



Hi Ms Avery Pearl!

I hope you and your family are doing well. I am sure you are all thrilled with the new member of the family, Ms Ivory. Thank you for the questions about people using their teeth for tasks other than eating. Here is some important information because TEETH ARE NOT TOOLS.

We have all done it, using our teeth for tasks other than what they are intended to and built for. Some of their functions are chewing food, speaking, supporting the lips and cheeks, and making a beautiful smile. None of their functions include such things as: nail clippers, bottle openers, package opener, or "a third hand" to carry things. A few situations for you to think of when this is done are: holding bobby pins or hair clips with your teeth, fishermen using their teeth to cut fishing line, parents using them to tear open packages for their little ones (we often have our hands full), or pulling a cork out of a bottle of wine.

Most people think their teeth are strong enough to handle such tasks. Others think teeth are meant to

take on these tough jobs. In general, a healthy tooth will not chip or break during normal function. During chewing and speaking, the teeth do not touch. During chewing, food separates the teeth. The teeth are naturally separated during normal speech. Abnormal use of the teeth will damage them. Healthy teeth do NOT have the perfect design to tear open packages, cut

fishing lines, and hold bobby pins. And that just applies to healthy teeth. When teeth are not healthy and strong, the risk for damage from abnormal activity is extremely high. Teeth that have active decay or extensive dental work are weaker than natural teeth and will suffer damage much more easily. Using your teeth as tools can also break or dis-

lodge existing dental work, so you might have crowns or fillings fall out. Cracked teeth are weaker and more likely to crack or break even further. Areas where enamel has chipped away expose the inner structure of the tooth to cavity-causing bacteria.

So let's say that you did not know all of the previous information and you have been using your teeth as tools. What is involved in the repair process? It will depend on the extent of the damage. Some minor chips in the teeth are simply repaired with a tooth colored filling. A broken crown or veneer requires complete replacement because porcelain cannot be repaired. If damage is severe it may lead to an extraction or root canal. So to prevent any of this from happening, and now you know... DO NOT USE YOUR TEETH AS TOOLS.

All eyes are on the upcoming Presidential race and the speculation is all over the map. Will Donald Trump be in jail? Will Joe Biden receive the democratic nomination? These are just a few of the questions being tossed around in the media.



Year-end Business Tax Strategies

Year-end tax strategies can save businesses a substantial amount of taxes. There are many tax-saving strategies and multiple strategies can be used for increased savings. This article contains several of these strategies..

Temporarily quit billing patients and customers. If your business is on a cash basis, you can stop billing for the remainder of the year to reduce your income. Cash-based accounting records revenue when it is received and records expenses when they are paid. Customers and patients can't pay you if they haven't been billed. This allows you to move the taxes to next year. This strategy is even more effective if you've had a very profitable year and expect the profit to decline next year.

Prepay your expenses. IRS Regulation 1026(a)-4(f) has a safe-harbor rule that enables cash-basis businesses to prepay and deduct qualifying expenses up to 12 months in advance without any challenges and changes by the IRS. Qualifying expenses include payments for business vehicles and equipment, rent and lease, and business insurance. Some landlords wouldn't be happy to receive a large payment for next year in the current year. You can avoid this problem by sending the payment by certified mail on December 31. The receipt will prove that you mailed your payment in the current year and the delivery receipt will provide proof that the landlord received the payment next year.

Buy equipment. Bonus depreciation and Section 179 can both be used to expense equipment in the current year rather than depreciating it over several years.

Get a credit for setting up a retirement plan. Eligible employers may be able to claim a tax credit of up to \$5,000 for three years, for the costs of setting up a retirement plan. You can also choose to start claiming the credit in the year before the tax year in which the plan becomes effective.

Make a credit card purchase before midnight on New Year's Eve. Credit card purchases are deductible on the date of the purchase. Sole proprietors can use their personal credit cards to make the payment. If you have a corporate credit card, the deduction is taken on the day of the purchase. If you use your personal credit card to make a purchase for your corporation, the deduction is taken on the day the corporation reimburses you for the purchase. Offset capital gains with capital losses. The maximum short-term capital gains rate is a maximum of 37% in 2023, depending on your tax bracket. Selling stock at a loss will offset gains.

Reimburse your Section 105 Medical expenses. If you previously set up a husband-and-wife Section 105 medical reimbursement, make medical reimbursements before midnight on December 31.



The Tennessee College of Applied Technology Oneida/Huntsville recognized Johnnie Long and awarded him the Chancellor's Commendation for Military Veterans. Mr. Long is a student enrolled in the Tennessee College of Applied Technology Oneida/Huntsville evening Welding Technology Program taught at the Morgan County Career and Technical Center satellite campus in Wartburg, Tennessee.

Mr. Long joined the United States Air Force in 1968. He did his base training at Lackland Air Force Base in Texas. From there he was stationed at Sawyer Air Force Base in Michigan. In 1969 he was sent to the Da Nang Air Base in Vietnam. He served 2 tours of duty in Vietnam.

After his tours in the Vietnam War he was stationed in Columbus, Missouri and Charlston, South Carolina before he was sent to U-Tapao Air Base in Thailand. He was transferred from there to Eielson Air Force Base in Fairbanks, Alaska where he was stationed for 5 years. He retired in 1988 as an E6 Technical Sergeant with over 20 years of service in the United States Air Force.

During his military career he performed maintenance on aircraft and other machinery used by the U.S. Air Force. Upon retirement, he returned to Tennessee where he started J & M Trucking. After 5 or 6 years of ownership, he sold the company and worked at Averitt Trucking as a professional driver until he retired.

Mr. Long is a unique student in the fact that he is a Vietnam Veteran who is 74 years old working to improve his welding skills by enrolling in a college program. It is also unique that his wife Derita is a student in the evening Welding Technology program. He is an outspoken advocate for the welding program at TCAT Oneida/Huntsville. 



Mama always looked forward to Christmas and having our large family to come in. When everyone got here, we were wall to wall with people. Many of the kids had to sit in the floor and somehow, we always managed for adults to have a sitting place.

There was one thing that Mama dreaded about Christmas and that was the men were binge-drinkers and since they were off from work, I guess it was a good time to pull a good drunk. Mama didn't allow whiskey or beer in the house so they hid the bottles in grandpa's crib.

Mama had talked to Daddy about it many times but I guess the temptation was too strong. Maybe, she thought this Christmas would be better.

We all hoped so, especially for the little ones. The oldest members of the family had already taken up drinking. Johnny one of the middle boys had talked with several members of the family who had jobs. His words were, "you know Mama has really done a lot to keep this family together. You've all seen what she does for us every Christmas. Over 40 Christmas presents wrapped under the tree. If not for her I don't know if we would have shoes to wear." Ben stated, "yes we know, but what do you have in mind?"

"I know but all of us could chip in and maybe we can afford one or two items this Christmas. Can anyone give today so I can start planning? There's only twenty days until Christmas."



Johnny got \$20.00 from all six who were there. Not much he thought, maybe payday will be better. Johnny wanted to get up the nerve to talk to his Daddy about not drinking this Christmas and putting in money to help them buy some thing Mama really needed. You know things like a refrigerator and

washing machine. You know how she has suffered out there in the winter weather hanging out those diapers and clothes on those clotheslines. We will ask all the adult family members to contribute. We all love Mama. I will give \$50.00 or more although we are pretty low this time of the year.

Daddy, listened but made no promises. Johnny, went up to the two appliance stores in our small town. The refrigerator was \$290.00 and the washing machine was \$178.00 and the dryer was \$189.00. That was total of \$657.00 a lot of money in 1949. Mr. Davis said he would carry us for six or even twelve months if we could pay \$200.00 down. That would be around \$76.00 every month for a period of six months.

Johnny didn't have a lot of money but he was determined that his mama would get those things for Christmas. Two or three other children were positive about the whole idea and they told Johnny that he was right. Mama needs those things.

Two boys and a girl didn't put any money into the Christmas fund for Mama. But six put in some money, at least enough to get the refrigerator, washing machine, and dryer. A range could come later.

Johnny went up to Davis Appliances and paid \$450.00 down and made a note to pay the rest off.

On the day before Christmas one of the children took Mama out to the bigger town out of Washburn to ship for last minute gifts. While they were out the appliances were delivered and were covered up so Mama couldn't see them. Mama came in late and we hurried to bed.

Christmas for Mama, ended up one of the best Christmases our family ever had. Mama was elated and went around thanking all of the family. No longer would they see Mama outside hanging up clothes to dry. Milk would be good for almost two weeks and Mama would have to do less than half the hard work she was accustomed to. Johnny paid Davis off when he got his income tax money back.

Historically Speaking

USS OAK RIDGE (drydock ship for destroyers, submarines, and landing craft – named for our city)

For several years now many of the surviving crew members of the US OAK RIDGE, named for Oak Ridge, have gathered for annual reunions in Oak Ridge. It has been a great experience to be able to get to know them and to enjoy their banter and fun of being gathered in reunion.

This year was likely the last formal reunion. Future gatherings will be informal and lower key. At this last formal gathering the city was given a porthole from the ship and a buoy ring. This is in addition to a commemorative bell that was presented to the city several years ago.

The following description of the ship's history was provided by Bob Rawls:

With a rich history beginning during World War II, USS OAK RIDGE, a Medium Auxiliary Repair Drydock, (ARDM-1), was a mainstay in the Rota harbor from 1964 until 1979. The ship, later referred to as USS OAK RIDGE, was originally commissioned as an ARD-12-class floating drydock designed for docking destroyers, submarines and a variety of landing craft.

In 1944 ARD-19, part of the ARD-12 class, was towed to the Pacific theater. Later that year, the ship was moored with USS ROSS (DD-563) in dock undergoing repairs. A Japanese aircraft launched a Kamikaze attack, crashing into the drydock. The aircraft passed through the starboard wingwall of the dock, significantly damaging both the ARD-19 and ROSS. Another aircraft conducted a strafing run, but was downed by gunfire from the ARD, ROSS, and LST-556. Repairs were made, and the ship resumed its drydocking mission in the Pacific until after the end of World War II.

In 1948, ARD-19 was towed back across the Pacific and served with the Pacific Reserve Fleet at Long Beach. In March of 1949, she was moved to Orange, Texas, for service with the Atlantic Reserve Fleet until her first decommissioning in September of 1949.

Thirteen years later in September 1962, ARD-19 was removed from decommissioned status and upgraded to enable support of Los Angeles class attack submarines. Subsequently, when reclassified as the ARDM-1 class in October 1963, the ship was recommissioned as USS OAK RIDGE. In June of 1964 OAK RIDGE was towed to Rota, Spain. The ship serviced nuclear powered attack submarines and other craft for fifteen years until June of 1979.

OAK RIDGE was then towed to Kings Bay, Georgia. After the ship was decommissioned and stricken from the Naval Register in 2001, it was transferred to the United States Coast Guard in 2002 and served at Curtis Bay Yard, Baltimore, MD, until being sold to a civilian contractor in 2018.

I asked Bob to bring the history of USS OAK RIDGE up to date from 2002. He gave me the following details.

On June 26, 2018, Bob was on the USS OAK RIDGE in Baltimore, MD, at the US Coast Guard Curtis Bay Yard with Ken Forsberg. They raised flags in commemoration of the ship arriving in Rota, Spain for duty. Bob then mailed the flags and photo of each flag hoist to crew members and sent one to Mayor Gooch. The flag used for their ceremony this year in Oak Ridge was also one that was raised over the USS OAK RIDGE.

On October 8, 2018, during the ship sale process, Bob and two other crew members were given permission to remove some historical items before the ship left Curtis Bay Yard. That is when the porthole was removed from what used to be the Executive Officer's (second in

command) stateroom.

Bob said he thought it more appropriate for the porthole to be displayed indefinitely somewhere in Oak Ridge - the ship's namesake - rather than kept personally, only to be tossed away by some future generation. I agree and am proud that an exhibit is being planned for the items from the USS OAK RIDGE.

Bob has provided the name and email for the current owner, and I have sent a request to know what has happened to the USS OAK RIDGE. His response was: "...walls were cut down two levels, for use as a commercial drydock. It's coming to Norfolk in the next week or two and will be used to drydock a submarine that's being demilitarized and scrapped, then ownership is likely transferring to another Norfolk company for their shipyard so I can semi retire.

So, that is the latest we know about the final destiny of the USS OAK RIDGE. I am anxious for the museum exhibit to be completed so visitors to Oak Ridge can see and appreciate the ship named for our city!

I had joined the Assemblies of God. I had somehow managed to hold down a job in construction. I was separated from my wife, and I was sharing responsibility for raising my daughter. I was accountable to a probation officer alone. Little did I know, the shining one had set many traps.

With my history of abusing narcotics, I was required to complete an outpatient substance abuse program. I would once again be joining other addicts on supervised release, trying to adjust to a society that has labeled them as career felons.

(Revelation 15:1) Introduction: Several prevailing themes punctuate the final book of the New Testament---the persecution of God's people by enemies of the truth, the ultimate victory of righteousness over the servants of Satan, and the wrath of God in the administration of justice. The wrath of the Lord accentuates chapters fifteen through twenty. John sees another "sign" in heaven; it is great and wonderful. Again, the number seven is prominent for the idea of completeness. Seven angels are seen having seven "plagues." Plagues are paramount in the Old Testament as instruments of punishment upon the wicked, as in the case of those visited upon the Egyptians who held captive the people of Israel. In this vision the wrath of God is compared to a lethal poison contained in seven bowls to be poured out upon the enemies of divine truth. The pouring out of these "plagues" will "finish" the exercise of Heaven's justice, though the consequence thereof will be eternal (14:11).


(Rev. 15:2-4) Song of the Saints' victory: Before a discussion of the "bowls of wrath," however, there is a message of encouragement to the faithful. John sees a "sea of glass" which reminds one of proximity to God's throne (4:6). Standing nearby is a "victorious" multitude that has overcome the "beast," having refused to receive his "mark" (13:16-18). They are ecstatic with joy, praising God. It is reminiscent of the elation of Moses when the Israelites were delivered from Egypt *Ex. 15:1-22), except the joy is infinitely greater because of the Lamb's victory accomplished at Calvary. The singular form, "song," reveals the continuity between the two covenants---those of Moses and Christ.

An anthem of praise goes up to God: (a) There is an acknowledgement of Jehovah's works, in creation and redemptive history. (b) There is the recognition that his nature conforms to what is right and true (whether we understand that or not); the Lord is never duplicitous. (c) The affirmation that God is "king of the ages" (nation) is a celebration of his sovereignty and providential action. (d) Who would be so foolish as to not reverence the Almighty and glorify him? He alone is infinitely holy! (e) All nations will come to worship. This does not imply universal salvation. It may suggest that the victorious throng will be international in scope; or it may refer to the universal acknowledgement of God's righteousness at the time of judgment (Rom. 14:11), though grudgingly rendered (16:21).

(Rev. 15:5-8) Suffering of the sinners: The scene now changes dramatically. John sees the "most holy place" of the ancient tabernacle "opened." This was the area of the tabernacle where the presence of God was focused in Israelite worship (Ex. 25:21-22). It was designated the "tabernacle of the testimony" because the two tables of stone containing the ten commandments were in the ark of the covenant in the holy of holies of the tabernacle. From the "sanctuary" came the seven angels bearing the plagues. They are dispatched by God, and their apparel suggests a priestly function. The entire scene is designed to emphasize the fact that the seven bowls of wrath to be poured out upon the Lord's enemies (16:2) represent an entirely just punishment. Note that the bowls are "full" of righteous wrath! The temple was filled with "smoke," which was a symbol of God's glory and power (Isa. 6:4). The time of a devastating judgment is coming, and no one would be permitted to "enter into the sanctuary" to hinder or stop the process of judgment. The task would be completed! The clock is ticking.

Philippians 4:7 "And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." Peace as a guardian: The inspired writer affirms that God's peace is able to effectively function as a "guard" for the soul. The term phrouresei means "to keep, to protect, to act as a sentinel." And so peace is said to protect both the "heart" and the "mind." This likely is an allusion to the fact that divinely initiated peace provides both emotional and intellectual support for

the Christians. Let us consider these two items more closely.

First, let us remind ourselves that heavenly peace is not a mere bubbly feeling grounded in emotion alone. No, it is based upon evidence. Careful research will establish the fact that the Bible is a true revelation from God, and therefore its promises may be viewed as reliable. One's peace of mind will, to a large extent, depend upon the confidence he has in the source of his counsel. The Scriptures promise a peace that is based upon concrete acts of obedience to the Lord's will, as made known through biblical revelation. These unassailable truths provide a sense of confidence that generates a joy and calmness that are not merely speculative.

Second, this knowledge-based peace is thus able to protect the "heart" from those brain-maggots which eat the vitals out of daily tranquility.

Third, God's peace shields the intellect as well. A thousand skeptical arguments can never breach the fortified soul that experiences the sort of peace mentioned above, that which is anchored in solid evidence. We must confidently emphasize: Christianity is grounded in history; it is checkable. It is not a mere mystical system that wafts on the winds of fantasy. One can study it, test its factual information, and then tie down to it as a stable foundation of religious and ethical instruction. This is the most reliable basis for "peace of mind" in existence.

Conclusion:

- (1) As to its nature, the ultimate peace is from God, and none other. It is a divine peace. He communicates it and sustains it. There is no other source for it.
- (2) It is the result of a spiritual life. "For to be spiritually minded is life and peace" (Romans 8:6). True peace cannot be divorced from right living. One cannot compartmentalize his life. He cannot "think wrong" and "feel right."
- (3) Peace is an abiding treasure for the Christian as long as he walks in the light of God's word. "Great peace have they that love thy law" (Psalm 119:165). "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee, because he trusteth in thee" (Isaiah 26:3). Note: whose mind is stayed on thee.
- (4) We cannot truly savor this peace, any more than a blind man can appreciate a beautiful sunset. Moreover, with all our alleged intellectual brilliance, humanity has never been able to devise his own system of psychology which can generate and sustain sweet peace in his heart.
- (5) Divine peace anoints the soul with a balm that allows the child of God to hold up his head in the storms of life, and, with an anticipatory vision, look to the hope of eternity.
- (6) Heavenly peace tempers the mind, helping to deflect the barbs of irrational atheism. Peace both inoculates against skepticism, assists in repelling disquieting thoughts when they arise.
- (7) Peace is a guard against sin. "The religiously peaceful are morally strong."
- (8) Since our peace is centered "in Christ," and as He "abideth" as our High Priest continually (Hebrews 6:20; 7:3), we may be assured that as long as we remain in fellowship with the Savior, our peace will remain (see 1 John 1:7).

Surely the scriptural theme of "peace" should provide joy for our day and delightful rest at night.
