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Pet Sitting Can Be More Than a Side Job


DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I was recently laid off from my job as a programmer, and have been thinking about taking a new career direction. I'm tired of being stuck in an office all day. And I love being around pets. But is it really possible to make a good living working as a dog walker or a pet sitter? — Barry J., Cambridge, Massachusetts

DEAR BARRY: I know more than a few people who are full-time pet sitters and dog walkers. Most have their own business, while a few are employees of pet care companies. As you can imagine, the pay rates vary widely from person to person. ZipRecruiter reports that the average hourly wage, nationally, for pet sitters is about \$19.23.

I think it's great that you're considering a career change. But I recommend testing out the world of pet sitting first. Consider working part time for a pet-sitting company. Even better, if you know someone who does dog walking, ask to accompany them for one day to see what their job entails. Find out what the pitfalls of this business may be, and what makes it fun to do. Finally, offer to pet sit for a friend who's going out of town for a day or two to get direct experience and really see if it's something that you'd like to do full time. Next, visit the Small Business Administration's website (www. sba.gov) and check out its Learning Center section, which has several micro-courses that teach how to start up and run a small business. Being able to combine core business skills with a love for and dedication to pets is a great platform to start on. Best of luck.

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





Don't rewrite books

First, they came for Roald Dahl.

Anyone who thought the politically correct rewriting would stop at the irreverent author of such children's classics as "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" and "Fantastic Mr. Fox" was, of course, sadly mistaken.

The news that hundreds of changes have been made in Dahl's classics is now followed by word that Ian Fleming, the creator of James Bond, is getting an emergency rewrite as well.

This is a very bad idea.

For a start, where does it end? There's no limiting principle that would prevent the editing of nearly every great writer in the Western canon. Homer is cauldron of toxic masculinity. Chaucer, who has been removed from curricula at various universities, would need extensive re-working -- for the offense of relaying 14th-century attitudes toward women, if nothing else. As for Shakespeare, has anyone read "Othello"?

We get the word "bowdlerize" from Thomas Bowdler, who published a version of Shakespeare more appropriate for families in the early 19th century. He meant well, but his name has become synonymous with ham-fisted editing of texts for political or social reasons. The first Bowdler edition of the bard's works axed about 10% of the original, taking out blasphemous language and other unsettling material. The suicide of Ophelia, for instance, became an accidental drowning.

Even Bowdler, by the way, wasn't sure he was able to fix "Othello."

Then, there's the matter of the integrity of the record. Great authors use every word in a book for a reason. Changes in the language, even if done with care, change the meaning and the nature of the work. If Roald Dahl used colorful language to describe a character (and he quite often did) and it's stripped out for fear of offending people, say, with double chins, the character has been changed -without the author's permission and counter to how he published his work.

This is no more defensible than someone deciding Monet's water lilies should be an ever-so slightly different shade of green, or that Tchaikovsky should have written his "1812 Overture" in D-sharp minor instead of E-flat major.

Any such suggestions would be considered cultural vandalism and the same should apply to the woke rewriting of literature.

Relatedly, the edits of enduring works are never, ever going to do anything other than make them worse --less colorful, pointed, and eloquent. If nothing else, this is a basic question of literary talent and flair.

To return to the example of Dahl, he's been edited by an outfit called Inclusive Minds ("passionate about inclusion, diversity, equality and accessibility in children's literature"). To put it simply, Dahl was good at writing; Inclusive Minds is good at DEI. If any editor at Inclusive Minds had a fraction of Dahl's abilities, this remarkable person wouldn't be working at expurgating someone else's works but writing his or her own beloved children's books.

Finally, we call classics "timeless" because they are imbued



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with a quality of genius that transcends the fashions of their time and our own. Trying to constantly rewrite them to keep up with the latest trends, which may well seem idiotic in due course (fingers crossed), is a fool's errand.

It is also inherently sinister. There's a reason that everyone naturally recoils from Winston Smith's work in "1984" in the Records Department of the Ministry of Truth, changing old newspaper articles and photographs to update them in keeping with the dictates of the party. The falsity, the thoroughness, and the need for control, extending all the way to the past, are all disturbing hallmarks of totalitarian politics.

Now, it's not a party that is demanding the reworking of inconvenient texts, but a corrupted part of our culture that can't abide the idea that offensive, or potentially offensive, terms and descriptions exist in books that have demonstrated astonishing popularity and staying power. There's no doubt who the giants are here and who are the small-minded censors.

Will We See Hank Williams Sr. in Heaven?

Most of you have heard of Hank Williams Sr. and his drinking problem that kept him off the Grand Ole Opry for years and when he finally got on the

Opry it was the reason, he was fired in 1952.

You no doubt heard about his talent for writing songs and in performing those songs made him the most popular singer of the day.

We as humans cannot and should not judge Hank Williams Sr. on these two things nor should we be the judge on anyone's salvation.

Hank Williams certainly left a legacy that goes on and on. His records that sold millions are still popular today and many other singers sing or sang songs that Hank wrote. He was one of the first inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame. Few American performers manage to touch our consciousness long after they die, but Hank certainly did. His fame is assured for the rest of our lifetime and beyond.

What some of you don't know is that Hank was in church most of his youth and he wrote many gospel songs. His two most popular gospel songs are, "I Saw the Light" and "House of Gold" both are great songs that country singers love to sing, counting me. In addition, he wrote "How Can You Refuse Him Now," "Calling You," "Jesus Remember Me," "Are You Walking and Talking to the Lord," and "When the Book of Life is Read." Add over fifty more to this number and know that Hank not only concentrated on secular songs. But writing gospel songs and singing them will not or did not save him.

But I know the plan of salvation and I got to know a minister that served the folks at a church about 25 miles east of Bradenton, Florida. It was at Bethany Church and his name was Brother Henry. Brother Henry told me and other folks that he had attended a country music concert in Tampa that featured Hank Williams Sr. I think this was in 1951-52, a couple of years before Hank's death. Brother Henry said after Hank performed he wanted to go back stage and talk with the real Hank Williams. Thankfully Hank had the time to talk to one of his biggest fans. Henry at the time was praying for the ministry so he asked Hank Williams if he knew the Lord. He said, "Yes, I'm a Christian but the old devil will not leave me alone. I need to get off the bottle because whiskey is about to drag me down." He said he went to church a lot as a youth and the first song he wrote was a gospel song. He

wrote it at the age of nine.

Not everyone knew about his dominant mother, and weak father but they probably heard about the domineering wife, deep dependance on the bottle and later drugs; not many know of the crippling birth defect called spina bifida occulta a birth defect fatal unless treated in childhood. Hank's wasn't.



So, you see why Hank drank and later took drugs. He was in constant pain. Hank was booked to do a New Years show in Canton, Ohio, for which he and his driver left Montgomery on December 30. He drank and took pills, and died in Oak Hill, West Virginia in the back seat of one of his caddies.

To me it seems that the cards were stacked against him in that he had this fatal childhood defect, he had married a controlling woman, and his body was deteriorating. Every song he was putting out was topping the charts and sold millions of records. His most enduring songs were, "I Can't Help It" and "Hey Good Looking" were selling like hotcakes. As "Setting the Woods on Fire" and "I'll Never Get Out of this World Alive" headed to the top, his body was failing fast.

Yes, I believe this young preacher in Florida got the truth from Hank Williams in Tampa. Hank said he was a Christian. Brother Henry was Baptist, and he believed once saved, always saved. I imagine Hank Williams asked God to forgive him many times for his drinking.

If you have ever heard his song, "House of Gold" you know that Hank Williams knew what salvation was all about.

Post Script

In reality only Hank Williams and God know whether he was saved or not. But if he told Brother Henry he was saved and in light of all the gospel songs that he wrote and sang most people would put him in the category.

IRS fixes refund trap

The refund trap occurs when there are different credit and refund deadlines. If you discover missed credits in previous years, it's important to know the deadline to avoid missing your additional refund. The IRS fixed a problem that could have prevented you from claiming overdue COVID-19-related tax refunds from the last few years.

You can claim refunds and credits if Columnist you make the request within three years from the date your return was filed or two years from the date your tax was paid, whichever is later.

For example, suppose you were an employee in 2019. The original due date for filing your tax return was April 15, 2020. Your tax withholding from your paycheck would be deemed by the IRS to have been paid on April 15, 2020. However, the filing deadline was postponed to July 15, 2020. This situation would cause a payment date that was different from your filing date deadline.

Refunds claimed within three years from when the return was filed are limited to the tax payments made within those three years, according to the lookback clause.

The timeframe allowed to claim credits and refunds and credits are called the "lookback" clause by the IRS.

The National Taxpayer Advocate recommended that the IRS fix the problem permanently and protect the "taxpayer's right to pay no more than the amount of tax."

"I am pleased the IRS addressed this issue for TYs 2019 and 2020. However, the relief offered in this notice is limited to only the COVID-19-related postponements and doesn't offer a

permanent solution for other disaster relief," Erin M. Collins, the National Taxpayer Advocate, wrote in a blog this week. "Therefore, I have made a legislative recommendation for the last couple of years that would fix this problem permanently and prevent taxpayers from being harmed and falling into a trap for the unwary.'

The new IRS ruling only applies to the 2020 and 2021 tax-filing seasons for 2019 and 2020 tax returns, respectively. But the IRS often delays tax-filing deadlines for disasters, such as hurricanes and floods. A future delay of tax-filing deadlines could result in some people could face the refund trap again.

It's common for people to realize they missed a deduction or credit after they filed their return. The IRS receives about 3 million amended tax returns annually, according to recent release by the IRS. Amending your tax return allows you to retroactively claim a credit that was not on the original return.

In 2019 the deadline was postponed from April 16, 2020, to July 15, 2020. Almost 22% of the returns were filed during the postponement period. The people who filed during the postponement period could potentially be in the refund trap if they tried to claim refunds or credits for 2019.

If you are filing for an additional refund, don't miss the deadline.

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apter 8 ebrews

(Hebrews 8:1-6) Christ's heavenly priesthood: the inspired writer hopes they can appreciate his point: the Christian's high priest, having ascended in the heavens, has sat down on the right hand of the throne of the majesty on high (1:3). There was no seat for the high priest in the holy of holies for use on the day of atonement, for sacrificial work was never completed under that order. The seating of Christ following his sacrifice suggested it would never need repeating.

Jesus is a minister (one who serves in a priestly capacity) in the sanctuary (place of holy things), also designated as the true tabernacle. The true is that which the symbolic copy represented. In the Old Testament order of things, the holy of holies in the tabernacle prefigured heaven (v. 2). High priests were appointed to offer gifts and sacrifices. Since Christ serves in this manner, it was imperative that he have something to sacrifice (v. 3). This, of course, was himself. He could not have served as a priest in this earthly domain because there already were those appointed for earthly priesthood, and they had to be from the tribe of Levi---which the Lord was not (v. 4; 7:14). (Christ could not serve as an earthly priest. But he was to serve as priest and king simultaneously (Psa. 110; Zech. 6:12-14). He therefore could not reign as a king on earth. It thus had to be a heavenly reign. This demolishes the millennial theory of an earthly reign of Jesus.)

Earthly priests were appointed to serve in a capacity which was but a copy, a shadow, of heavenly things. Why would one wish to cling to the copy and reject the heavenly reality? Yet that was what the Judaizers were doing and are still doing. But the copy played an important role in foreshadowing the reality. That is why Moses was warned to construct the tabernacle (with its holy place and most holy place) according to the pattern revealed to him at Sinai (v. 5). (If the type (the holy place) had to conform to the pattern, why would not the anti-type (the church (1 Tim. 3:15) likewise have to conform to the pattern laid down in the New Testament?)

Christ's ministry (v. 2) is declared to be more excellent. The comparative term is an incidental reference to the old covenant. And whereas Moses was the mediator God used in conveying the first covenant (Gal. 3:19), so now the Lord Jesus is the mediator of a better covenant, grounded upon better promises (v. 6). Again, an implied question would be: "Why abandon something that is better than that with which it is contrasted." The Judaizers are theologically irrational!

(Hebrews 8:7-13) the first and second covenants contrasted: the author continues with his juxtaposition of the two systems. (In this connection 2 Corinthians 3:6-11 "Who also hath made us (the apostles) able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life. But if the ministration of death, written and engraven in stones (old covenant), was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not stedfastly behold the face of Moses for the glory of his countenance; which glory was to be done away: How shall not the ministration of the spirit be rather glorious? For if the ministration of condemnation be glory, much more doth the ministration of righteousness exceed in glory. For even that which was made glorious had no glory in this respect, by reason of the glory



that excelleth. For if that which is done away was glorious, much more that which remaineth is glorious"). If the first covenant had been faultless, a second one would not have been given to replace it. How could the first covenant be faulted, since it was given by God? It was not characterized by fault in the sense that it was incorrectly designed or morally flawed. It was perfect to do what it was intended to do. Moses' law had only animal sacrifices to atome for sin in satisfying divine justice (Rom. 3:21); such could never have been efficacious in providing redemption (Gal. 4:4; Heb. 9:15; 10:1, 4). The second covenant, with Jesus' blood behind it, is faultless. Only a foolish person would trade the faultless for that which has fault.

The writer now changes the point of emphasis from the inherent fault of the Mosaic covenant, to that of the people to whom that covenant was given (v. 8). Israel could not keep it perfectly (which was required (Gal. 3:10), and frequently did not even try. By their sins, therefore, they were guilty of serious fault. Nevertheless, centuries in advance, the prophets had heralded the coming of a new covenant. One example is found in Jeremiah. An extended quotation from that prophet is now introduced.

Note the following particulars: (a) The speaker is Jehovah; the coming days are those of the Christian age. The Hebrew text has last days (Joel 2:28, Acts 2:17). (b) The Lord would make a new covenant with the nation of Israel. From other texts one learns that Gentiles will be included (Isa. 2:2-4). The giving of a new one implies the cancellation of the old. (c) It will be of a different nature from that given to Israel when the Lord brought them to Sinai. This demonstrates that the ten commandments were included in the abolition of the old covenant, a truth that Sabbatarians deny. (d) Israel refused to continue in the law given, and such displeased God greatly, because they continued not in the first covenant. (e) There would be, therefore, another covenant given after those days, the days of Israel's unique relationship with the Lord. This new covenant would be with another Israel, spiritual Israel, the church (Mt. 21:43; Gal. 3:29; 6:16). The days of physical Israel were numbered. God would not favor that nation indefinitely. (f) Under the new system, those in covenant relationship with Jehovah would be required to learn God's laws, and from their hearts obey them (Rom. 6:17). This was quite unlike the situation in ancient Israel when children were physically born into a relationship with the Lord and subsequently had to learn what it was about as they matured. They first must be taught before they could come to know him, and all in covenant relationship with him would know him. This eliminates infants. (g) Under the new covenant, the Lord would be merciful to their iniquities (a disposition of lawlessness) and remember no more their sins (missing the mark of the divine standard for conduct). The expression, remember no more, is a reminder that the sins committed under Moses' law were remembered year by year (10:3).

Finally, the writer says that when Jeremiah spoke of a covenant that was new he had indicated (permanently, so the verbal tense suggests) the first covenant was old. To prove his point, he notes the well-known principle---when one speaks of something as old, he admits it is near unto vanishing away. As a legally binding system, it did die---when Christ died!

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Historically Speaking Molly Brown, Part Two

Less than two decades since her 2004 Oak Ridge High School (ORHS) graduation, Molly Brown now serves in an important leadership role concerning our national security. It was her teenage age dream for her future to be involved in government work and living in Washington, DC. She is currently a Deputy Program Manager within the U.S. Navy Strategic Systems Programs command. A partial snapshot of her numerous responsibilities include: to research and analyze issues involving strategic arms control treaty implementation and compliances, to manage aspects of the U.S. Navy's responsibilities under the New START Treaty, and to represent the U.S. Navy Strategic Systems Program as a technical advisor to the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Molly's Northwestern University undergraduate degrees in Political Science and International Studies were followed by her first assignment as a National Security Analyst for the Computer Science Corporation in Alexandria, VA. This job introduced her to her future, specialized career path.

I asked Molly to give an overview of her career journey. She wrote, "I stumbled upon the arms control treaties and agreement world with my first job and have stayed in the niche field since. I started working on chemical and biological treaties, eventually working my way to the Compliance Assessment Group who were responsible for ensuring all Navy activities are compliant with those international laws as well as the domestic laws requiring compliance. I found myself the Deputy of a Safety Working Group for a new weapon system that is still under development. While executing that role, I demonstrated my ability to work with people and manage large scale processes which led to being offered the New START Treaty Deputy Program Manager position which I still hold." The New START Treaty, an agreement signed by the United States and Russian Federation in 2011, places limits on strategic offensive arms with the requirement to maintain those limits as long as the treaty is in effect. Currently, New START has been extended until February 4, 2026. Per the New START Treaty text, the U.S. and Russia meet within the Bilateral Consultative Commission in Geneva to discuss issues of implementation. Molly said, "In my role with the Navy, I have attended as technical advisor to the Joint Staff." Molly's employment with the U.S. Navy began in 2012 where she first served as a Program Analyst. She advanced to the position of Deputy Program Manager in 2018, one month before earning a Master of Policy Management degree from Georgetown University. I asked Molly for advice for high school students who might want to pursue a similar career path. Molly answered, "I would recommend a strong liberal arts background with excellent communications skills. You need to be able to process complex problems, develop solutions, and effectively communicate those to your target audience." During Covid restrictions, Molly worked from home fulltime for two months. Now her work schedule is hybrid, meaning virtual work from home combined with in-person office work and travel for necessary mission support.

Covid confinement prompted Molly to adopt a mini-golden doodle, named Jane, who she confesses is a very spoiled dog.

Her work involves traveling, most recently to Switzerland in October 2021 for the Bilateral Consultative Commission where meetings with Russian delegates were held. She described other work-related travels. "I ensure Navy facilities are prepared to execute inspections per the New START Treaty including attending training events throughout the year. I greatly enjoy getting to go to our Navy bases and meeting sailors on our Ohio Class Submarines who are protecting

Molly said she has developed a love of traveling: "Rome and Rio are the favorite cities I have visited. They are so unique. Rome for all the history around every corner, and Rio for how nature feels like a built-in, main part of the city." Molly often returns to her Tennessee family. She mentioned a June 2022 trip to a reunion of the Crozier and Hopper families. The weekend activities, attended by some 200 relatives, included a visit to the Hopper family homestead in Oliver Springs. Molly is passionate about her service with the Daryll Chappell Foundation where she is a cochair of the Board of Directors. This opportunity has offered an ethnic and artistic element in Molly's social life. She wrote, "The Darryl Chappell Foundation seeks to enable Afrodescendant visual artists to achieve their highest potential. We accomplish this by sponsoring artist-in-residence programs, by facilitating an Artists Talk series, by issuing unrestricted funding for visual artists, and by curating an online Artists Marketplace featuring artists and their work commission-free."

Molly desires to continue her work in the US Navy's Strategic Systems Program. She wrote, "I plan to continue government service, a job where I feel like my work is helping to maintain global stability." I asked her to comment on the importance of civil service workers in government. She effused over the many people she has worked with in what she called "the Department of Defense world," civilian service workers whom she was sure could earn much more money in the private sector. She said, "Their sense of duty and patriotism is exemplary. They are selflessly dedicated to securing

and maintaining the nation's position in the world and to keeping Americans safe."

Molly's job has international impact, and so I asked her about international relationships and the effect on her work. She answered, "I am not directly involved, but I will feel the effects of world geopolitics in my job as well as different Presidential administrations having different goals when it comes to arms control. As the New START Treaty is between the U. S. and Russia, it's impossible not to pay attention to what is happening in the world."

Molly is an ORHS alumna whose talents quietly and powerfully contribute to a vitally important national mission. Thus, she makes not only her large local family proud but also the local community who is honored to claim her. I, for one, will rest better knowing that she is where she is and that she is committed to and vigilantly pursuing our national wellbeing. Thank you, Molly, for your service. 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Ukrainian War losing Popularity?



As the war in Ukraine drags on and global tensions increase

sions increase it is expected that the public se and rethink

will take a pause and rethink their position on the conflict. Public support is always a critical facet to any successful military operation. Many wars have been won or lost based solely on how a nations population support their governments position. There are now clear signs that global support for Ukraine is waning, and many are leaning towards a diplomatic solution. Will this play into Putin's strategy, or will international opinion and support continue for Ukraine until Russia is pushed back into their own legitimate borders?

Here are the facts, over the last weekend in February, thousands of Germans demonstrated against giving more weapons to Ukraine. It was reported that over 13,000 demonstrators gathered at the Brandenburg Gate carrying signs that read: "Helmets today, tanks tomorrow, the day after tomorrow your sons." These demonstrations in Germany are a clear sign that the German public is nervous as to the conflicts potential consequences.

In America there are also cracks forming in overall support for Ukraine. According to a survey by Pew Research Center between March of 2022, and January of 2023, there was a noticeable decline in Americans viewing the war as a major threat to U.S. interests. The same survey went on to state concerning the Biden administrations response to the Russian invasion: "Among U.S. adults overall, 43% strongly or somewhat approved of the administration's response to the invasion, while 34% strongly or somewhat disapproved. Around one-in-five adults (22%) were not sure." Those numbers are not impressive and appear to indicate that Ukraine support is beginning to diminish. This is most likely the result of many domestic issues that are plaguing Americans such as, the rising costs of food and gas, inflation, a potential nearterm recession and a southern border crisis.

The Brookings Institute seems to evidence up my assertions in a recent article. They state that when Americans are asked

what are top five most important foreign policy issues facing the United States. They responded with the following priorities, 1. Terrorism, 2. Immigration, 3. Cyber Attacks, 4. Drug Trafficking, and 5. Climate Change.

The final piece to the Ukraine support puzzle is the amount of support being provided by its neighbors. According to the Huffington Post, Kiel Institute researchers were quoted as saying about U.S. support for the Ukraine War: "It is remarkable that the US alone has committed considerably more than all EU countries combined, in whose immediate neighborhood the war is raging."

We are certain to see this information reappear in the 2024 Presidential Election Cycle. I doubt many Americans will welcome the fact that the United States is paying more for European security than the European countries themselves! In conclusion, it appears that public support for Ukraine will continue to diminish unless Putin perpetrates another event that further inflames the global community. These facts also point towards the need for Ukraine to defeat Russia quickly on the battlefield before they are forced into diplomacy with Russia, which is certainly a ever growing potential outcome of this conflict.



MoCo Today's Veteran of the Week

United States Army veteran Colonel Paris D. Davis was awarded the Medal of Honor at the White House by President Joseph Biden on March 3, 2023.

Colonel Paris fought in the Vietnam War while assigned to Team A-321, 5TH Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1ST Special Forces.

Paris Davis was born in 1939, in Cleveland, Ohio. As a young man, he became interested in the military and sports, and he pursued both at Southern University, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, where he studied political science on an ROTC scholarship.

Davis was commissioned as an Army reserve armor officer in 1959, graduated from Airborne and Ranger schools in 1960, and was selected for the 7TH Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1ST Special Forces, serving first in Korea and then Vietnam.

Davis first deployed to Vietnam in 1962 and again in 1965, where he was promoted to captain as a detachment commander with the 5TH Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1ST Special Forces making him one of the first African American Special Forces officers as the civil rights movement gained momentum at home.

In Binh Dinh province, Davis and his men were tasked with training a force of local volunteers. On June 18, 1965, he commanded a team of inexperience South Vietnamese, along with the Special Forces Soldiers, against a superior enemy force. Over the course of two days, Davis selflessly led a charge to neutralize enemy emplacement, called for precision artillery fire, engaged in hand-to-hand combat with the enemy, and prevented the capture of three American Soldiers (Robert Brown, John Reinberg, and Billy Waugh) while saving



their lives with a medical extraction. Davis sustained multiple gunshot and grenade fragment wounds during the 19-hour battle and refused to leave the battlefield until his men were safely removed.

For these heroic acts during his second tour in Vietnam, Davis received the Silver Star, the Bronze Star Medal with "V" device, a Purple Heart with one Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Air Medal with "V" device. He was also awarded the Soldier's Medal for heroism, when he saved the life of a Soldier, a driver who was stuck in an

overturned and burning fuel truck. Davis pulled the Soldier from the truck just before it exploded. Davis is one of only four service members in U.S. military history to receive both the Soldier's Medal and the Medal of Honor.

Davis attended the Command and General Staff College in 1971 and the Naval War College in 1980. He served with the Army Staff, the Office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Headquarters, U.S. Army European Command.

Davis assumed command of the 10TH Special Forces Group, Fort Devens, Massachusetts, and was promoted to colonel in 1981. Davis retired from the Army on July 30, 1985. He holds a master's degree in public affairs from Southern Illinois University, and a Ph.D. in public administration from Northern Virginia University. In 2019, he was inducted into the U.S. Army Ranger Hall of Fame.

Davis is a proud father of three children. Following his military career, Davis published the Metro Herald newspaper for 30 years in Alexandria, Virginia, where he now lives.

Law Enforcement Officer of the Week

Police Officer Andres Vasquez-Lasso of the Chicago Police Department, Illinois was shot and killed on March 1, 2023 while responding to a domestic incident at 4:34 pm.

Officers were responding to a call about a man chasing a woman down the street with a gun. One group of officers went to the residence while other officers located the subject on foot. They were able to engage with the subject, but he fled from the officers. Shots were exchanged as Officer Vasquez-Lasso pursued the subject, both were wounded.



Officer Vasquez-Lasso was transported to Mt. Sinai Hospital where he succumbed to his wounds.

The subject was taken to the hospital in critical condition.

Officer Vasquez-Lasso had served with the Chicago Police Department for five years and was assigned to the Eighth District. He was only thirty-two-years-old and is survived by his wife and daughter.

- What kind of COVID-19 Vaccine does MCMC give?

MCMC carries Moderna COVID 19 immunizations, ready to be administered at any time. This is an MRNA vaccine that is designed to help your body learn how to make antibodies to fight against COVID 19. This will help you avoid getting sick if you are exposed to COVID 19, and if you should become sick with COVID 19, these will help your immune system to have a better response to fight off the virus. MCMC carries both the initial primary 2 shot series, as well as the updated Bivalent COVID 19 boosters.

- What ages can MCMC vaccinate?

MCMC carries Moderna COVID 19 immunizations for ages 6 months and up. Both primary series and Bivalent Boosters are available for all ages.

- Who can have boosters and when?

You can have a booster when:

- It has been at least 2 months since your 2nd or 3rd dose of an MRNA COVID vaccine

Reports From the VA Office of Inspector General

Who would have thought it ... stealing diabetic test strips for profit? Apparently there's money to be made from those medical supplies. And one Michigan woman, in charge of procurement at a Department of Veterans Affairs pharmacy, made a lot of it, stealing in excess of 7,500 boxes of the strips over the years.

She wasn't alone in the scheme. She'd sell them to a co-thief who'd make her own sales down the line to a third party in Pennsylvania.

The first in line in the theft chain has already confessed and faces 20 years in the slammer, not to mention a very hefty fine. The second in line also confessed. The two of them, however, are pointing fingers at Number Three, who they say is the actual mastermind of the thefts.


Diabetic test strips? Who knew?

Then there is the New Jersey former Marine who claimed PTSD from having to handle human remains after natural disasters in two foreign countries. Before his scheme fell apart, he'd netted in excess of \$118,000 in disability benefits. His big mistake, besides telling lies, was that he sent threatening messages to a member of the Office of Inspector General staff, plus anyone else who would be working on the case. He'll be sentenced this summer, but he's looking at 10 years in prison and heavy fines just for the lying part, and five years for the threats as well as big fines.

In Oklahoma, a man phoned a VA facility threatening to kill people ... and then he showed up. His beef, apparently, was not getting a quicker appointment date to be seen at the clinic. He wanted his meds, and he gave them 30 minutes to prescribe them or he'd be there to murder people. Not only did he have a loaded .357 firearm (and a handful of zip ties), but he took the items into a federal facility. He later claimed not to remember making the call.
