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



Winter Storm Elliott, Once in a Generation Winter Storm!

Going into Christmas weekend the National Weather Service issued

ings, watches, and advisories. According to the National Weather Service, from December 23-25 Over 200 million people, or roughly 60% of the U.S. population, were under some form of winter weather warnings or advisories across the nation. Winter Storm Elliot lived up to the early hype and generated dangerously cold temperatures as far south as Texas, where the National Weather Service issued a wind chill warning in

Austin for only the second time in history. As of Tuesday 12-27-2022, the death toll of Winter Storm Elliot is 56 deaths.

According to the weather service the deep freeze is being attributed to a once in a generation winter bomb cyclone. This was to me an unfamiliar


term, but according to NOAA; "A bomb cyclone is a fast-developing storm that occurs when atmospheric pressure drops at least 24 millibars over a 24-hour period,"

For our hometown, on Thursday 12-22-2022 the temperature prediction was for lows between 2 and 12 degrees over the Christmas Holidays. On Thursday, based on the weather predictions, hardware stores were filled with people purchasing items to prepare for this significant cold snap.


By Friday morning the measured temperature in Wartburg was hovering between 0and 1-degrees Fahrenheit. On Saturday morning, it was about 6 degrees Fahrenheit. It turns out these few days of bitter cold were too much for several home plumbing systems.

On Sunday morning many local homeowners woke up only to find their water

pipes frozen. Some homeowners who had built their homes over 30 years ago, for the first time woke up only to a drip. Nathan Langley, a resident who lives on Ridge Road was one of these local homeown-


Low Temperatures Saturday December 24, 2022, Image Courtesy of NOAA

ers.

Winter Storm Elliott's freezing temperatures tested all our utility systems, and the energy grid was no exception. According to published reports, for the first time in the Federal Agency's history, the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) called for temporary energy load reductions, also infamously known as rolling blackouts. The call for load reductions was employed to stabilize the regional power grid. Those efforts were successful, after the rolling blackouts power systems returned to normal service.

On Friday, Tennessee as a state had approximately 80,000 customers without power, and Georgia had over 100,000 residents without power. Georgia's number doesn't include another 120,000 residents which Georgia Power had returned to service by the close of business Friday. Georgia's Governor had already declared a state of emergency on Wednesday, anticipating the impacts of the winter storm.

On Friday, the Tennes-

see Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) activated to a Level 3-State of Emergency as the bitter cold blanketed the state.

The Level 3-State of Emergency designation indicates "a serious emergency or minor disaster has occurred, or a situation is deteriorating rapidly, and public warnings are issued." When this occurs the **States Emergency Operations** Center is activated.

Other states that declared an emergency include, Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, New York, Oklahoma, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Air traffic was seriously impacted by the storm as well. Reports on Tuesday the 27th indicated over 20,000 flights had been cancelled over the extended weekend. Road conditions across the

nation created havoc. Near Sandusky, Ohio a huge pileup involving 50 vehicles occurred on the Ohio Turnpike. This accident claimed the lives of four motorists.

The winter storm devastated New York and to date is responsible or 28 deaths in that state. New York authorities named the winter storm Elliot the "blizzard of the century." New York also experienced the most U.S. snowfall from Elliot, which was 39 inches recorded in Snyder, New York.

The city of Buffalo experienced some of the most ferocious consequences of the storm. After reviewing the conditions in Buffalo, New York's Governor, Kathy Hochul, was quoted as saying: "It is like go-

> to a war

zone, and the vehicles along the sides of the roads are shocking." President Joe Biden agreed, and on 12-26-2022, he declared a federal emergency for the state of New York, authorizing government assistance and a FEMA response.

Reviewing the United States as a whole, we were fortunate in Morgan County, Tennessee. Despite some frozen pipes, temporary power outages and very uncomfortable temperatures, Morgan County survived a "once in a generation" winter storm virtually unscathed.

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Should You Pay for Dog Training?

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I love my new puppy, Star. He is so easy to train, listens to my commands, and his potty training is going well. Still, I'm wondering if we should also work with a professional trainer. He has some resistance issues to certain commands, and he is a bit reactive to other dogs. Is this normal, or should I pay for training? — Ricardo G., Orlando, Florida

DEAR RICARDO: A good trainer can look at the most obedient dog in the world and find behaviors to work on. That's because no dog is perfect, and neither are we.

It sounds like you're doing a great job with Star, and you want to continue to level up his behavior training. This is a caring and responsible thing to do.

You've got a few training options to consider. While I personally prefer to train alongside my dog in a group or one-on-one training session, I have friends who send their dog to day camp where they receive obedience training and socialization while they're away at work. Others send their dogs to intensive one- to two-week programs.


You'll want to check out a potential trainer or training school carefully before committing. - * On Jan. 16, 1547, Ivan IV Vasilyevich (aka "Ivan the Terrible") crowned himself the first czar of Moscow. But was that nickname really deserved? Yes and no: "Terrible" more accurately meant "strong," "menacing" and "impressive" in his day, but there's no denying the ruler had a pretty fierce, and on occasion murderous, temper as well.
- * On Jan. 22, 1930, excavation began for the Empire State Building. Completed just a little more than a year after construction started, at 102 stories it held the record for world's tallest building until 1972, when it was succeeded by the city's World Trade Center.
- * On Jan. 17, 1949, the first Volkswagen Type 1, or Beetle, in the U.S. arrived from Germany. It was designed by Ferdinand Porsche at the request of Adolf Hitler and sold well because it was not just well built, but reasonably priced, soon becoming "America's budget car."
- * On Jan. 19, 1977, citizens of Miami received a jaw-droppingly unexpected gift from the sky -- a dusting of snow for the first time in the city's history. To date, it was also the last occurrence. Well, maybe next year ...
- * On Jan. 18, 1996, Lisa Marie Presley filed for divorce from Michael Jackson. Speculation as to the cause of the split ran as rampant as the questioning of the rather bizarre coupling in the first place, but Presley herself laid the blame simply on "irreconcilable differences."

Beware Aggrieved Empires

China sent 71 aircraft and seven ships toward Taiwan in a 24-hour period, while Russia shelled the Kherson region more than 70 times.

These acts of aggression -- occurring 5,000 miles apart, one in a grinding war of attrition, the other as part of an ongoing political and diplomatic struggle that may well result in open hostilities -- are related.

It's no accident that the two most dangerous powers in the world, China and Russia, are aggrieved empires seeking to right what they consider the wrongs that resulted in their humiliation and diminishment in the 19th and 20th centuries.

Whereas in the 2000s the most pressing problem of the international system seemed to be malicious sub-national groups operating in ungoverned spaces, now it is malicious would-be supranational entities seeking to take over spaces governed by others.

In his masterly book, "Diplomacy," Henry Kissinger observed, "Empires have no interest in operating within an international system; they aspire to be the international system."

The fall of the Roman Empire was a social and economic catastrophe for the West, but it's been a blessing that no such over-awing behemoth ever rose in its place.

Russia and China, in contrast, never lost their imperial DNA, and have chips on their shoulders.

Russia achieved some success in its long-running ambition to be considered a major European power through top-down reforms and military conquest. It gobbled up an estimated 50 square miles a day across a couple of centuries. But it lost the Crimean War in the mid-19th century, suffered a humiliating defeat at the hands of Japan in 1905, and then experienced utter cataclysm in World War I.

Marxism-Leninism was supposed to provide a way for backward Russia to leapfrog the West. That didn't happen, but Moscow established a new Communist empire of considerable extent. Of course, this came a cropper with defeat in the Cold War, an event that Vladimir Putin, notably, considers "the greatest geopolitical catastrophe of the century."

The man who has statues of Peter and Catherine the Great, accomplished Russian imperialists, on display in the Kremlin considers an independent Ukraine merely a tool of hostile Western forces and a wayward part of Greater Russia. Such ideas -- and a deep feeling of shame at Russia's fall -- justify the brutish attempted occupation and dismemberment of Ukraine, a cynical and crude operation even by Russian standards.

If Russia sought to be a respected member of the European club, China believed it needn't bother. It was the Middle Kingdom, the only civilization in a world of barbarians who owed it tribute and deference. Its sense of superiority was punctured by the Opium Wars in the middle of the 19th century and, as with Russia, a shocking defeat in a conflict with Japan.

Eventually, China, too, turned to Marxism-Leninism. After yet more humiliation and failure, the CCP now is fired with audacious visions of a return to imperial grandeur.

President Xi Jinping is more or less explicit about it. He has said that "since the Opium War of the 1840s the Chinese people have long cherished a dream of realizing a great national rejuvenation." Now, it is on the cusp of providing "a new option for other countries," and "a Chinese approach to solving the problems facing mankind." In short, "it will be an era that sees China moving closer to center stage."

This is a vision of Middle Kingdom redux, although couched in bloodless phrasing.

Xi views Taiwan much the same way as Putin views Ukraine -- it rightfully belongs to China, and re-taking it will help salve the geo-political and psychological wounds of imperial China's spectacular descent into disaster and powerlessness. "We cannot lose even one inch of the territory left behind by our ancestors," Xi told a U.S. official in 2018.

The war in Ukraine shows that when an autocrat ruling a once-great empire speaks in such terms, it is time to arm the targeted state to the teeth and dispense with all illusions.

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

Brad and Misty Bernall who lived in Littleton, Colorado had two children, Cassie, and Chris. They were in the

upper middle class and parents who really appeared to care about their children. Misty even quit her job at Lockheed Martin so she could spend more time with her kids.

You might say the Bernall family was like many families in the 1990's. Cassie was a Daddy's girl and when she came along it really changed Brad's life. He said I wanted to be with her a lot and do everything with her. When he left the house, she would crawl after him, cry and scream at the door until he was gone.

The Bernall's had their children in church a lot and everything seemed to go fine until Cassie was in the 8th grade. That is when she began to toss her parent's values and rules out the window in favor of a classmate's opinion.

While looking for a Bible that a relative had given her daughter Misty came across a stack of letters that would shock any parent. In one of the letters the bad classmate had written about one of her high school teachers. She invited Cassie to help her murder Mrs. S., the letter ended with drawings of knives, vampire teeth, and a caricature of Mrs. S. lying in a pool of blood, with knives protruding from her chest.

In one letter the writer when to great lengths to describe how much she hated her dad; and in another how much she adored Marylyn Manson. Cassie was advised to kill her parents. Murder is the answer to all our problems it said.

When her parents faced Cassie, she tried to play it down saying they were just fooling around. They didn't mean any of that.

Cassie's parents couldn't let this just slip by. They had to do something in addition to punishing her. First, they took the letters to their pastor and youth director at church. Cassie attended the youth group at West Bowles Community Church. They also took the letters to the police department. They received suggestions from both the church

and police department but were told you have done the right thing, now you need to stay on it

Cassie was really influenced by her youth group at West Bowles Community Church on March 8, 1997 she was "bornagain." The event was a life changing one. She even regarded this as her 2nd birthday.

Cassie like many of her friends struggled with trying to live a Christian life because of the many temptations that they faced every day. As Cassie and a friend put it the



birth of a baby is a wonderful thing, but it's only the opening act. The best part is watching it develop and grow.

Cassie certainly grew in her Christian faith but she was not considered overly religious by her classmates. She had got her wish to be transferred from a private school to Columbine in 1997.

April 20, 1999 started out like all other days at Columbine High School. The Bernall family had gotten up at around 5:30 am. Brad and Misty got ready to go to work but Misty didn't have to leave home until the kids had left.

Little did anyone know that two boys Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold would enter the school wearing trench coats and under them they had many guns and explosives (pipe bombs). They began shooting almost immediately. Cassie and her girlfriends had gone into the study hall to work on an English report. That is where the two misfits ended up. Many of the students had gotten under the library tables. Cassie was one of them. One of the shooters said as he entered the study hall, "we've been wanting to do this our whole lives." They were cheering after every shot.

They went over to Cassie who was trying to hide under a table. One of them asked her if she believed in God, and she

said, "yes." A witness said she didn't sound scared. It was strong, and when they asked her why they didn't give her a chance to respond. They just blew her away.

Twelve good people died in that massacre that day along with the shooters. Rachel Scott was another seventeen-year-old who stood up for her faith and she paid for it with her life. She had, had classes with both Harris and Klebold and had told them she didn't like their gory videos and their vio-

lence made her sick. She seemed to be targeted for her principles.

Cassie struggled like everyone else but she knew what she had to do to let Christ live in her. It's called dying to yourself, and it had to be done daily. It means learning to breach out of the selfish life... It's not a negative thing. There's several lessons we can learn from what happened that day at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999. First of all, what the parents of Cassie's did, helped her get back in church and have a desire to accept her parents' values.

The parents of the boys should have known what was going on in their homes. How could they make so many pipe bombs in their basement and no one be aware of it. Parents do not let things like the letters Cassie and her friend wrote just pass by.

IRS delays \$600 reporting rule

An IRS press release in late December announced a delay in the \$600 reporting rule for companies like PayPal and Venmo. The rule will no longer apply to the 2022 tax year.

The \$600 rule would have created IRS issues for many people this year. The IRS had previously warned taxpayers about filing their tax returns early due to the new \$600 threshold rule. One of the problems with the \$600 reporting rule was that the IRS

had no way of knowing if the money you received was taxable

The IRS said, "the law is not intended to track personal transactions such as sharing the cost of a car ride or meal, birth-day gifts, or paying a family member or another for a household bill"

The \$600 threshold amount was enacted as part of the American Rescue Plan of 2021. It was intended to begin with the 2022 tax year.

The IRS said that calendar year 2022 would be a transition period for implementing the new rule.

"The IRS and Treasury heard a number of concerns regarding the timeline of implementation of these changes under the American Rescue Plan," said Acting IRS Commissioner Doug O'Donnell. "To help smooth the transition and ensure clarity for taxpayers, tax professionals and industry, the IRS will delay implementation of the 1099-K changes. The additional time will help reduce confusion during the upcoming 2023 tax filing season and provide more time for taxpayers to prepare and understand the new reporting requirements."

The IRS believes that the law is essential because tax compliance is greater when amounts are required to be reported to the IRS, like the Form 1099-K. However, the IRS said it needs to be carefully managed to help ensure that 1099-Ks are only given to people who should receive them. In addition, everyone must understand what to do due to this new reporting.

The IRS said that additional details on the delay would be available soon. For people who may have already received a 1099-K, the IRS is working rapidly to provide instructions and clarity so everyone will understand what to do.

The IRS also said that the previous 1099-K reporting threshold of \$20,000 in payments from over 200 transactions would remain in effect.

The purpose of the law was to lower the tax gap between the amount people owed and the amount that they paid. A recent report by the Joint Committee on Taxation estimated that the law would bring in \$8.4 billion in tax revenue from 2021-2031.

The delay in the \$600 rule doesn't mean you aren't required to report all taxable income to the IRS.

A Heads Up at the Grocery Store

The time has come to study the labels of foods you buy, even if you've used those same products for a long time. Not only are manufacturers changing the size of the containers, they're changing the ingredients. At this point we need to take a very close look at what we're actually eating.

Changes to the ingredients in products we've always trusted might well be blamed on supply chain problems. If a manufacturer can't easily get one ingredient, they might substitute something else.

But it means that what you assumed you were getting might no longer be true.

If, for example, you have to keep an eye on your sodium levels, you might discover that the amount of salt in a particular food has increased. You might have to adjust how much you eat or look for a different product.

We can no longer grab a dozen eggs and assume all will be well. If you're baking, too-small eggs won't work in your baked goods recipes. You need to open the carton and look at them. If you're watching your cholesterol, you need to squint and read the fine print on the nutrition panel.

However, a warning: At the beginning of the pandemic, the Food and Drug Administration issued a temporary respite to food manufacturers. To help them keep producing food, the FDA said manufacturers didn't have to put certain new information on labels when "minor formulation changes" were made to food. The policy, started in January 2020, was intended to remain in effect only for the duration of the Covid pandemic and has been renewed every 90 days. It was to expire January 2023. Since they have to give 60 days notice to end the designation, it's not likely that it will end until April, if that.

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Titus Chapter 1

Author: Since the mid-eighteenth century, liberal critics have denied Paul's authorship of Titus, occasionally suggesting he might have written some fragments, but not the document as it is. But the evidence—both external and internal---for the genuineness of the book is compelling. Titus is cited by Clement of Rome, Ignatius, Justin Martyr, Tertullian, etc.---all close to the apostolic age. By the end of the second century, the books of Timothy and Titus were recognized as part of the New Testament throughout the world of Christendom and were not questioned until a couple of centuries ago. The internal evidence for genuineness is equally compelling. The multiple citations of personal names and places---matters easily open to examination in the days of the late-apostolic era---provide a sense of authenticity. There is no historical or logical reason to deny Paul's authorship of the narrative.

Date: It is impossible to fix a precise date to this letter. However, it is commonly recognized that the letter to Titus was written after the first letter to Timothy, yet before the second epistle to Timothy. Moreover, the matter is further complicated by the fact that it cannot be determined exactly where Paul was when this letter was written. Various points of origin have been suggested, Ephesus, Corinth, Nicopolis, or somewhere in Macedonia. Accordingly, suggested dates range from A.D. 63 to 67.

Purpose: Basically, the design of the book is threefold: Titus was to set things in order among the churches on the island of Crete (congregational leadership), he was to instruct concerning the danger of false teachers who could corrupt the faith of the saints, and he was to admonish and encourage godly living in the corrupt world of that day. One may assume that Paul had every confidence that his friend was qualified for such a noble task. Crete is a mountainous island near the entrance of the Aegean Sea (to the north). It is about 155 miles (east to west) by some 35 miles (north to south). There were people from this island present on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:11), and subsequently, at some point, Christianity was established there.

(Titus 1:1-4) Salutation: Paul introduces himself (for the benefit of others who would read the letter) as a "servant" of God (one who has surrendered all personal rights) and an "apostle" of Christ. "Apostle" is used in the official sense. The expression, "the faith," may refer either to one's personal faith that motivates obedience or to the gospel system. The expression, "common faith," demonstrates that there are not faiths from which one may choose to be right before God (v.4; Eph. 4:5; Jude 3). The "elect" refers to those "chosen by God" through the gospel (Eph. 1:4). The confidence of our salvation is grounded in God's integrity and is accessed through a "knowledge of the truth" as "manifested" in a message of words (not by a direct operation of the Spirit). "Eternal life" is both a present reality and a hope of the future (1 Tim. 4:8).

Titus was a Gentile missionary who worked closely with Paul on various occasions. With much affection, the apostle calls him "my true child after a common faith." This almost certainly indicates that Paul converted this man, who was to prove of much value in the cause of Christ (1 Tim. 1:2; 2 Tim. 1:2). Titus is mentioned thirteen times in the New Testament---all references by Paul. The term "true" indicates a legitimate child, brought to the Lord with the genuine gospel. Not everyone who thinks he is a "child of God" is one.

(Titus 1:5-9) Elders' Qualifications: One of Titus' duties was to

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appoint qualified elders (bishops, shepherds) in every city where qualified Christian men could be found. The "appointment" of elders would be a process, not a mere event. It would involve teaching the Christian men the qualifications that must be present in their lives and the responsibilities that would be associated with their work. It was not an enterprise that could be accomplished hastily (I Tim. 5:22). The qualifications are subsequently listed. There is a parallel catalog in 1Timothy 3:1. Here we will discuss only those unique to Titus. (a) An elder must have "children that believe." This almost certainly means Christian children, those old enough to have obeyed the gospel. And having done so under the tutelage of their father (1 Tim. 4:3, 10, 12; 5:16; 6:2), have remained faithful so that the father is accounted as "blameless" (see 1 Tim. 3:10). After children leave home, they are responsible for their own behavior. (b) He must not be "self-willed," stubborn, one who purses his own interests. (c) "Not soon angry" denotes one who does not have a hair-trigger temper. (d) "Lover of good" suggests an affection for truth, good people, etc. (e) He must "hold to the faithful word," remain steadfast personally and "hold out" against false doctrines. (f) Convicting "gainsayers" refers to identifying false teachings and battling against them. Elders must be up to the task of dealing with error. They must be able to recognize it and be willing to see that it is met head on! Because some are not so able and willing, churches are overcome by apostasy!

(Titus 1:10-16) Dealing with false teachers: After speaking of "gainsayers" (those who contradict truth), Paul becomes more specific. There are those who refuse to follow "rules" (religious outlaws). Their messages are "vain" (empty of content) and "deceitful" (misleading). Particularly was this true of certain Jews---or probably digressive church members with considerable Jewish "baggage." These heretics cannot be tolerated, for they are destroying families and teaching false ideas---even for mere money's sake (v. 10-11). Appealing to a Cretan writer, Paul argued that even their own people acknowledged their tendency to distort truth (v.12). This obviously was directed toward these lying false teachers afflicting good brethren

This defection warranted sharp rebuke so that, hopefully, these rebels might be won to "soundness" (healthy teaching) in the faith again. Some were yielding to Jewish influences---either antagonistic Jews or else Christians who had retained parts of Jewish law. The corrupters were advocating the "commandments of men" which were "turning" (a process underway already) sincere people away from the truth (v. 14).

Verse fifteen does not mean: "If one is pure in his motive, nothing he does is to be perceived as impure." Instead, it most likely is a warning about proto-Gnostic ascetics, somewhat in this sense: "To the clean (those who have been cleansed by their obedience to the gospel (Acts 22:16; 1 Cor. 6:11; Eph. 5:26) and have arrived at a fuller knowledge of truth), all things (foods, vessels, etc.) (Mk. 7:3-4) are clean, to be viewed no longer as ritually unclean)." These false teachers are "defiled," both intellectually and morally (v.15).


There are those who openly declare they "know God," but by their "works" (the actions of their lives) they "deny him." By example one may affirm or deny a proposition. They are depicted as "abominable" (detestable to God), "disobedient" to


gospel requirements, and "reprobate" (one who fails the divine test) (v. 16).

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Historically SpeakingHidden History: Stories from the Secret City

In June 2022, Hidden History: Stories from the Secret City, was recognized with the History in Media Award of the East Tennessee Historical Society. Keith McDaniel and I were honored to accept that award at the Annual meeting of the Society in Knoxville's East Tennessee History Center.

So how did this adventure begin for Keith and me? Like many things, we just kind of fell into it.

In early 2020, the world changed rapidly with most of us not realizing what was happening. However, by March 2020, we were amid a shutdown unprecedented in history. We are still feeling the effects of that economically, mentally, and physically.

The last week of February was an amazing last trip for Fanny and me and we did not realize that either. We were invited to Vail, CO, to participate in a most unusual "roundtable" of some 20 people with amazing stories. Ranging from a young Russian girl just 16 years old who had her legs amputated at the knees but who is a challenged athlete, to the first American to win a downhill skiing gold medal in the Olympics, to doctors who perform cataract surgery in the mountains of Himalaya, to a shark scientist, magicians, film producers, a Blue Angel pilot, a Navy Seal, and Ray and Fanny Smith. See what I mean? Oak Ridge history ranks right up there in the minds of the people arranging this three-day adventure.

The same week Fanny and I were in Vail, CO, the K-25 History Center opened as a roaring success. However, it closed just two weeks later and remained closed for the next year and a half. We hated to miss that opening, but you must understand we had a once-in-a-lifetime adventure that we just could not miss. We stayed in touch with those people via Zoom all through the pandemic.

It was then that Keith McDaniel and I were discussing the idea of a Podcast about Oak Ridge history. We were almost ready to record the first program when the COVID shutdown occurred. We were then unable to travel to record it together. I am not sure which of us first mentioned Zoom. It was available and just becoming a tool for communicating remotely. Rapidly it became common practice for people to use some form of group meetings online. We decided to give it a try. And that is how we "fell into it."

I think Keith said, why not make it a video cast since we are going to be using Zoom anyway. I agreed and off we went. We recorded the first program and Keith started a YouTube channel dedicated to the video cast. In late April 2020 the first two programs were posted. Since then, we have produced 63 programs each lasting some 40 minutes or so.

We began with the thought of featuring some local people who might have insight into Oak Ridge history that might not be well known, and thus the name Keith chose for the program became, Hidden History: Stories from the Secret City.

Mike Stallo was our first guest and we have had him on the program a few times since. Terry Domm was next, and he introduced the Oak Ridge History Museum that was just in the beginning stages when COVID delayed progress, but the museum is now one of Oak Ridge's featured attractions and among the most popular destinations for visitors.

From there we featured Steve Oliphant, the person who formed Secret City Hikes, a social media-based group that routinely hikes the 85 miles of greenways and the 40 or more miles of woodland hiking trails in Oak Ridge. Now, that is a hidden jewel enjoyed my many but unknown to others. Keith and I were still forming the idea of hidden history stories and began to realize just how easy it was to interview folks on

Zoom. Steve was in North Carolina!

Next, we had Katatra Vanquez to introduce her book, Atomic Hope. And we interviewed Alan Lowe and Matt Mullins about the American Museum of Science and Energy. The Manhattan Project National Historical Park's manager, Niki Nicholas, was an early guest and she provided information about what the Park Service was doing during the COVID shutdown. We will have Niki on again in 2023 as the Manhattan Project National Historical Park is rapidly becoming

a huge attraction for bringing visitors to Oak Ridge. Some things Niki has planned will enhance that even more and we will bring that story to you viewers.

Niki and Katy Watt of Explore Oak Ridge have already installed over 20 wayside markers around town. Have you found them all? More are coming. Also, the K-25 History Center's Viewing Platform will be coming in a few months and Niki and her staff are working with the wayside markers that will be installed around the K-25 Building footprint, which is designated as part of the park.

From there we began to expand our guest list significantly, always keeping a connection to Oak Ridge hidden history. Alan Carr, historian at Los Alamos National Laboratory was a guest, as was Richard Rhodes, author of The Making of the Atomic Bomb, Stan Norris, author of Racing for the Bomb, Clifton Truman Daniel, grandson of President Truman, Richard Groves, grandson of General Groves, and, even Todd Rider, who has an amazing online reference work on Germany's nuclear program during World War II and the scientists from Germany who have been key individuals in many of the scientific discoveries we take for granted today.

As we have continued the program every two weeks

with just a few gaps when schedules prevented us doing a program or two, it has become our normal pattern to have invited guests from as far away as the Netherlands. We have also featured stories that I believe would not be known otherwise. Such things as what is happening nationally with Cindy Kelly of the Atomic Heritage Foundation and in Albuquerque with Jim Walther who is soon to retire from his position as director of the National Museum of Nuclear Science and History. And we hope to continue featuring individuals with unique expertise from around the world.

I recently met Don Farrell, who lives on Tinian Island. He was working the Stephen Ambrose Tours of the Manhattan Project sites and their first stop was Oak Ridge. I spoke to them the evening they arrived and gave them a tour of Oak Ridge history the next day. It was a delight to meet Don and you can be sure he will be one of our invited guests on the program next year.

Another subject we will cover is the phenomenal short videos "Katie the Calutron Girl" that is being produced by Katy Watt of Explore Oak Ridge. That series of short videos was just honored with the 2022 Excellence in Tourism Award. So, Katy will be featured early in 2023 telling the story of how the videos came to be. And you know we could not miss Denise Kiernan, author of The Girls of Atomic City. She worked us into her busy schedule (again because of Zoom we can do wonders with special people and their busy schedules). We even had a Russian on the program. Alexei Dmitriev is a travel writer whom I met when he and his daughter came to visit Oak Ridge and I gave them an Oak Ridge history tour. As a result, he agreed to be on our program later. On February 6, 2021, he showed us the difference between what he saw in the United States versus Russia regarding once secret cities such as Oak Ridge. He also had an insightful comment regarding the Oak Ridge International Friendship Bell. Dried Beans Are Power Packed for Pennies

In January we're filled with fresh resolve to make the new year better than the last. For many people, that means reigning in both our waistlines and our wallets. If I told you I have one solution to both problems, and you said, "You're full of beans," you'd be right.

Ah, the humble bean. Here we have a budget-friendly vegetable protein with great fiber, loaded with vitamins and minerals, free of cholesterol and saturated fats, with a low glycemic index. Mix them with grains, and you have a complete protein that can replace the protein in meats. At a mere 25 cents per serving, dried beans are economical enough to feed the masses.

I recommend dried beans because they're about one-third the cost of canned beans. Dried beans, properly prepared, taste much better, have better nutrition and less sodium. How many other times do you get a superior product for less money? So, keep some canned beans in your pantry for when you need convenience above all else. But for beans that taste so good you won't want to share them, read on.

It takes minimal active time to prepare beans, and it's easy work.

It's mindless stuff you can do while you're on the phone with your sister.

As dried beans cook, they absorb the cooking liquid and triple in size. So 2 cups (1 pound) of dried beans will yield 6 cups of cooked beans. Incidentally, many recipes call for 15-ounce cans of beans, which is 1 3/4 cups of cooked beans.

Beans are prepared in three steps—clean, soak and cook. Unless you're using a pressure cooker, then you can skip the soak.

First, inspect the beans, discarding any discolored or cracked beans and removing any rocks or debris. Beans are an agricultural product, and grit happens.

Next, we soak. Soaking beans allows them to rehydrate before cooking. Another benefit is that soaking reduces the phytic acid that can cause gassiness. You don't need to soak split peas or lentils. These speedy beans only take about 30 minutes to cook.

Place 1 pound of cleaned beans in a large pot. For an overnight soak, add 8 cups of water and place in the fridge for eight to 24 hours. For a short soak, add 12 cups of water and bring to a

boil on the stovetop for 5 minutes. Remove pot from the heat and let the beans soak in hot water for an hour. When finished, drain and rinse the beans in a colander.

Finally, we cook. To cook on the stovetop, cover the beans with fresh water by 2 inches, optionally adding one minced onion and 2 teaspoons salt, and bring them to a boil. Then lower the heat and simmer for 60 to 90 minutes, depending on the variety of bean (follow package directions), or until the beans are tender. To test for tenderness, mash a bean against the side of the pot with a spoon.

To cook in a pressure cooker, such as an Instant Pot, place 1 pound beans, 8 cups water, one minced onion, two bay leaves and 1 1/2 teaspoons salt in the inner pot of a pressure cooker. Secure lid on Instant Pot and close valve to

"seal."

Cook on high pressure for the following times: black beans, 30 minutes; chickpeas, 40 minutes; kidney beans, 35 minutes; pinto beans or navy beans, 25 minutes. Allow the pot to naturally release 20 minutes before doing a quick release.

He is alive forevermore, and he is returning for his virgin bride very soon. John Burns 7-24-2022



Veteran of the Week

United States Navy veteran Lieutenant John William Finn fought in World War II as an Aviation Chief Ordnanceman while assigned to VP-14 Squadron (Patrol Planes Squadron).

For his heroic actions above the call of duty during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, Finn was awarded the Medal of Honor. He was presented with the Medal of Honor on board the U.S.S. Enterprise by ADM. Chester W. Nimitz on September 15, 1942.

His Medal of Honor citation reads: For extraordinary heroism distinguished service, and devotion above and beyond the call of duty. During the first attack by Japanese airplanes on the Naval Air Station, Kaneohe Bay, on 7 December 1941, Lt. (then A.C.O.M.) Finn promptly secured and manned a .50-caliber machine gun mounted on an instruction stand in a




completely exposed section of the parking ramp, which was under heavy enemy machine-gun strafing fire. Although painfully wounded many times, he continued to man this gun and to return the enemy's fire vigorously and with telling effect throughout the enemy strafing and bombing attacks and with complete disregard for his own personal safety. It was only by specific orders that he was persuaded to leave his post to seek medical attention. Following firstaid treatment, although obviously suffering much pain and moving with great difficulty, he returned to the squadron area and actively supervised the rearming of returning planes. His extraordinary heroism and conduct in this action were in keeping with the highest traditions of the U.S. Naval Service.

Reserve Deputy Brad Miller of the Maury County Sheriff's Office, Tennessee was killed in a vehicle crash on Highway 43 near Williamsport Pike while working a traffic detail at a construction zone.

Another vehicle struck Deputy Miller's patrol car from behind, pushing it from the roadway.

Deputy Miller had served with the Maury County Sheriff's Office for nineteen years. He



was sixty-eight-years-old and is survived by his wife, two children, four grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Get Your Money Faster With Direct Deposit

If you've ever had anything stolen out of your mailbox, or if a check has just failed to show up, you know the angst, trouble and problems that follow because of that missing money.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has a way to safeguard the benefit money that comes to you. The Veterans Benefits Banking Program, for veterans and beneficiaries, will do a direct deposit into your account.

According to the VA, if receiving a paper check, you're 16 times more likely to have it lost or stolen. You're 22 times more likely to have it go missing altogether and need to file a claim for it, which of course takes time. They say that since many veterans are using direct deposit, fraud has gone down by 93%.

And with direct deposit, you'll get your money faster. It suddenly just appears in your account, on time, every time, not making its way through the

postal system.

Through the banking program, there are 43 banking institutions that have signed up to provide low or no-cost checking and savings accounts. You can find those banks here: veteransbenefitsbanking.org/financial-institutions. (Don't miss the FAQ. A lot of questions are answered.) Scroll down to the list of banks. (I'm a fan of USAA.) If you already have a bank account (or credit union) and you like them, you can set up a direct deposit right into your account. Call the VA at 800-827-1000 and find more information at www.va.gov/change-direct-deposit.

It can take a little while to think about this kind of change if you've never had direct deposit. But it can be rather disconcerting to have a neighbor from a block away show up at your door with a check that was mistakenly delivered to them.

You can eliminate a big source of worry and potential problems if you consider signing up for direct deposit for your benefit payment.
