

Historically Speaking

Bill Wilcox: On war, peace, and reconciliation

Bill Wilcox passed away on September 2, 2013. The following article was written before his death.

It is with great delight that I bring you this article by Carolyn Krause about my wonderful, good friend, Bill Wilcox, who turned 90 years of age on January 26, 2013, amid a winter storm that prevented a grand party planned in his honor. While I have written about him often, I am fully aware that others see him in just as great a light as I do and seeing him recognized by a wide range of people is rewarding to those of us who admire him greatly and embarrassing to him, and that is good, as it should be.

Here's Carolyn:

. . .

From late 1943 to 1945, people living in and outside the Secret City watched long trains with loaded boxcars roll into Oak Ridge several times a week. For most the cargo, including building materials and sealed drums, was a mystery.

What left Oak Ridge weekly in a coffee-cupsize container was kept so secret that most people working on the war effort here had no idea any product was going out. "Don't ask, don't tell" was the unspoken mantra of the culture of secrecy about people's jobs that General Leslie Groves brought to town.

Groves headed the Manhattan Project that employed construction workers to build huge production plants and three small secret cities, as well as scientists and engineers to create two war-ending atomic bombs. He also was responsible for keeping the Germans, Japanese and Russians ignorant of the size of U.S. efforts.

What came in as uranium oxide in boxcars went out weekly as a few ounces of uranium enriched in fissionable U-235. A secret courier carried the mysterious stuff in a briefcase.

"People wouldn't have believed it," Oak Ridge City Historian Bill Wilcox, 90, told Bob Edwards in an interview broadcast by Public Radio International Jan. 27, a day after Wilcox's birthday.

"The product of the \$478 million Y-12 plant was being carried out every week in a briefcase chained to the wrist of a military security person in plain clothes accompanied by a bodyguard in plain clothes."

The two men went by car to Knoxville, where they took a train to Chicago and then boarded a Super Chief passenger train to New Mexico. The product was secretly transported from a little train stop called Lamy to Los Alamos, where the uranium bomb was designed and built.

Wilcox told Edwards that if the enriched uranium transported from Oak Ridge's Y-12 Plant to Los Alamos were melted down, the total amount would be roughly the size of a basketball. It was enough for one atomic bomb.

Los Alamos had collected enough plutonium from the large nuclear reactors in Hanford, Wash., to build a second atomic bomb. The process for producing plutonium and separating it from spent uranium fuel was pioneered in Oak Ridge at the Graphite Reactor at X-10.

On July 26, 1945, the United States, United Kingdom, and Russia called for Japan to surrender in the Potsdam Declaration, which threatened Japan with "prompt and utter destruction." The militaristic government of Japan ignored the ultimatum.

On Aug. 6 and Aug. 9, the two atomic bombs created by the Manhattan Project were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Japan. The militaristic leaders still refused to surrender, even though the bombs' acute effects killed 150,000 to 250,000 Japanese. Less than a week later Emperor Hirohito insisted that Japan surrender, ending World War II.

The surrender halted the land invasion of Japan planned for November 1945. Such an invasion would have killed an estimated 250,000 Americans and more than one million Japanese.

Oak Ridgers "reacted to the news of the bombing in the same way as the rest of the United States," Wilcox told Edwards. "We were thrilled that somebody had developed a brand-new weapon that might win the war. We were surprised and amazed and we didn't understand it" until they read newspaper articles by New York Times Science Writer William L. Laurence, whom the Army had hired to tell the story.

A Pennsylvania native and a 20-year-old graduate of Virginia's Washington and Lee University, Wilcox was hired in 1943 as a junior chemist by

Eastman Kodak. He was sent to Oak Ridge and told to work with other chemists to better understand the chemistry of uranium.

The chemists were ordered to refer to uranium and its compounds as "tube alloy," "tubanyl oxide" and "tubanous tetrafluoride," according to Bart Callan's oral history interview with Wilcox in March 2005.

They also developed methods for separating uranium from solutions containing various metals that dissolved the stainless steel in the receivers of the Y-12 calutrons that enriched uranium in U-235.

"You knew you had been a part of the making of the bomb," Edwards stated, wanting to know how Wilcox felt about the consequences of detonated nuclear weapons.

"We didn't glory in the deaths of 100,000 people in Hiroshima or Nagasaki," Wilcox said. "Nor did we glory in the deaths of 100,000 people in the firebombing of Tokyo on March 9 and 10 [1945]. Those were horrible deaths to contemplate in that horrible war.

"What we did celebrate was that Oak Ridge helped bring peace to the world that was aching from six long years of World War II. Since the war Oak Ridge scientists turned to the peaceful uses of nuclear energy."

He cited Oak Ridge's production of radioisotopes for medical diagnosis, treatment and research, calling the work the foundation of nuclear medicine that has helped people around the world. Another beneficial legacy was the reactor design work at Oak Ridge National Laboratory, which led to nuclear power plants – the source of 20% of U.S. electricity.

"Nuclear energy can be both a blessing and a curse," Wilcox told Edwards. "It's a triumph and a tragedy, just like all our other energy

sources, such as fire and electricity. But we have learned how to use them safely and so have conquered our fear of fire and electricity. Now we need to overcome our fear of nuclear energy."

Edwards noted that Wilcox "smoothed over" the local controversy over the bronze Friendship Bell designed in Oak Ridge and cast in Japan in 1993. Local opponents saw it as an apology to Japan paid for by taxpayer funds.

Wilcox helped people reach a consensus that the bell is "a symbol of the bonds of friendship and mutual regard that have developed between Oak Ridge and Japan over the past 50 years." He drafted a statement of purpose for City Council and wrote the words for the bell's plaque. He also spearheaded the Rotary Club of Oak Ridge's development of the Secret City Commemorative Walk in A. K.

Seventy years later, the Oak Ridge train is still rolling along, and it's no secret that many people who have hopped aboard are dedicated, like Bill Wilcox, to advancing the national interest through science and technology.

"Great," said Elric, clapping his hands together. "We'll leave at first light."


Bronwyn turned her head to look at Nicodemus. "What do you think?" she asked.





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Solving a Litter Box Mystery

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I'm responding to your recent column about the kitten who won't litter train. I've had kitties for over 50 years. The only time one of my kittens had trouble using the litter box, I made sure to watch him the next time he started sniffing around. It turned out that the sides of the litter box were too high! I replaced it with a litter box that had lower sides and it solved the problem. Love your column! — Linda P., Williamson, New York

DEAR LINDA: Thank you for the advice! Cats are experts at hiding their problems, and it can be difficult to see if a training issue is something to do with behavior, health problems or something else.

Your advice to observe the kitten closely, without interfering as it goes about its business, is perfect. If you've got time to follow a kitten around the house from a distance, that's great. Of course, many of us are busy or have to leave the house for most of the day for work. One way to get around that is to use an indoor security camera — one of the small cameras available for purchase online like a Blink or a SimpliSafe — and point it at the litter box. You can observe activity around the box while you're away (or in another room).

In this instance, the sides of the box were simply too high! A quick fix got the kitten back on track.

Now, what if you observe something else, like the kitten showing distress just before it pees or poops? Or interference from another kitten or cat? Contact your veterinarian for advice, a checkup if needed, and an action plan to solve the litter box mystery.

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

Biden Deserves What He's Going to Get on the Economy

The S&P 500 is down more than 5% since Joe Biden's inauguration, and the Dow Jones Industrial more than 4%.

The Federal Reserve is ratcheting up interest rates, raising borrowing costs across the board.

And one of the most respected bankers in the country is warning of a recession, telling a conference that "this is serious stuff."

Yet, there was President Biden enjoying an ice-cream cone in Portland, Oregon, saying that "our economy is strong as hell."

Inflation? It doesn't worry him, at least not if the rest of the world could get its act together.

"Inflation is worldwide," he said. "It's worse off than it is in the United States. So the problem is the lack of economic growth and sound policy in other countries, not so much ours."

As polls show the economy growing in importance for the midterms -- the latest New York Times poll has 44% of voters saying it's their top concern, up from 36% in July -- Biden's overall performance on the issue matters even more, to his detriment and that of his party.

There are deft political maneuverers who react to circumstances as necessary, and then blinkered and mulish politicians who can't or won't acknowledge reality.

There are policymakers whose worldviews line up with basic economic laws, and then those always bound to be confounded by the real world consequences of their ideological fixations.

There are master communicators who can make anyone feel better about anything, and then there are stumblebums whose evasions and lapses in logic are painfully obvious.

Joe Biden is emphatically the latter on every count. He likes to say fighting inflation is his foremost priority, but it's hard to identify any major initiative of his that would be any different if the annual inflation rate were under 2% rather than over 8%.

He came into office promising to spend \$11 trillion over the next 10 years, according to the estimate of Brian Riedl of the Manhattan Institute, and has spent as much of it as he could. When Congress wouldn't assent, he spent hundreds of billions more by abusing his executive authority. The most significant nod he made to inflation was to call one tranche of this spending the Inflation Reduction Act, as if the name of the bill were more important than its substance.

Otherwise, Biden and his officials have relied on bad predictions, dubious math and premature celebrations to try to get them through.

In June 2021, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said inflation would be elevated through the rest of the year, "maybe around 3%," but this represented "transitory factors."

A month later, Biden himself said inflation would be "temporary." Of course, it was on a path to 40-year highs.

It's one thing to spike the football in the end zone; it's another, as Biden keeps doing, to spike the football when it's third and long at midfield and getting repeatedly penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct.

Last week, he said inflation over the past three months averaged 2% on an annual basis, a new way of counting meant to obscure that the real annual rate was 8.2%.

This was reminiscent of his insistence that the inflation rate this past July was 0% because inflation was flat from June.

He similarly declared victory on gas prices, when they have been rising again, and has portrayed himself as scourge of the budget deficit despite his binge of further deficit spending.

If Biden is offering poor explanations for poor results, at the end of the day, it doesn't matter what he says. No presidential statement can compete with declining real wages and steeply increasing food costs.

The voters seem to be working themselves up to administer what is the only appropriate reaction to such heedless mismanagement and transparent spin on an essential matter affecting their daily lives, which is to make their discontent unmistakable at the polls in November.

Changes for VA Small Businesses

If you hope to set up a business as a service-disabled veteran-owned small business (SDVOSB) or a veteran-owned small business (VOSB), your verification will no longer be done by the Department of Veterans Affairs. Instead, as of the beginning of 2023, the Small Business Administration (SBA) will be in charge.

No new applications will be accepted after Oct. 24, 2022, for either verification or reverification, due to the transition to the Small Business Administration. If you currently have a business and wonder about your next steps, go to vetbiz.va.gov and click on "See frequently asked questions concerning this change."

The Vets First Verification Program, using the Center for Verification and Evaluation (CVE), will be your go-to for all types of assistance, including working through the initial steps: Intake, Assessment, Federal Review and Decision.

The benefits are worth the trouble to become VA-verified, if only for the set asides that are at the heart of how the

VA helps small businesses
-- competition is limited, which
helps veterans compete for
federal contracts. At least 3%
of those contracts are held for
service-disabled veterans who
own their businesses.

To be a SDVOSB or VOSB, a business must be owned 51% or more by a veteran who did not receive a bad conduct or dishonorable discharge, and be controlled on a daily basis by a veteran who has the managerial experience to run the business. In addition, the veteran has to be the highest paid person in the company, working full time and holding the highest position in the company. To qualify as a service-disabled business, the veteran must meet all of the above qualifications and also have a disability rating letter from the VA confirming a service-connected disability.

Meringue Ghost Cookies So Easy It's Scary

Meringue is a light, airy and beautifully sweet French dessert made from stiffly whipped egg whites and sugar. Many people think it's a very difficult and temperamental technique, yet it's actually quite simple. When you see how easy and inexpensive this is, you'll never buy meringues from the bakery again!

To make our adorable little ghost cookies, we need hard meringues. This is meringue that has been baked in an oven. They are solid to the touch and light as air. They can shatter when you bite into them, then dissolve pleasingly on the tongue. Hard meringue can be eaten as a confection, a cookie or used as a base for other desserts.

Making meringue is easiest with a stand mixer, but I've used a hand mixer with no trouble. I wouldn't try to whisk meringues by hand; it's too much work for a Diva.

It's extremely important to keep the yolks separate from the whites. Any fat from egg yolk will prevent egg whites from beating properly.

To avoid an accident, use the threebowl method. Separate each egg white into a cup or small bowl before transferring the yolk to a second bowl and the whites to a third bowl. Use any white that has even a speck of yolk in it for another purpose.

It's easiest to separate eggs when they're cold, but let the whites come to room temperature before using.

FRENCH MERINGUE COOKIES

Yield: 36 cookies

Total Time: 1 hour 50 minutes

3 egg whites, room temperature 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar 3/4 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Preheat oven to 225 degrees. Line a sheet pan with parchment paper.

Beat the egg whites and cream of tartar in the mixing bowl of a stand mixer (or a metal or glass bowl with a hand mixer). Use the whisk attachment on high speed and whip eggs until they hold soft peaks.

Reducing the speed to medium and whisking constantly, add sugar 2 tablespoon at a time, whisking after each addition, until sugar is well dissolved before adding the next. Continue beating until whites are glossy and stand in stiff peaks. Add vanilla and blend one final time.

Aiming for around 2 tablespoons per cookie, pipe or spoon your meringue onto a parchment-lined baking sheet.

To create ghosts, with a piping bag and a large round tip, use a motio like making a soft serve ice crear cone. If you don't have a piping bag you can use a zip-top bag with a small corner cut off. That's what I used for the photo. Easy!

Bake for 30 minutes then turn th oven off. Leave them there until com pletely dry, between one and tw hours. Another name for meringu cookies is "Forgotten Cookies," they can be left in an oven for lon periods of time after the cooking done.

To decorate as ghosts, use melte chocolate and a toothpick to draw

Warning! Cooked meringues can not be refrigerated or they will become soggy like cardboard. Bu they will keep for at least a weel if you store them in an airtigh container.

Now that you know how to make meringue, there are so many way to enjoy it. For example, little one bite meringues are called kisse and are eaten as a sweet little con fection. They are often made wit chopped nuts, cherries or coconu Alternatively, you can shape then into dessert shells that you fill wit ice cream, custard, whipped cream

IRS Changes will reduce taxes

The IRS announced that it is making adjustments due to the increase in inflation.

People are struggling with inflation which impacts their buying power. Prices for gas, rent, and groceries have increased more than at any time in the last 40 years.

The new tax changes are a welcome relief for people who have been impacted by inflation. The changes include an increase in the standard deduction and the income tax brackets.

The standard deduction is increased every year.

However, the changes are more significant for 2023. The larger standard deduction will decrease taxable income.

Tax brackets determine the tax rate you'll pay on each portion of your income. For example, expanding the 10 percent bracket will allow you to pay more tax at a lower 10% rate than the 12% rate which is the next tax bracket.

The standard deduction will increase by \$1,800 for married couples filing jointly, by \$1,400 for heads of households, and by \$900 for single taxpayers and married taxpayers filing separately.

The IRS said that about 60 tax provisions would be updated to counter the rising inflation.

The individual tax brackets for capital gains will also be increasing in 2023.

The higher income tax brackets are intended to prevent "bracket creep" due to inflation. Bracket creep can push people who received cost-of-living pay increases into higher tax brackets.

The standard deduction, which is the baseline amount of income that people can receive tax-free will increase to \$13,850 for individuals and \$27,700 for married couples. This is the largest increase to deductions since 1985 when the IRS began annual automatic inflationary adjustments.

For tax year 2021, the child tax credit increased from \$2,000 to \$3,600 for qualifying children under age 6 and \$3,000 for other qualifying children under age 18. The entire amount was refundable.

In 2022, the tax credit will be refundable only up to \$1,500 (up from \$1,400 in 2020 to adjust for inflation), depending on your income, and you must have earned income of at least \$2,500 to even be eligible for the refund.

The 2023 child credit amount will remain at \$2,00 per qualifying child. The maximum refundable portion of the credit for a qualifying child will increase from \$1500 in 2022 to \$1,600.

Refundable tax credits are credits that enable you to receive a credit that is larger than the tax you owe. For example, if you owe \$600 in taxes and qualify for a \$1,00 refundable credit, you would receive a \$400 refund.

The maximum child tax credit is \$2,000 per qualifying child and is not adjusted for inflation. The refundable portion of the child tax credit is adjusted for inflation and will increase from \$1,500 to \$1,600 for 2023.

The earned-income tax credit for low-income workers will be worth as much as \$7,430 (for qualifying taxpayers with three or more children), which is a \$495 increase from last year.

The new tax changes should result in tax savings for many people next year.

1 Timothy Chapter 1

(Author) The introduction shows the book to be composed by Paul, and ancient testimony supporting that conclusion is profuse. The "church fathers" refer to or quote from the document. Ignatius, Polycarp, the Epistle of Barnabas, Clement of Alexandria, and Tertullian are among the witnesses. The radical, modern view that disputes the Pauline authorship is not supported by the evidence of antiquity. By the end of the second century, 1 Timothy was accepted as having been written by Paul and was regarded as authoritative.

(Date) The date of the letter is obviously sometime after Paul's release from his Roman imprisonment, as recorded in the final chapter of Acts. Timothy and Paul had rejoined one another for a while. Eventually the younger brother was left in Ephesus, and Paul had gone on to Macedonia (perhaps Philippi) (1:3). The letter is generally dated in the fall of A. D. 63 or slightly later.

(Purpose) Paul had visited with the elders of the Ephesian congregation en route to Jerusalem with the collection for the poor of Judaea near the conclusion of his third missionary campaign (Acts 20:17). He had warned of ominous times for that church in the future (Acts 20:29-30). From indications in this epistle, his earlier prophecy was fulfilled precisely. Timothy thus needed both instruction and encouragement as he labored in Ephesus. Accordingly, Paul penned this first letter to help accomplish both goals.

(1 Tim. 1:1-2) Salutation: Even to one as close as Timothy, Paul begins with his customary apostle designation, perhaps because the letter was to be read by others as well (the pronoun "you" in 6:21 is plural). He is an apostle by the authority of "God our Savior, and Christ Jesus our hope." Paul greets Timothy with the customary "grace and peace," but adds "hope" as well. Timothy is designated as the apostle's "true child," for Paul had converted him (Acts 16:1-3) and he had been a frequent companion of the apostle in various preaching endeavors.

(1 Tim. 1:3-11) Preserve the gospel: Paul had urged Timothy to settle in Ephesus (Acts: 19:1) for a while as he proceeded on to Macedonia (northern Greece). His initial commission was to oppose false teachers who were teaching a "different doctrine." There is a doctrinal standard!

Some were teaching non-historical "myths" and wrangling over ancestral catalogs (an inclination of the Jews), rather than managing the business of teaching the truth (v. 4). Timothy's work was to lovingly flow from a focused motive, a sincere disposition, and a heart void of hypocrisy (v. 5).

Some had turned away from the gospel, speaking nothing more than fruitless drivel, and without understanding of the matters upon which they pontificated (6-7). Law is good if its purpose is understood, It basically is designed to expose the outlaw, those who will not be governed by rules. They refuse to yield to divine law and opt to be their own gods. Paul now catalogs two classes of sin---sin directly against God and sin indirectly against God by assaults upon those in his image. Those condemned are (v. 9): (a) "lawless" (casting off legal restraints); (b) "unruly" (refusing to yield to authority); (c) "ungodly" (without respect for God); (d) "sinners" (deliberate law violators); (e) "unholy" (viewing sacred things are as repulsive); (f) "profane" (suggesting aggressive disregard for things holy).

Now for moral sins: (a) some are so calloused they murder even their parents. Nero Caesar arranged for the murder of his mother (v. 9). (b) "Manslayers" is a more generic term for any who take human life without divine authorization. (c) "Fornication" embraces many deviates, sex outside of a marriage union, adultery against a marital partner, and homosexuality (Jude 7). (d) "Kidnappers" are slave traders, ransom seekers. (e) "Liars" and "false swearers" are those without verbal integrity (Prov. 6:16-17).

Any other thing contrary to "sound doctrine" is condemned as well (see "such like" in Gal. 5:21).

(1 Tim. 1:12-17) Paul's thanksgiving for salvation: The apostle continually thanks Jesus for counting him faithful and appointing him to apostolic service. His past had been a bloody one indeed. He had been a "blasphemer" (speaking

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against the Christian Way), a "persecutor" (putting "to flight" the people of God as they ran for their very lives), and "injurious" (harming with a sadistic fervor). Amazingly, however, he had obtained "mercy" (pity from God) because he was unaware of the vile nature of his actions (v. 13). He thought he was waging war for God. Ignorance did not excuse him (Acts 23:1; 26:9), but he was forgiven when he accepted Heaven's grace, being immersed in water to have his sins "washed away" by Christ's blood (Acts 22:16; Eph. 5:26; Heb. 9:14). When he was pardoned, Paul entered the "in Christ" relationship (Gal. 3:27), and his budding faith and love overflowed like a flood (v. 14).

This is the first of Paul's five "faithful sayings" in his letters to Timothy and Titus (3:1; 4:9; 2 Tim. 2:11; Tit. 3:8). It is an affirmation of integrity on behalf of what follows. The reason for Christ's earthly sojourn was "to save sinners." All have sinned and desperately need salvation (Rom. 3:23)! And salvation is through the gospel (Rom. 1:16). Humbly, the apostle viewed himself as the "foremost" sinner (v. 15). Note the present tense "I am"; he still carried the haunting memories of his days of vicious persecutions. Screams and blood were sounds and sights time could not obliterate---even with a recognition of forgiveness. However, he had obtained mercy when he obeyed the gospel plan of redemption (Acts 22:16; Rom. 6:3-4, 1 Tim. 1:17-18). The apostle affirms God's providential use of him to help others; this is a marvelous commentary on the patience of the Lord, which example would be an incentive to others to obediently believe on him for the reception of eternal life (v. 16).

He bursts into an exclamation of praise, giving God honor and glory. The Lord is: (a) "the King eternal" (without beginning or end and absolutely sovereign); (b) "immortal" (not liable to death); (c) "invisible," unseen as a Spirit being (Old Testament references to "seeing" God do not refer to his intrinsic essence, but to temporal outward forms occasionally assumed) (Gen. 32:30); (d) "the only God" (this sets him in contrast to pagan "gods" who have no reality) (v.17; 1 Cor. 8:4-5).

(1 Tim. 1:18-20) The good warfare: Paul issues a fatherly "charge" (authority implied) to Timothy, and in the process alludes to certain "prophecies which led the way" to this young man. Likely God had signified that he wanted this brother to work with Paul (Acts 16:1-3). Paul admonishes Timothy to "war the good warfare" (2 Tim. 4:7)---implying there is an evil one. There is an internal warfare in every child of God, and an external one against forces of Satan. The latter is in Paul's view on this occasion (2 Cor. 10:5; Eph. 6:11). In such conflicts one must hold on to his faith and do what he knows is right (dirty fighting does not become a Christian).

Some, however, having abandoned these qualities, had made "shipwreck" of "the faith" (the gospel system) and the personal faith of others disciples (v.19). Paul was certainly familiar with shipwrecks (2 Cor. 11:25; Acts 27:1)---material and spiritual. Two perverters of truth are mentioned. Hymenaeus may have been the one who taught the absurd doctrine that "the resurrection is past already" (2 Tim. 2:17-18)---somewhat similar to the "radical preterism" of today, which holds that the general resurrection occurred in A.D, 70 with the destruction of Jerusalem. The other was Alexander. Two other Alexanders are mentioned in the New Testament (Acts 19:33-34; 2 Tim. 4:14-15). There is not enough information to identify the person mentioned here. Both of these rebels were "delivered unto Satan" (disfellowshipped) (1 Cor. 5:5, 13), which identifies them as church members. The purpose of the discipline was instructional, that they might learn not to blaspheme (v. 20). There is no indication that they were restored.





Tucked away in the Proverbs of Solomon, is an amazing allusion to the relationship desired by Jesus Christ toward his espoused virgin bride. Proverbs 31 begins with an introduction to a King I can find nowhere in Bible history. Another mysterious King like Melchizedek.

His Hebrew name seems to point to a conversation between Mary and Jesus Christ. King **Opinion Columnist** Lemuel has a name that must be unpacked in the Hebrew tongue to fully comprehend what is

taking place. Imagine a mother talking with a son about how a king should act, and how he describes what a virtuous woman should be.

Wow, there is a lot going on in Europe in general, but France seems to be dominating a majority of newsworthy headlines. From their growing support of the Ukrainians to the left

political infighting that could wreck their energy prices throughout this winter.

The French President Emmanuel Macron has been criticized in the past for his reluctance to challenge Russia on the Ukraine War. General Thierry Burkhard, the French army's chief of staff, has also made comments that infer that openly supporting Ukraine could draw France into conflict with Russia. This is not to say that France has not been supporting Ukraine, they certainly have. The support has been very hush, hush, and under the radar until recently.

On Sunday 10/16/2022 it was reported that France has pledged air defense systems that have the potential to eliminate the drones being used by Russia to terrorize many Ukrainian cities. If the Ukrainian military get a few of these systems operational before the winter season, this could be the "check mate" for the Russian military. Although this move by the French President is welcomed, he certainly has his hands full with domestic energy issues at home.

Considering that Europe is heading into a winter season without access to the Russian energy market due to the Ukraine War, it is a terrible time to have a refinery strike. But that is the realty in France

In fact, France has experienced refinery strikes for the past three weeks and it looks like a settlement is not on the near-term horizon. This strike is responsible for causing fuel shortages throughout the country. Many parts of France the citizens must wait for hours to get fuel. The United States experienced long fuel lines in the 1970s, if history teaches us anything it is that long fuel lines, or fuel issues of any kind have serious election consequences. The strike is attributed to the left-wing


