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

Joe Manchin's Travesty

Congress has never cared much about truth-in-labeling, but even by its standards, "The Inflation Reduction Act of 2022" is laughably absurd.

The deal reached by West Virginia Sen. Joe Manchin and Majority Leader Chuck Schumer is getting puffed up by the media as a presidency-revitalizing achievement for President Joe Biden, when in reality it is the detritus of his stymied legislative agenda hastily thrown together in an incoherent muddle, under a deceptive name.

A signature of Biden's legislative strategy has been pursuing sweeping legislation that has nothing to do with the actual concerns of voters. Worried about inflation? Don't worry, we have a partisan, enormously ambitious voting rights bill, police reform bill, or new multi-trillion-dollar spending bill just for you.

Thankfully, Manchin significantly bid down what Biden and the rest of the party initially wanted to spend on so-called "Build Back Better." Otherwise, the new deal is as much of a non sequitur as ever. At a time of inflation, it offers hundreds of billions of new spending. As the economy dips into a recession or close to one, it offers hundreds of billions in new taxes. And its main element is more green energy spending, when the climate is far down the priority list for voters.

TITLE: None of this makes much sense. According to the estimate of the Penn Wharton Budget Model, the act would very slightly increase inflation in the near-term, when inflation is a problem, and very slightly decrease it after 2024, when -- one hopes -- it will already have fallen.

That's just some random model, you say? Well, Manchin used to rely on it.

Manchin brags about the \$300 billion in deficit reduction over 10 years, which is supposed to be one of the bill's counter-inflationary bragging points. Just a week or so ago, though, the senator voted for the Senate's \$280 billion "Chips and Science" bill. What the West Virginia solon giveth with one hand, he taketh away with another.

Surely, Democrats will keep the new spending coming to the extent they can.

Manchin deserves credit for sounding the alarm about inflation when Democrats were still in denial. TITLE: Nonetheless, his own record isn't exactly sterling. Last year, he voted for the \$1.9 billion "rescue plan" that had some role in worsening inflation. Now, he claims to be tackling this inflation via fiscal rectitude while he freely spends more money.

In short, Manchin is an arsonist who shows up to put out the fire with a leaky hose.

The tax piece isn't any better. The 15% corporate income tax will hit manufacturers particularly hard, including the semiconductor manufacturers that Manchin and the Senate just went out of their way to subsidize. Again, which is it -- do those companies deserve to be subsidized more, or taxed more?

Manchin implausibly denies the tax increase is a tax increase. He calls it closing a loophole, a classic Beltway euphemism for a tax hike.

Also, he further denies that the bill increases taxes on those making less than \$200,000 a year, despite the Joint Committee on Taxation finding exactly that. The committee estimates that people making between \$50,000 and \$75,000 would see a .8% increase next year.

Then there's the issue that the additional corporate tax is a disincentive to business investment when more of it is desperately needed. Inflation results from demand outstripping supply, so it is imperative that government get out of the way of business creating more supply.

Finally, Manchin said in 2010, "I don't think, during the time of recession, you mess with any of the taxes or increase any taxes." He has apparently suspended that rule until further notice.

At the end of the day, all of this is a counterproductive waste, but it could have been much worse. The bill isn't going to remake Biden's foundering presidency, but it will make Democratic activists feel a little better -- Joe Manchin's contribution to the republic.

Watermelon, Family-Style

It has been a watermelon summer! The luscious, juicy treat has made a regular appearance in our soups, salads, grilled sides, as well as sliced up on large platters for the perfect al fresco big-crowd dessert.

Here are some creative ideas for serving local watermelon during this peak season:

WATERMELON CHECKERBOARD SALAD

(For 2 servings)

- 10 chunks of ripe watermelon and 8 chunks of ripe honeydew melon cut into 3/4-inch cubes
- 1/4 cup feta cheese
- 2 fresh mint leaves chopped
- 2 basil leaves chopped (optional)
- Olive oil and white balsamic vinegar, or your favorite vinaigrette dressing

Let kids arrange the cubes in a checkerboard pattern on salad plates. Sprinkle feta, mint and basil on top. Dress with a drizzle of olive oil and white balsamic or a vinaigrette dressing. A pinch of sea salt tastes good, too.

Could it be PTSD?

Do you ever wonder if you possibly have PTSD? The Department of Veterans Affairs has created a very short PTSD screening webpage designed to see whether any symptoms you have could be related to post-traumatic stress disorder.

The screening test consists of five short questions. At the end you'll click to submit and get your score.

It's worth doing the screening if you have any doubts or concerns after going through a traumatic or life-threatening event. PTSD can arrive either immediately after an event or later, or even come and go. It can affect anyone of any age. There's no set pattern, but there are certain symptoms, and that's where this short screening comes into play.

Go online to www.ptsd.va.gov/screen and click to "Start Screen." No, you don't need to give any personal information or even sign in.

When you get to the end of the questions, click on "Next Steps" and see the information that's offered, includ-


Alternate idea: Replace two honeydew cubes with cube-shaped avocado.

Remember that this screening isn't a true diagnosis. Only a real provider can diagnose PTSD, but this can give you a start in the right direction if you have concerns. Remember, too, that there are quite a few different treatments for PTSD, and the sooner you begin, the sooner you'll feel better.

Veteran of the Week

United States Army veteran Sergeant First Class (Highest rank held: Master Sergeant) Jose Rodela fought and served in the Vietnam War while assigned to Detachment B-36, Company A, 5TH Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1ST Special Forces.

On September 1, 1969 his courage under fire was put to the test and SFC Rodela rose above beyond the call of duty. On March 18, 2014 he was presented with the Medal of Honor at the White House by President Barack Obama for his heroic actions in combat

His Medal of Honor citation reads: Sergeant First Class Jose Rodela distinguished himself by acts of gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty while serving as the company commander, Detachment B-36, Company A, 5th Special Forces Group

(Airborne), 1st Special Forces during combat operations against his unit and the United States Army. an armed enemy in Phuoc Long Province, Republic of Vietnam on September 1, 1969. That afternoon, Sergeant First Class Rodela's battalion came under an intense barrage of mortar,



rocket, and machine gun fire. Ignoring the withering enemy fire, Sergeant First Class Rodela immediately began placing his men into defensive positions to prevent the enemy from overrunning the entire battalion. Repeatedly exposing himself to enemy fire, Sergeant First Class Rodela moved from position to position, providing suppressing fire and assisting wounded, and was himself wounded in the back and head by a B-40 rocket while recovering a wounded comrade. Alone, Sergeant First Class Rodela assaulted and knocked out the B-40 rocket position before successfully returning to the battalion's perimeter. Sergeant First Class Rodela's extraordinary heroism and selflessness above and beyond the call of duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of military service and reflect great credit upon himself.

Law Enforcement Officer of the Week



Retired K-9 Boris of the Sevierville Police Department died on Friday, August 5, 2022 from an unexpected medical problem, according to Sevierville Police Department officials.

K-9 Boris started with the department in July of 2015 and retired in December of 2020. He was a tracker, helping find people and fugitives for the SPD.

"In his time with SPD, K-9 Boris was assigned to Sgt. Justin Armstrong," officials said. "K-9 Boris was a key member of our Canine Unit and known for his excellent tracking skills and his ability to always put a smile on the faces of members of the department as well as the community."



On Monday, August 1, 2022, Sergeant Matthew Fishman and two other deputies of the Wayne County Sheriff's Office, North Carolina were shot while serving involuntary compliance papers to a subject that fired shots at the three deputies as they arrived at his home about 10:30 am. The man barricaded himself inside the house until a SWAT team entered at 8:00 pm and found him dead from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Sergeant Fishman was transported to ECU Medical Center where he succumbed to his wounds the next day. The two other deputies were transported to ECU Medical Center and Wayne UNC Hospital in stable condition.

Sergeant Fishman had served with the Wayne County Sheriff's Office for twelve years and had previously served with the Mount Olive Police Department. He is survived by his wife, two children, and father.

The History Channel

* On Aug. 24, 1814, during the War of 1812 between the United States and England, British troops enter Washington, D.C., and burn the White House in retaliation for the American attack on the city of York in Ontario, Canada, in June 1813. When the British arrived at the White House, they found that President James Madison and his first lady Dolley had already fled to safety in Maryland.

* On Aug. 22, 1851, the U.S.-built schooner America bests a fleet of Britain's finest ships in a race around England's Isle of Wight. In the 53-mile race, the America trounced the competition, beating the cutter Aurora by 22 minutes.

* On Aug. 27, 1908, future President Lyndon B. Johnson is born on a farm near Stonewall, Texas. As president, Johnson pushed through the creation of Medicare/Medicaid, Head Start, the Voting Rights Act, the Civil Rights Act and the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

* On Aug. 25, 1939, "The Wizard of Oz," which will become one of the best-loved movies in history, opens in theaters. Though the scenes in Kansas were shot in traditional black and white, Oz appears in vivid Technicolor, a relatively new film process at the time.

* On Aug. 23, 1947, the first Little League World Series championship game -- the culmination of a three-day tournament in Williamsport, Pennsylvania -- features teams from Pennsylvania. Maynard, a team from Williamsport, defeated Lock Haven, 16-7, to win the title at Original Field. Although it was called the World Series, 11 of the 12 teams in the tournament were from Pennsylvania.

* On Aug. 26, 1959, the British Motor Corporation (BMC) launches its newest car, the small and affordable -- at a price tag of less than \$800 -- Mark I Mini. At only 10 feet long, the Mini could sit four adults and had a trunk big enough for luggage.

* On Aug. 28, 1972, the U.S. Air Force gets its first ace designation since the Korean War when Capt. Richard S. Ritchie and his "backseater" (radar intercept officer), Captain Charles B. DeBellevue, shoot down his fifth MiG near Hanoi.

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Historically Speaking General Groves: A "Bully" with Considerable Influence

Thanks to Carolyn Krause for yet another excellent article drawing on Oak Ridge Oral Histories. This time she brings us insights into General Leslie R. Groves, the person placed in charge of the Manhattan Project, using quotes from pioneering scientist Chris Keim's oral history, comments

made by Oak Ridge City Historian, Bill Wilcox and refers to Alvin Weinberg's book, The First Nuclear Era, to bring us a variety of impressions of General Groves.

Enjoy a fresh look at the leader of the nation's efforts that ended World War II by reading what follows written by Carolyn Krause.

Seventy years ago in the Oak Ridge area, some 3,000 people, including 1.000 families, were forced to abandon their homes and farms. On Sept. 19, 1942, during his first visit to Black Oak Ridge, Brigadier General Leslie R. Groves approved the purchase by the federal government of a 59,000-acre tract. He ordered U.S. Army engineers to conment takeover.

According to the "Expedient Evictions" section of Dick Smyser's book Oak Ridge 1942-1992: A Commemorative Portrait, the residents were told that they "must pack up their families" belongings, livestock, and farm equipment and leave quickly, given no hint of the reason for their ousting. Many of these families were bitter. Their bitterness was intensified by the difficulty they encountered finding new homes and the paltry sums [\$50 an acre] they were paid by the government for their property."

From 1942 through 1945, some 100,000 people led by General Groves transformed the nation's defense capabilities, as well as three landscapes in Tennessee, New Mexico, and Washington.

As officer in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Groves oversaw the construction of the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and directed the Manhattan Project, which developed the atomic bomb during World War II. The nuclear fuel for the war-ending uranium and plutonium bombs came from the two newly built "secret cities" of Oak Ridge and Hanford, WA. The scientists and engineers in the third secret city—Los Alamos, N.M.—were responsible for the design and construction of the atomic bombs that were later exploded over Japan.

The son of a Presbyterian chaplain in the U.S. Army, Groves graduated fourth in his class at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. He gained a reputation "as a doer, a driver, and stickler for duty."

In his 2010 book "The Last Reunion" Oak Ridge High School graduate and noted sportswriter Jay Searcy called General Groves a bully. "Although he was never an Oak Ridger, General Leslie Groves, director of the Manhattan Project, spent

much of his time in the city, commuting from Washington on the train with his secretary and a briefcase stuffed with paperwork."

Searcy goes on to say, "He slept at the Guest House [later called the Alexander Inn], the Elza House and, on occasion, some said, in the maternity ward of the Oak Ridge Hospital with a guard posted at the door. He made it a point to hide from the public and dash from place to place in an unmarked staff car driven by Elmer Brummitt, whose family had 40 acres of farmland in Lupton

Searcy quoted one critic of Groves, who called him "a conceited, impatient, rude, ruthless, impetuous, intimidating, know-it-all egomaniac." According to Searcy, Lieutenant Colonel Kenneth Nichols, in charge of the Oak Ridge operation under Groves, said after the war that "Groves was the biggest son of a bitch I ever met in my life but also one of the most capable individuals. He had an ego second to none. He had tireless energy and absolute confidence in his decisions.

"I hated his guts and so did everybody else but he had a form of understanding. President Franklin D. Roosevelt thought his credentials were just right. He promised him a promotion to Brigadier General, appointed him director of the Manhattan Project, and made it the top priority of the war. Groves would have to handle scores of brilliant scientists, many of whom were equally egotistical and arrogant. Roosevelt needed a bully."

In an Oak Ridge National Laboratory oral history

interview, the late Chris Keim was asked about his encounters with Groves. Keim replied, "When we were operating the pilot plant during the uranium days, General Groves would sometimes ask us what we were doing. We'd show him our logbook."

"And, he would say, 'I have to make a decision by 8:00 tomorrow morning whether to use the new equipment that you are working on or use the equipment that is established in the calutron buildings—the isotope production buildings.' And, he would ask for our opinion. 'If we were

> made that decision the next morning. And he gave us credit for helping him make the decision." City Historian Bill Wilcox said that Groves introduced the concept of "compartmentalization" to ensure secrecy in the Manhattan Project. The U.S. government did not want the Germans and Japanese to know about the American atomic bomb work. Compartmentalization, said Wilcox, "was a new idea that's been used ever since by different kinds of intelligence services."

As director of the Manhattan Project, Groves' accomplishments were considerable. According to Wikipedia, "He directed the enormous construction effort, made critical decisions on the various methods of isotope separation, acquired raw materials, directed the collection of military intelligence on the German nuclear energy project, and helped select the cities in Japan that were chosen as targets."

In fact, according to the 1994 book "The First Nuclear Era" by the late National Laboratory from 1955 to 1973,

Groves himself picked Aug. 9, 1945, as the date for the detonation of the second, war-ending atomic bomb over Nagasaki, Japan.

On that day 74,000 lives were lost and 74,000 people were injured in Nagasaki. Many more Japanese were displaced from their homes, just like the residents of Black Oak Ridge almost three years earlier. But World War II ended soon thereafter, avoiding a land invasion of Japan, and saving the lives of millions of Americans and Japanese.

There you have Carolyn's perspective of General Groves using comments by people who knew him or knew of his Manhattan Project. I am convinced that without General Groves and his drive, intensity and dedication to success, the Manhattan Project as we know it might well have never existed. Like the ultimate praise for his leadership provided by Major General Kenneth D. Nichols (Colonel at the time of the Manhattan Project), I believe General Groves was an example of the right person for the job!

The War is Over and the Men are Home

It was the middle of October 1945 and a group of World War II veterans were gathered behind my

uncle's house telling stories about their part in the war. Some of them just got home a few days prior and a couple of young boys sat there in awe as they listened to their stories. They looked upon all these men as heroes, and they didn't question them about their stories. One of the men looked up toward Wiley Armes

Mountain and smiled as he explained, 'I thought at one or more times I'd never see those beautiful mountains again." The other veterans looked at the beautiful colored leaves and made different statements about being home.


Some of the men had been in the navy and had seen a lot of action in the South Pacific. Roy Redmon told his story about being assigned to the cruiser, the U.S.S. Houston, but because of the need for other ranks his billet was changed to another ship. It almost brought tears to his eyes when he told the rest of the

story. He said, "that poor sailor who took my place went down with the ship. I'm alive today because of a lucky draw. I'll never be able to get this out of my mind." Then Roy pulled out a cruise book on the aircraft carrier that he was assigned to. A fighter plane had landed on the deck on fire and the firemen were fighting the flames as other sailors were getting the pilot out. Hoses were stretched everywhere on the deck of the carrier. It didn't look good at all. Roy said I wasn't safe but at least they didn't sink our ship.

Willie Redmon had seen a lot of action on the U.S.S. Intrepid, but he was relucted to talk about the kamikaze attacks at first but later he did say a few things. He talked about the terrible typhoon they got into when they sailed back to Hawaii from the South Pacific. He said it was even worse than the kamikaze attacks. I saw small ships come up with the swells then go down and disappear. I was really proud to be on a large aircraft carrier. I think we lost over 700 men in that storm. He said we got hit by the kamikazes five times and I can't tell

you how many men we lost. Willie was my hero.

Ralph Redmon was in the army and most of the time he was stationed in India and Burma. Any part of World War II was rugged but I was always interested in the navy while in the South Pacific and the marines on the many islands of the pacific. If not for the allied soldiers, airmen, and sailors we could be





Rent your home to your business for tax savings

Renting your home to your S Corporation can create two valuable tax benefits. First, even though you are receiving rental income, the income received is not taxable on your personal income tax return. IRC Section 280A allows you to rent your entire home for 14 days or less without it being taxable income on your personal return.

Second, your business gets to deduct the rent as a business expense. If you are an S Corporation owner, you can also reduce your business's

taxable income by the amount of the rent paid. Since an S Corporation is a pass-through entity, it pays no federal income tax. The profit or loss is passed through to its owners. If you are a 100% owner of the S Corporation, your taxable income would be reduced by 100% of the amount of the rent paid by the business.

For example, renting your home for \$1,500 a day for 14 days to the S Corporation would provide your business with a \$21,000 deduction. Additionally, you would be receiving \$21,000 of tax-free income.

The expense for renting the house should be shown as a meeting expense on the business return.

A business must be a partnership, S Corporation or C Corporation, to deduct renting your home to qualify for this strategy. A sole proprietor or LLC that is taxed as a sole proprietor does not benefit from renting their home to their business.

There must be an actual business purpose for the rental of your home. A business meeting, video work, mastermind, or other legitimate business purposes qualify as a deductible business expense.

You should keep documentation to prove that there was a valid business purpose. A rental contract or invoice can be used for documentation. Keep emails or pictures to verify that there was an actual meeting. Including the rental in the business's annual minutes is a good idea.

If you rent your home for 15 days or more, all the rent received for the year is taxable.

Charge a reasonable amount for what another company would have charged for a similar rental. The amount you can charge depends on your area and the size of your house.

The business should not rent your house for entertainment since it wouldn't be deductible. However, there is an exception for the annual employee holiday or summer picnic. The 50 percent expense deduction limit does not apply to an employee holiday party or summer picnic.

As long as you follow the rules and document everything correctly, you can avoid any IRS issues in the event of an audit. Renting your home to your S Corporation can provide substantial tax benefits without incurring any additional costs.

Raise a Glass to Celebrate National Sweet Tea Day

In the dog days of summer, few things are more refreshing than a glass of iced tea. Although National Iced Tea Day is June 10, Sunday Aug. 21 is National Sweet Tea Day. If you know anything about me, you know I'm never one to pass up a food holiday.

Popular lore traces iced tea's popularity to the 1904 St. Louis Louisiana Purchase Exhibition World Fair. There are lots of other treats attributed to that fair, including hamburgers, ice cream cones, cotton candy and peanut butter. But iced tea has been on the menu since the 1870s. What made iced tea novel wasn't the tea but the ice, which was quite the luxury back then.

Iced tea has the same health benefits as hot tea, mainly being incredibly rich in polyphenols, which are a type of antioxidant. These wonderful nutrients hunt for cell-damaging free radicals in the body and detoxify them. This reduces the risk of heart disease, and possibly helps prevent cancer and Alzheimer's disease.

Tomorrow's holiday celebrates sweet tea. Traditionally, sweet tea is tea that's brewed very strong with a large amount of sugar added. The mixture of sugar and tea is served over ice. The amount of sugar may

offset some of the health benefits of tea mentioned above, so please modify this recipe if that's a concern

With all that said, it kills me to see people buying premade iced tea at premium prices. Made at home, even if you use high quality tea and purchase spring water, it's still very inexpensive at less than \$1 per gallon. Come on, people! It's just water and teabags. We can do this!

TRADITIONAL SWEET TEA

The measurements are flexible. Use this as a place to begin, adjusting the recipe until it speaks or sings to your taste buds.

Yield: 1 gallon

1 gallon water 6 to 8 individual black tea bags

1 cup granulated sugar

Pinch baking soda

Fresh mint leaves or lemon slices (optional)



Fill a gallon-size pitcher with good water. If you don't have a gallon pitcher, you can repurpose a gallon-size plastic water jug. Pour about one-third of the water into a saucepan and heat to a rolling boil on the stove. Once it's boiling, remove from heat

and add the teabags. Let this steep for 5 to 10 minutes depending on how strong you like your tea. I leave mine for 7 minutes, and I think that's the Goldilocks spot — not too strong, not too weak, but juuuust right. Remove teabags but don't squeeze them. Add the sugar while the water is very hot and stir until it's completely dissolved. Confession: I only add 1/2 cup of sugar and my family still loves me and my tea. Add a pinch of baking soda to offset any bitterness in the tea. Let this cool to room temperature and pour it back into the pitcher with the remaining water. Just be sure you don't pour hot water into a plastic jug. To serve, pour the sweet tea into ice-filled glasses. Add a sprig of mint or a lemon slice, if desired. The sweet tea will keep refrigerated for about a

A little tip: When your tea is finished brewing, don't squeeze the tea bags. Tea leaves contain tannins, naturally occurring compounds with a bitter, astringent taste. When you squeeze, you're releasing the water where the

tannins are most concentrated and compromising the flavor of your tea. In traditional Southern iced tea, a pinch of baking soda is added to offset any bitterness.

So, let's raise a glass and celebrate the holiday because everything is made better with a little sweet tea and grace.

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Colossians Chapter 2

(Colossians 2:1-5) Paul's love for his brothers: Even though the congregations at Colossae and Laodicea (some ten miles northwest) had never seen Paul personally, he wanted to assure them of his love for them. He strove (to the point of agony) on their behalf. Though imprisoned himself, not knowing his impending fate (Phil. 2:23), he had the interests of others in his heart. He longs for these saints to be comforted and knit together in love. He wants them to have a full assurance of understanding of gospel truth, formerly a secret, though now revealed in the mission of Christ (v2). This is a barb at the proto-Gnostic mystery philosophy. The revelation of Christ is indeed the receptacle that contains the "treasures of wisdom and knowledge", available only by gospel truth. He who is bereft of the divine message is a spiritual fool; wisdom is not resident in the philosophy of Athens, Corinth, or Colossae---claims to the contrary notwithstanding (v.3).

The Christians were to be on guard that they not be delude by pseudo-logic and eloquent, though empty, speech (v4). Such shoddy methods were not characteristic of God's apostle (1 Cor. 2:4). Though he was not in their presence personally, his heart and thoughts were with them (1 Cor. 5:3). He rejoiced in their general fidelity, taking note of their order. The word derives from a military expression that pictures an army faithfully marching in precision in response to their commander. The majority of them were standing faithful against the heretical enemy. Their faith in Christ was steadfast (v.5).

(Col. 2:6-7) Live faithfully in Christ: These saints had received Christ Jesus as Lord, which means they obeyed the gospel plan. This was a slap at the heretics who not only questioned the fleshly Jesus, but repudiated his position as "Lord". They thus were to "walk in him", continuously maintain a relationship consistent with their "in Christ" status. They were to sink their spiritual roots downward to secure stability, and be steadfastly "builded up in him". Note the double "in him" expressions. The only way up is down! But this stability is the result of being "taught", not some inexpressible, mystical influence. All the while they are to overflow with thanksgiving. Let modern visionaries take note.

(Col. 2:8-15) A solemn warning and remedy: "Take heed" is a warning concerning danger. Why is such offered if there is no peril of being lost---as Calvinism asserts (Heb. 3:12)? To make spoil is to capture, as one would an enemy. This is not a military conflict, but a spiritual one. The victim is a captive of ideology, a human philosophy that is both deceitful and empty (void of quality). Clearly it depicts the troublers in the Colossian church who are under cultic influences. The heretics teach the "tradition of men" and the "rudiments" of the world. One might describe it as "philosophical kindergarten," in striking contrast to the true wisdom and advanced knowledge found only in following Christ (v.8; v3-4).

In Christ dwells the fullness of the Godhead bodily (v.9). Several nuggets of truth are here chronicled; these are directly in opposition to the Colossian heresy. (a) Christ has a body (he did not merely "appear" to have one, as the proto-Gnostics taught). (b) The complete fullness of deity was resident in the body (Phil. 2:6). He was not "deity" merely in some symbolic way. (c) The full complement of divine qualities "dwell" (to settle down with a sense of permanency) in Christ's body. (d) Jesus, at the time of this writing, possessed a glorified "body" (Phil. 3:21), and always will. He has chosen to identify with us forever!

It is only "in him" that one can be "made full"; there is a "fullness of grace" (Jn. 1:16) and an influential participation in the "divine nature" (2 Pet. 1:4), though not in any sense does the Christian become deity. Jesus is supreme in authority, whether over earthly powers (Rev. 1:5) or that of heavenly creatures (Eph. 1:4, 6; Rev. 5:1-3).

Christians have not received a "circumcision made with hands," a surgical procedure in cutting off the flesh (as the Jewish heretics attempted to bind as a matter of salvation (Acts 15:1). Rather, our "circumcision" (a metaphor) involves putting away the life of fleshly indulgence. It is a "circumcision of the heart" ((Rom. 2:29), commanded by Christ (v.11). The apostle now explains when this "circumcision" is formalized. It occurs when one is buried with Christ in baptism

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(clearly indicating that baptism is immersion) and "raised with him," on the basis of the believer's trust in the Lord to validate the procedure. The entire process is "the working of God," not one of human merit (Eph. 2:8-9). Baptism is not excluded from the plan of salvation on the ground that it is a "human work." This action is a divine work, just as faith is (Jn. 6:29). The power of God operates in raising the sinner from baptism as a "new creature" (2 Cor. 5:17), just as it did in raising Jesus from the dead (v.12). The baptism here referenced is water baptism, into which and from which one is buried and raised---not Holy Spirit baptism (Acts 2:4).

Prior to conversion, one is spiritually "dead" as a result of his sins, the contamination of his "fleshly" life (v.13). The modern rendition, "sinful nature" (NIV), is misleading, reflecting the sectarian theory that all are born in sin, having inherited the guilt of Adam's transgression. Man only develops a "sinful nature," an ingrained practice, by long habit, not by inheritance (Eph. 2:1-3). In the process of conversion one is "made alive" (Rom. 6:4) to be "with him (Christ)" when raised from baptism, and "all our trespasses" are forgiven. It is a spiritual malignancy to deny the connection between baptism and forgiveness (Acts 2:38; 22:16).

Paul states that the "bond," consisting of "ordinances," that "was against us and contrary to us" has been "taken away", having been "nailed to the cross"--- an obvious reference to Jesus' death. (This negates the modern Sabbatarian contention that the law of Moses is binding still. And it contradicts the dispensational theory that the Moses system will be reinstated in the so-called "millennial" reign of Christ.)

Some view this "bond" to be the "sin debt" that condemned the sinner before his conversion. The weight of the evidence, however, is that this refers to the Mosaic law (which the Judaizing element of the Colossian heretics exalted). The immediate context identifies this with the Hebrew code (Sabbath day," etc.). Also the parallelism with Eph. 2:14-16 is decisive in the application to the law of Moses. By his death on the cross the Lord "stripped" the hostile forces at enmity with God. And by his resurrection he openly triumphed, providing a preview of the ultimate and complete victory to come (v. 15; Cor. 15:24).

(Col. 2:16-19) Spiritual dangers: In view of the fact that the Mosaic law was abrogated at the cross, no one can legitimately "judge" another for not keeping those ordinances, the eating of certain meats, Hebrew holy days, and the Sabbath. The Old Testament ordinances served merely as a "shadow" of various elements of the new covenant. The ultimate reality was Christ. The heretics, exuding a false humility, attempted to impose upon their disciples a worship of angels--a clear violation of divine law (Mt. 4:10). They were practicing spiritual fraud, attempting to buttress their dogma with supposed vision. They were both arrogant and carnal (v.18). They repudiated Christ as their head---the very one who supplies the body with all necessary spiritual provisions (v.19).

(Col. 2:20-23) Exhortations: The apostle appeals to those who are being swindled by the heretical teachers. "If (or since) you died with Christ to the rudiments of this world (the fundamentals of worldliness), why are you now---so very inconsistently---subjecting yourselves to human ordinances, as though you have never left the world?" Incredible! "Don't handle, taste, or even touch these doctrines." The prohibitions are figurative, yet strong and progressive. These doctrines and commandments of men will perish, as will those who succumb to them (2 Thes. 2:11-12; 2 Pet. 2:1).

False doctrines have a phony aura of "wisdom," but not the wisdom that is from "above" (Jas. 3:15, 17). The result is a self-centered, devilish "wisdom" that is self-consumed with the practice of "will-worship." This brand of worship is common even today. It is that worship which "one do."


common even today. It is that worship which "one devises and prescribes for himself, contrary to the contents and nature of the faith" (Thayer). It is any worship that is forbidden or unbidden (Vine), unauthorized. The rituals (abuse of the body) are of no value whatever in controlling the base lusts of the flesh (v. 23).


