepared frozen bread
- 1 egg, beaten with 1 tablespoon of water
- Raisins
- Honey (optional)

Here's the fun:

- 1. Thaw the loaf of frozen bread dough for two 8-inch-tall bears. Use it while it is still cold.
- 2. Cut the loaf in half. Set one of the halves aside for a few minutes while you form the first bear.
- 3. Cut the dough into two even pieces, and let your child roll one of the pieces into a ball with his hands. Set it on a large, greased cookie sheet for the body. Press it down to flatten slightly.
- 4. Cut the other piece in half. Roll one of the halves into a ball for the head and place it above the body. You may need to pinch the two parts together.

- 5. Pick off a small bit from the remaining piece for the snout. Cut the rest into six even pieces. Roll all seven small pieces into balls. Place a ball on the face for the snout, two ears at the top of the head, 2 arms at the sides of the body, and 2 legs to the bottom of the body.
- 6. Make tiny slits in the dough and insert raisins for eyes and for a belly button. Repeat steps for second bear.



Preschoolers can learn fractions while they help make these bread bears.

- 7. Let them rise, covered with a damp towel or plastic wrap, for about 45 minutes in a warm place until doubled in size.
- 8. Remove covering and brush some egg mixture on top of the bears. Bake at 350 F for 25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on a cooling rack.
- TIP: Make several bears, and dress them up with thin ribbons tied around their necks. Set in a basket as treats at a teddy bear party.

New Hires to Process VA

Claims Backlog

The Department of Veterans Affairs has hired 2,000 claims processors to deal with the claims backlog. They're going to be busy, once they're trained.

As of early October, the VA was sitting on over 200,000 backlogged claims, meaning that of the 600,000 claims in hand, one-third were over 125 days old. In addition, they have now found more than 70,000 claims that must be reviewed after three new presumptives were added for Agent Orange exposure, bringing the total to 270,000 backlogged claims.


The three new presumptives -- Parkinsonism, bladder cancer and hypothyroidism -- have been added to more than a dozen existing ones. Those three conditions had never been approved as presumptives, but now that they are, we have the Nehmer lawsuit of 1986 to thank for the need to review those claims. Nehmer concluded that

if you ever filed and were turned down for illnesses that later made the accepted list of presumptives, the VA is automatically required to go back and review your claim. The bonus here is that any disability pay you receive now will be retroactive to the date of your original claim.

You don't have to refile, but as a precaution, check in with the VA and make sure it didn't lose your original claim. Be certain you're among those whose claim is being looked at. In addition, there are three new presumptives for airborne particulate exposure -- asthma, rhinitis and sinusitis -- for those who served in the Gulf during a certain period of time. If you've already put in a claim, it will be reviewed.

If you want to keep an eye on how the new claims processors are doing, check www. benefits.va.gov/reports/detailed_claims_data.asp for weekly reports. Note the accuracy-level reports. Those are worrying. Again, don't assume the new processors are reviewing your old claim. Call and find out.





The History Channel

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Historically Speaking David Hall Cabin and Charlie Monday – Dowser Extraordinaire!

On a Saturday, I was invited by Libby Bumgardner to come to an open house at the David Hall Cabin, built in 1799. This home of the legendary Revolutionary War soldier is being well preserved by loving hands and is a virtual showplace of the early history of our area.

The cabin is in Claxton just east of the Tennessee Valley Authority's Bull Run Steam Plant and is on the route of the earliest road in this area, the Emery Road. This earliest road runs through Oak Ridge by way of the Emory Valley Road and a later addition to

the road, the concrete and rock bridge just east of the Midtown Community Center. There is a historic marker near the bridge.

On this Saturday, I accepted Libby's kind invitation not knowing what to expect but knowing I would be pleasantly surprised by what she had planned for the day. Libby and Harry Bumgardner have devoted an enormous amount of energy and attention to detail to make this uniquely historic group of cabins a memorable place to visit. Two additional cabins have been moved and reconstructed on the site of the original authentic David Hall cabin.

They have even added an "outhouse." As might be expected of Harry, the outhouse is not your usual outdoor pit toilet covered with a small wooden structure with a door and a plank seat Swamp Bugger, made from a whitetail deer skin with a hole in it. No, this "outhouse" is (Photo Submitted) equipped with ALL the modern conveniences of an indoor bathroom.

The commode and sink are modern porcelain fixtures. The impact of seeing those unexpected items there makes one smile when they open the authentic (from the exterior) wooden outhouse door and amazingly get to use a modern flushing toilet bathroom with a modern sink and real soft toilet tissue.

But the most amazing thing Libby had arranged that day might well have been the visiting displays that had been set up in the yard of the historic set of cabins. One of the people putting on a display of their wares was David Dodd of Roane County who had several pieces of leather hides on display as well as some knives and other unusual items.

One of the items David had on display was called a "Swamp Bugger." This is a taxidermist's idea of a joke...it is the whitetail of a deer with a set of teeth, mouth and throat of a small animal molded into position to make the whole thing look exactly like what you would think a "swamp bugger" might look like.

However, the thing that caught and kept my attention for several hours was Charlie Monday, Dowser Extraordinaire. Amazing is all it can say about what Charlie showed me.

Now, I have known of the practice of "dowsing" or "divining" for underground water streams. I had heard of that all my life and had no doubt that there was something to it. I just had never had the opportunity to try it out myself, or to even see someone who was a practitioner do their thing.

Well, on this occasion I sure got to experience dowsing. When I arrived at the David Hall cabin, I first saw Charlie Monday as he had set up his table close to the parking area where foot traffic would come right by his table on their way to the cabins.

I stopped and Charlie immediately engaged me in conversation about dowsing. I admitted I knew little about it but thought there must be something to it. His reaction was gleeful as I am sure he knew he had found a kindred spirit.

Charlie began by tossing a quarter on the ground and then showing me that by using a set of two metal wires (I later found out they were simply insulation keeping wires like one would use to hold fiberglass insulation up between rafters), he could easily locate the quarter. When he passed over the quarter the wires crossed. When he arrived exactly on top of the quarter, the wires were parallel in the opposite direction. He could look down between the wires at the location of the quarter.

He then took a forked willow stick and did the same thing. Charlie then asked me if I wanted to try my luck. I said, "Yes" and soon was holding the forked stick as he instructed me (palms up and stick horizon-

tal). Nothing happened! I walked over that quarter several times and the stick just stayed where it was as dumb as could be.

Charlie then said, "Why don't you try the metal wires? I find that only a few people can dowse using forked sticks, however, a much larger percentage of the population can use the wires." I tried the wires by holding them loosely in my hands and balancing them out from me horizontally. Immediately upon moving over the quarter, the wires crossed, just as they had for Charlie.

I remember well the sensation of feeling those wires move involuntarily to cross above the quarter. Amazing is all I can say. I wondered aloud why witching for quarters worked and what did that have to do with dowsing for water. Charlie patiently explained it to

The wires can find any metal object as well as a stream of water beneath the ground. Okay, I decided to just accept it. I still don't see the connection. But I was to experience even more amazing things with the dowsing wires.

Charlie then pitched a penny on the ground about eight feet from the quarter. He proceeded to show me the wires could locate the penny as well as the quarter. Then he did the most unusual thing. He walked straight between the two coins and said aloud "Find the quarter, find the quarter" and son-of-a-gun, those two wires moved to point to the quarter.

He then repeated the same procedure for the penny - it worked the same. Finally he closed his eyes and walking between the two coins Charlie said, "Find them both, find them both" and those fool wires pointed in two directions one toward the quarter and one toward the penny.

Then he really took a leap of faith. He asked me to do the same thing. I did. It worked, I don't have a clue how, but it worked...and not just once but every time I attempted it. I wonder if I might have influenced the wires unconsciously.

> Next Charlie told me they had found a stream of water nearby. Of course, I wanted to see the dowsing work on underground water, so I asked him to show me what he had found. The most amazing thing of the day happened then. Not only did he identify the stream, the width of it and the direction of flow, he determined the depth - 90 to 100 feet!

The method for determining the depth was to place a large metal nut (about the size of a lug nut for a car wheel) on a coat hanger and hold it in an arched manner over the water's location and grip it tightly. Within seconds, the nut started to swing the coat hanger up and down...getting to upwards of a 10-inch swing, and continued to oscillate up and down for exactly 100 times and then just stopped.

Charlie then handed the rig to another person who held it over the water's location and lo and behold, the apparatus started again to oscillate up and down for exactly 100 times and then stopped. Now, that is amazing to me! Charlie claimed the water was at 90 - 100 feet underground. He says he has never missed on a well that has been drilled based on his dowsing. He has successfully dowsed six wells, all struck water within 10% of the depth he indicated.

Are you beginning to get the idea? Some amazing things being done here! Now for the even more unbelievable part...he dowses graves to find where people are buried in unmarked graves. He says this is a standard approach used by undertakers to assure they do not dig into an unmarked grave when burying someone.

Charlie says he can not only locate the graves (even infant graves) he can tell the exact dimensions of the grave and can tell whether the person buried there is a man or woman. That makes no sense to me.

Now, if you have already shaped two wires and are trying this yourself, and, if the wires are crossing over the coins for you, then try this. Check a table with the wires by moving them over it and assuring that they do not cross.

Then press your thumb into the tabletop to leave a thumbprint there and again move the wires over that spot...do they now cross over that spot? I find this most odd, but it works for me. Again, I believe I must be causing it. Maybe it is like the tendency to be hypnotized. Some folks are more readily influenced through suggestion to become hypnotized.

Charlie Monday has been featured on Channel 8, WKXT TV, The Tennessee Traveler with Alan Williams several years back. Charlie was also in Pigeon Forge, TN demonstrating his dowsing ability.

So, what if we could buy an extra ingredient while doing our last-minute shopping that will transform these anticipated leftovers and make them even better? Something beyond the usual soup and sandwich (no offense to any sandwiches or soups reading this). Something like pie dough or puff pastry.

You know that perfect Thanksgiving bite where you load up your fork with turkey, potatoes, stuffing and cranberry? Well, I think it's even better when it's wrapped in a buttery, flaky crust. See how I am?

THANKSGIVING HAND PIES *Yield:* 12 mini-pies *Time:* 45 minutes

- 1 package (two 9-inch) pie crust, or homemade equivalent
- 1/2 cup diced turkey
- 1/2 cup mashed potatoes
- 1/2 cup stuffing
- 1/4 cup sweet potatoes or carrots
- 1/4 cup cranberry sauce
 - 1 egg
 - Gravy for dipping*
- 1. Preheat oven to 375 F. Cover a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. Thinly roll out the pie dough and cut into desired size circles. (I used a
 - 4-inch cookie cutter.)
 - 3. Using a teaspoon measure, place a small amount of each ingredient on one half of the round, being sure to leave about 1/4 inch clear on the outer edges. Fold each dough circle over to cover the filling, pressing around the edges with your finger, letting out as much air as possible. Use the tines of a fork to seal the edges. Place on baking sheet.
 - 4. Whisk the egg in a small bowl with a teaspoon of water and brush the tops

of the pies with the egg wash.

5. Poke the tops with a fork to vent steam. Bake for 30 minutes or until crust is golden and irresistible. Serve with gravy for dipping.

THANKSGIVING POT PIES Yield: 6 pies Time: 50 minutes

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour

- 2 cups whole milk
- 2 cups cooked turkey, diced
- 3 cups assorted leftover Thanksgiving veggies
- 1 sheet frozen puff pastry (from a 17.3-ounce package), thawed
- 1 egg
- 1. Preheat oven to 375 F. Grease six (12-ounce) ramekins or bowls, place on a rimmed baking sheet.
- 2. Heat butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, 5 to 7 minutes. Add poultry seasoning and stir. Sprinkle flour over onion and cook, stirring, 1 minute. Slowly stir in milk.
- 3. Bring to a simmer; cook, stirring constantly, until thick and bubbly, 2 to 3 minutes. Stir in turkey and your choice of leftover veggies. Season with salt and pepper. Ladle into prepared ramekins, let cool.
- 4. Roll out thawed puff pastry on a floured surface to a 1/4-inch thickness. Cut out six circles, or squares, that are 1-inch larger than ramekins or bowls being used. Top each ramekin with puff pastry, crimping edges over sides to seal.
- 5. Beat the egg with a teaspoon of water or milk. Brush the pastry with egg. Bake until puffed and golden brown, 20 to 25 minutes.

So, to reprise, if you pick up a package of pie crusts or puff pastry, you can make perfectly portioned pot pies or palate-pleasing portable hand pies. Happy Thanksgiving leftovers from Divas On a Dime!

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1 Corinthians: Chapter 11:17-34

(1 Cor. 11:17-22) Problems with the Lord's Supper: This section begins a marked contrast in tone: Compare "I praise you" (v. 2) with "I praise you not" (v. 17). The former involved a misunderstanding in church decorum; the latter addressed a haughty, self-centered, factious spirit. Their "coming together" for the Lord's supper was seriously marred. The assemblies were tarnished by divisions (Rom. 16:17). Paul had censured party loyalties earlier (1:10), now he focuses on assembly dissensions. While heretical schisms are most unfortunate, at least one advantage results---those approved of God become "manifest," apparent. The "cream" does rise to the top (v. 19).

In a factious environment "it is not possible" to assemble in peace and partake of the communion supper in the tranquil mode God expects. Selfish ambition and elitism segmented these saints. What should have been a simple memorial service reflecting upon the Savior's death had become a common meal during which social classes had been segregated, resulting in some being left hungry while others were gorged (v. 20-21; 33-34). It was the opposite of the spirit of brotherhood unity. Their assemblies had abandoned the original purpose. It was a circumstance that did not justify praise, but rebuke (v. 22).

(1 Cor. 11:23-26) The communion as designed: The apostle's instruction regarding the communion supper had been received from the Lord (by inspired revelation). Jesus had instituted the communion celebration on the night of his betrayal. He had taken bread, given thanks, and distributed it, stating: "This is (a metaphor---this represents') my body, which is (about to be) sacrificed for you. This do (a command) in remembrance of me" (v. 24). "Remembrance" implies that when the supper was later engaged in the church assembly, Jesus would not literally be there (contra the dogma of transubstantiation). The phrase, "as often as," does not signify that the communion is an option rather than an obligation; the point of emphasis is consistency in purpose. Subsequently, he took the "cup" (its contents) and instructed them to divide it among themselves (Lk. 22:17), stating that this was a symbol of the "new covenant" involving the shedding of his blood for the remission of sins (Mt. 26:28). By this sacred ceremony Christians proclaim their confidence in the efficacy of Jesus' death until his return (v. 26). It was not a temporal institution, it is to continue every first day of the week until Christ comes (Acts 20:7).

(1 Cor. 11:27-32) The consequence of corrupt worship: A severe warning is placed upon any who would engage in the

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communion supper "in an unworthy manner"---whether it be divisively, frivolously, inattentively, or capriciously. To do so is to be "guilty of the body and the blood of the Lord" (Heb. 10:29), a thought that should strike a note of terror in the hearts of some church members. Each person should "test" himself as whether his mental disposition accommodates this august act (v. 28). One who despises the person across the room, or who can't wait for an afternoon sports event, is light years from truth. To eat and drink without "discernment" of "the body" is to subject oneself to "judgment." or condemnation (v. 29).

Some consider the "body" a reference to the church. More likely it alludes to not properly reflecting upon the significance of the Savior's body as symbolized by the bread, the turning of the communion into a social feast instead of a memorial. In addition, Calvinists uniformly reject the idea that the "judgment" can be eternal judgment (yet see v. 27; Heb. 10:30). Many commentators see literal death visited upon the worldly Corinthians as temporal judgments for disciplinary purposes. To "sleep" (to literally die) in sin is hardly a disciplinary procedure. There is no postmortem salvation!

Consequently, if God's people would take inventory of their spiritual condition and correct their conduct, they would not be subjected to Heaven's judgmental wrath. If we do not attend to our soul problems, the Lord may chasten us (Heb. 12:10) to nudge us in the right direction that we may not be "condemned with the world" (v. 32). The verbal form reveals a distinct possibility. If this does not indicate that the child of God could be condemned along with the world, language has no meaning, and Paul's warning would have been deceptive.

(1 Cor. 11:33-34) Remedial recommendations: With a deep sigh for the welfare of this church, Paul draws a conclusion of admonition. "When assembly time comes, do not persist in your elitist fragmentation: (v. 21). A worshipping body should be united in their praise to God. Thus, they should worship together, instead of in artificially segregated assemblies. As for social meals, let these not be meshed with the communion memorial; you may satisfy your appetites at home. Do not turn your assemblies into an occasion deserving of God's judgment. He ominously notes there are other matters on his correction agenda, but these will wait until he addresses them face to face.

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

Jackets Lose 22-21 Heartbreaker to Cloudland in Last Seconds

What if? Those words are likely to echo through the minds of Coalfield players, coaches, and fans for years to come. Taking a 21-14 lead with 5:30 to go in the game, all the Jackets had to do was stop the Cloudland Highlanders one more time to advance to the Class A TSSAA State Semifinals. Whether you call it fate, bad luck, or simply determined play by the Cloudland Highlanders, Class A Mr. Football Semifinalist Seth Birchfield crossed the goal line with 1.4 seconds to go to bring Cloudland within one point. Always going for the two-point conversion, Birchfield then burst through the left side of the line to give Cloudland a 22-21 margin and seal the Highlanders first victory over Coalfield since 2001.

It is difficult to imagine a more competitive game at any level of football. Though the two teams played with vastly contrasting styles, it was

clear from the outset that each team was determined to win and advance in the playoffs. As usual, Coalfield's offense was balanced and used a variety of pass and run plays. Two major obstacles hindered the Jackets' attack. The poor condition of the field made it tough for Coalfield receivers to run their deep passing routes. The size and speed of pursuit of Cloudland linebackers also made it very difficult for Coalfield ball carriers to run the ball outside, which has been a staple of the Coalfield offense throughout the season.

Cloudland's offensive approach was based solely on running the ball with no pretense of passing. Typically playing without a quarterback under center and with no wideouts, Cloudland used a compact formation that gave them numerical superiority on the line. Highlander running backs would take a direct snap from center and hit the small hole created by

Cloudland received the opening kickoff and executed a 7-play, 70-yard drive to take an early 8-0 lead. The drive ate 4:20 off the clock. Coalfield immediately responded with a 5-play, 61-yard drive to score, closing the gap to 8-7. Coalfield's drive was highlighted by a 12-yard pass from Cole Hines to Eli Roberts, a 12-yard run by Hines, and a 38-yard touchdown pass from Hines to Canaan Bowling. The drive took only 2:48 off the clock.

The rest of the first half was dominated by strong defense by both teams. The Jackets had two more drives in the half, driving first to the Cloudland 12-yard line, and then to the Cloudland 22-yard line. The first drive advanced on a 17-yard run by Landon Lowe and a 34-yard pass from Hines to Lowe. The second Coalfield drive began with an 11-yard run by Bowling and was highlighted by a 29-yard pass from Hines to Levi Mullins. On each drive, the Cloudland defense stiffened, and Coalfield gave up the ball on downs. While the Highlanders had three additional possessions in the first half, the tough Jacket defense held Cloudland to a total of 78 yards on the three drives. The Highlanders never advanced beyond midfield on two of the drives.

Coalfield took the opening kickoff of the second half and went 3-and-out. Cloudland took the punt at their own 25-yard line and drive 75 yards in 10 plays to score, eating 5:14 off the clock. Coalfield stopped the 2-point

conversion attempt and the Highlanders led 14-7.

The Jackets took the following kickoff at their own 40-yard line and drove 60 yards in five plays to tie the score at 14-14. The drive advanced with a 14-yard pass from Hines to Landon Galyon and ended with a 46-yard touchdown pass from Hines to Levi Mullins. The drive consumed only 2:11 of clock time.

On their following possession, the Highlanders drive 70 yards in 12 plays to the Coalfield 8-yard line where the Jacket defense forced a fumble. Levi Mullins scooped up the fumble and raced 92 yards for an apparent Coalfield score, only to have the ball called back to the Coalfield 46-yard line because of a block-in-the-back penalty that occurred far behind the ball. Undeterred, the potent Jacket offense marched 54 yards in 5 plays to score and take a 21-14 lead with 5:30 remaining in the game. The drive included three big plays — a 17-yard pass from Hines to Galyon, a 13-yard run by Bowling, and a 16-yard touchdown pass from Hines to Galyon.

Then began 5:28 of the most suspenseful football ever witnessed as the Highlanders started their final drive at their own 20-yard line. The Highlanders slowly, meticulously executed their game plan, alternating carries by Seth Birchfield and Caleb Sluder. At one point in the drive,

Cloudland was faced with a 4th down and 3 yards to go when Birchfield ripped off an 11-yard gain. The Jacket defense stopped Cloudland runners twice at the line of scrimmage and generally held them to runs of less than five yards. In eleven plays, the Highlanders advanced to the Coalfield 29-yard line.

At this point, the unexpected happened - Cloudland running back Seth Birchfield threw a 23-yard pass to Gage McKinney, the only Highlander passing attempt of the game. Flanked by two Coalfield defenders, McKinney held on to the ball along with one of the Coalfield defenders. By rule, possession defaulted to the offense and the Highlanders had a first down at the Coalfield 6-yard line. Sluder carried the ball for 3 yards, followed by a Coalfield encroachment pen-

the ball back to the 6-yard line with only seconds remaining. Birchfield then did what he does best – faking left, he raced around the right side and into the end zone for a touchdown with 1.4 seconds remaining. Coalfield's lead was cut to 21-20.

It is difficult to imagine any fan who was present or watching the game online being able to breath at this point. The outcome of the game clearly rested on Cloudland's upcoming 2-point conversion attempt. After a timeout, the Highlanders snapped the ball to Birchfield, who broke through the Coalfield line into the end zone to give the Highlanders a 22-21 lead. All that remained was the formality of an on-side kick by Cloudland to end the game with a hard-fought 22-21 victory over Coalfield and a trip to the TSSAA Semifinals.

While there are significant differences in many team stats, these resulted from the vastly different styles of play. Coalfield's big-play, balanced attack took only 18:20 of clock time, while Cloudland's short-yardage, grind-it-out running offense ate up 29:39 of clock time. Coalfield ran only 36 offensive plays, whereas Cloudland executed 60 plays, which took its toll on the Coalfield defense.

While Coalfield players and fans were disappointed with the loss, a phenomenal game was played by both teams. Clearly, it was the best executed football game we have seen all season. The way that both teams poured their hearts and souls into pursuit of excellence should make fans from both schools proud. These young men delivered far more than any of us could reasonably expect.
