



> We no longer have the Alans, the Toms or Lisas who are willing to work for an education. But if our president has his way, he will find a way to pay them. All you have to do is vote for him.



## Mogadishu, Somalia Summer - 1993

I was deployed to Somalia with the Ranger company I had cut my teeth with. The men who came before me, had voices that echoed in my head. My time as an innocent, unproven Ranger, had come to a close.

Time to come good on my enlistment oath, and more importantly, see if I am the man in the Ranger creed. Now more than ever, I would be a pawn to evaluate whether, the Ranger leadership

model, adopted by the Regiment in 1984, was working?

The mission package adopted for deployment, would be missing one trump card from above, the AC-130 Spectre gunship. This platform alone gives Rangers a direct fire platform, with no vulnerabilities, for the Somali's possessed no anti-aircraft weapons that could reach 5000 ft. above ground level.

The mission was accepted by our task force commanders. Every unit would take part in the planning, the rehearsals, and the eventual execution of the mission. The foundations forged in Fort Bragg, would grow upon our arrival in the Mog, as we began to settle in and prepare for missions

The hangar became our home. Rodents were dealt with accordingly, when the best shooters in the world, possess 22 LR rounds and firearms. We shared a common billeting area. Common shower area, common weight room, and mess hall. We lived amongst giants.

Our cots were segregated only by elements. We mingled amongst our mentors. They took part in our ranger humor, and taught us a few things that could keep us alive. The best thing for me, was my re-union with my hero, Daniel Busch, now an Operator.

Truth is, Dan and I were like kids together when we spent time alone in Mogadishu. Dan was serious about three things. His relationship to Jesus Christ. His Love for his wife Tracy and their new baby boy. And his desire to serve his nation as a premier Special Forces soldier.

Task Fore Ranger grew into an effective fighting force. What was hard to overcome was the understanding of individual unit TOE structures. The green guys are the best shooters, movers, and communicators on earth. The Ranger TO&e required a little more central leadership role.

We gained some individual sovereignty in my platoon. We had the vehicle mission in Somalia. This allowed for more time traveling at the platoon level through dangerous parts of the city. I believe it helped our drivers on October 3, when it really mattered.

I look back on my time in Mogadishu, God finally allowed me to understand my life unto that point in time. My leadership style was one where I understood that most Rangers assigned to my squad were better than me at most task's. I had to show up every day to earn their respect.

Rangers would rather follow someone they respect; a lot more than they enjoy following someone they fear. The Regiment has a model for soldiering that can- not be duplicated. The microscope is your men.

They watch every move and decision made, to be scrutinized by the spec4 mafia at the earliest convenience. From Private to Colonol, the standard is the same. To grasp that you are only as good as the weakest person in the squad, leads to an empathetic view of leadership.

The ranger platoon is like an internal combustion engine. Valves, bearings, rods, seats, chains, all make up the engine. This holds true in a ranger platoon. Privates, Specialist's, Corporal's, Sergeants, Staff Sergeants, a Platoon Sergeant, and a Platoon leader. All are needed for success.

There were 3 rifle squads under the control of a Staff Sergeant. He has two team leader Sergeants. Who in turn; have one Private first class riflemen. One Saw Gunner, and one grenade launcher/Rifleman making up each fireteam. Constituting the Ranger rifle squad.

The machine gun squad supports the 3 rifle squads. A SSgt oversees

three gunners, each usually Ranger school graduates, and usually the rank of Corporal or Specialist. Three Assistant machine gunners. Specialist's or Private first classes, and three Private first class Ammunition bearers.

The Ranger platoon has a radio telephone operator from within the platoon. A platoon Medic, a platoon Fire support non-commissioned officer and his RTO. On occasion in Mogadishu, we were augmented with Air Force Combat controllers, or an extra Task force senior medic.

A better understanding of ranger TO&e would have enabled planners to recognize e requirement for more rehearsals dealing with catastrophic instances as would be encountered in the battle of the Black Sea.

The greatest obstacle encountered after the bullets started flying, was inflexibility from certain leaders within our task force to fully comprehend what made our ideas about fighting, different. Yet, we still managed to overcome incredible odds to live to fight another day.

Leadership is a principle. It revolves around getting others to accomplish your mission, by providing them with a purpose, a direction, and the motivation to overcome whatever they encounter between where they are at and the finish line of success. Flexibility is an inherent quality. The Rangers had one abiding principle taught to us by men who took part in this firefight: Lead with Led!

To harness warfighters to rules justifying conduct in war, is completely counter-intuitive to success in gunfights. Rangers accepted the challenge of deployment to Mogadishu as part of the JV team. We were there to support our older brothers in Task Force green. I am glad we lived amongst each other.

The confidence to overcome was evident to Rangers as we witnessed the extreme might of the American military apparatus. We were being mentored by the greatest warriors on earth. We lived amongst the men who would show us motivation on a scale I never witnessed.

Through it all, I feel Rangers showed America and our Task force leaders, why Rangers gained the mantra" Ranger's Lead the Way"! I pray our dead have received mercy and grace from a God who continues to shed his grace on those who accept the challenge to defend America. I pray our wounded have recovered and moved on to productive lives fulfilling their dreams.

I pray the survivors would continue to honor our fallen by sharing this story whenever they get the chance. TFR was the greatest experience of my Life. I became a man on the streets of Mogadishu.

I learned that Jesus Christ was indeed who he said he was, as I learned true Christian empathy, while serving a cause greater than myself, as a Ranger weapons squad leader in combat.

He was crucified upon a cross of wood, yet he created the hill upon which it stood.

He is alive forevermore, and he is returning for his virgin bride very soon. John Burns 11-19-2022

Staff Sergeant John Burns enlisted into the United States Army on September 23, 1987 as an 11C Infantry Mortarman. He graduated from the 7th Infantry Division, Ranger Class 11/89 and served in the invasion of Panama, Desert Storm and the Battle of Mogadishu while assigned to the 75th Rangers.

Some of his many decorations, awards and badges include; Bronze Star Medal for Valor, Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal, Sniper Badge, Pathfinder Badge, Master Parachutist Badge, Combat Infantry Badge and Expert Infantry Badge. Throughout his prestigious military career, he traveled to forty-five countries on five continents and all but two states while serving in the military.

He currently serves as the Chaplain for the Special Operations Warrior Foundation. His devout faith demonstrates to all he comes into contact with that he believes nothing but the blood of Jesus Christ can cleanse us from all unrighteousness. ## Christian influences on the British founder of Rugby, TN

Carolyn Krause concludes a two-part series on Historic Rugby with a review of the life, novels and vision of Thomas Hughes, the British lawyer and politician who founded the utopian community on East Tennessee's Cumberland Plateau. This article is based largely on the perspective of Fred Bailey, retired professor of history at Abilene Christian University and published author of articles and books; he has been teaching courses on Queen Victoria's England at the Oak Ridge Institute for Continued Learning, or ORICL, at Roane State Community College's Oak Ridge campus. Recently, he gave an ORICL lecture on the history of Rugby and on the story about its famous founder and his childhood mentor.

On Saturday, Oct. 7, Historic Rugby (1331 Rugby Parkway, Rugby, Tenn.) will hold its annual Founder's Day for honoring Thomas Hughes and awarding "someone else from recent history instrumental in propelling Historic Rugby and Hughes' now-renowned village into the present and future." The event will feature artists and crafters on site, food at The Canteen and a concert by the Rugby Cornet Band

The utopian community of Rugby, Tenn., founded by Thomas Hughes, an English lawyer, judge and politician best known for his children's novel "Tom Brown's School Days" (1857), reflected Hughes' values and vision. According to Fred Bailey in his recent ORICL lecture on Rugby, "One volume always on display in the Thomas Hughes Public Library in Rugby, which is across from the chapel, is the children's book Hughes wrote entitled 'Tom Brown's School Days.' It was an incredible little book because of its influence. The American president, Theodore Roosevelt, read it as a boy and said every boy should read it."

Bailey said that Hughes' first children's novel is "not as famous to most people today as children's novels of the 19th century such as Lewis Carroll's 'Alice in Wonderland' or Mark Twain's 'Adventures of Tom Sawyer' and 'Adventures of Huckleberry Finn.' If I had to make the argument which one of these was the most incredibly and overwhelmingly influential of all the books written by Englishmen and Americans in the 19th century, I would rank Hughes' children's book in the top five."

Hughes, who attended Rugby School in England from 1834 to 1842, based his children's novel on his adventures there, including defeat by and later triumph over the bullyFlashman, with the help of his more experienced classmate, Harry "Scud" East and a comical boy named Diggs. Tom Brown, modeled after the author's brother George, was then asked to befriend and protect George Arthur, a frail, sensitive and brilliant boy. The peak of Tom's school career was a successful cricket match based on the author's own experiences.


The real-life character influencing Tom Brown was the headmaster, Thomas Arnold (1795-1842), who influenced Thomas Hughes. Tom Brown engaged in fighting to defeat a bully and using his athleticism to excel in cricket, rugby and other sports at school. According to Wikipedia, as headmaster of Rugby School from 1828 to 1841, Arnold "introduced several reforms that were widely copied by other noted public schools. His reforms redefined standards of masculinity and achievement."

According to Bailey, Arnold emphasized the importance of moral and intellectual development in the education of boys but, to reduce fighting among the boys, he did encourage sports such as cricket and rugby, a sport invented in 1823 at the school. "Arnold came up with the idea that sports and other physical activity should be very much a part of an educated man," Bailey said. "The Apostle Paul said that 'your body is a temple for your spirit' so Arnold believed

there is a spiritual aspect of physical activity."

Baron de Coubertin, a French educator and historian known as the father of the modern Olympic Games, became active in promoting the introduction of sports in French schools after visiting Rugby School in 1886 and learning about the late Thomas Arnold. De Coubertin considered Arnold "the father of the organized sports he admired when he visited English public schools" and the reason why so many schools have playing fields.

According to Wikipedia, "When looking at Ar-

nold's tomb in the school chapel, he recalled that he felt suddenly as if he were looking on 'the very cornerstone of the British empire.' Coubertin is thought to have exaggerated the importance of sport to Thomas Arnold, whom he viewed as 'one of the founders of athletic chivalry.' The character-forming influence of sport, with which Coubertin was so impressed, is more likely to have originated in Hughes' novel 'Tom Brown's School Days.'"

For Hughes, sports and physical activity were so

important that he made sure the residents of Rugby, Tenn. had many recreational opportunities. According to the HistoricRugby website, "Lawn tennis grounds were laid out and used frequently. Colonists and visitors enjoyed rugby, football, horseback riding, croquet and swimming in the clear flowing rivers surrounding the townsite."

Largely because of his religious education and physical activities at Rugby School, Hughes embraced Christian socialism and Muscular Christianity. Christian socialism(called the "social gospel movement" in the United States) regards capitalism to be rooted in the sin of greed and to be the cause of social inequality, poverty, illiteracy, and warmongering. Like Arnold, Hughes wanted religion to make a difference by improving society during an era of industrialization and urbanization.

This religious and political philosophy enabled the British people under Queen Victoria to justify "controlling one-fourth of the world because they believed they were doing good by spreading the glories of English Christian civilization across the globe," Bailey said. "Arnold's religious ethos became the religion of empire; of an England that carved up Africa, that overawed India and the Far East, and that had set its sights upon domination of world trade through the construction of a canal across the Isthmus of Panama."

The same year that Hughes founded Rugby, he published the sequel "Tom Brown and Oxford," which used the term muscular Christianity. This philosophical movement that originated in England in the mid-19th century valued patriotic duty, discipline, self-sacrifice, masculinity, and the moral and physical beauty of athleticism. Hughes' book, Bailey said, declared that "a man's body is given to be trained, brought into subjection and then used for the protection of the weak, the advancement of all righteous causes and the subduing of the earth which God has given the children of men."

According to Bailey, the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) was an important outgrowth of Christian socialism in England and America's similar social gospelmovement, which emphasized living Jesus' teaching to "love one's neighbor" rather than living only by faith in the Christian religion's doctrines and sacraments. The first YMCA, founded in 1844 in London by George Williams, was initially intended as a refuge for young men seeking escape from street hazards such as gambling, drinking and prostitution. Williams also sought to attract young men like himself who desired to work together on tackling social problems.

The first YMCA in the United States, which opened late in 1851 in Boston, Mass., was founded by Captain Thomas Valentine Sullivan, an American seaman and missionary. Bailey said that in addition to the YMCAs, other American outgrowths of the social gospel movement were the mainline American denominations that had socialagendas (such as the United Methodist and United Presbyterian churches), the National Council of Churches and the American Civil Liberties Union.

While the sport of rugby was invented and played at England's Rugby School, which had a strong Christian influence in the 19th century, the American game of basketball also had Christian-related roots. It was devised in the winter of 1891-1892 by James A. Naismith, an instructor at the YMCA Training School in Springfield, Mass.

Thomas Hughes, founder of Rugby, Tenn., and an outstanding athlete at England's Rugby School, would likely be comfortable in 21st century East Tennessee. This region in the Bible Belt offers social services through churches and nonprofit service organizations. And its fans faithfully follow University of Tennessee and other school teams that play football, basketball, soccer, tennis and even rugby.

I hope you have enjoyed Carolyn's stories about Rugby. It is a most interesting place to visit. I enjoyed being invited to speak on Oak Ridge history there a few years ago and Fanny and I spent the night in the historic Newbury house. What a delightful experience. Also, there are several trails nearby and the library is amazing as is the restaurant. Rugby is a really neat place to visit.

**Revelation Chapter 3** 

(Rev. 3:1-6) Sardis---Sardis was some thirty miles southeast of Thyatira. Jesus operates in conjunction with the "seven Spirits" (the perfect Holy Spirit) (1:4) and has the churches under his control (1:20). He is intimately aware of their "works" (which are not noble). They have a reputation of being a lively group; actually, they are spiritually dead. The remaining fragment of fidelity was thus to be more watchful and attempt to save their fading faithfulness. None of their works had been brought to a state of completion. They were good starters, but sorry finishers! There was a point in their past when they had "received" the truth and listened to it, they must rekindle their desire for obedience and truly change (in repentance) the direction of their lives.

If they continue to become lax and do not watch (by keeping their lives spiritually intact), the Lord will come unexpectedly, and they will be unaware of his punitive judgment until the very hour of its implementation. There was a minority in Sardis that had not defiled themselves by indulging in sinful rebellion. These would walk with him "in white," in the purity of his forgiving grace. They were deemed worthy because of their submission to his will. Those who continued to "overcome" would walk with the Lord in "white." White is a symbol of both purity (7:14) and victory (9:11, 14). Contrary to the unfaithful, these would not have their names blotted out of the book of life. God has a record of those who belong to him; the text, by implication, teaches that names of the unfaithful will be "blotted out." The child of God can apostatize and be lost. Too, the Lord will confess the names of the faithful before his Father and the angels (Mt. 10:32-33). This is conditioned upon "overcoming." Hear the words of the Spirit (2:7).

(Rev. 3:7-13) Philadelphia---Philadelphia was twenty-eight miles southeast of Sardis. Jesus is depicted in two ways: "true" (genuine) and the one who "has the key of David" with the exclusive power to "open and shut." The metaphor is borrowed from Isaiah 22:22 and reflects the Lord's sole control of who enters the kingdom of which David's was the precursor (Lk. 1:32-33; Jn. 3:3-5). No one enters the kingdom of God apart from Jesus Christ (Acts 4:12). Being aware of their "works," and yet the fact that they possibly were "weak" in size or ability, the Savior had opened a "door" to them, because they had "kept his word" and had not "denied his name." The door could have been that of opportunity (1 Cor. 16:9) or that of reward (3:20).

The saints in this city were exposed to hostile Jews who were wicked, hence described as a "synagogue of Satan." They lied in claiming to be God's Israel (Rom. 2:28-29). Happily, however, some of them would come to recognize that Jehovah loved the church, hence they would become Christians and be able to worship God truly. Because of the fidelity of these saints (no word of criticism at all), they would be preserved from the "hour of trial" that would descend upon the Roman Empire. History verifies that Philadelphia alone escaped the wrath of the Roman emperor Trajan (A.D. 98-117).

Christ's movements of "blessings" or "punishments" are frequently designed as "comings," not to be confused with the second coming. Thus, the church was to "hold fast" their relationship with Jesus, not allowing others to divert them from the path of truth, thereby losing their "crown." This is clear testimony of the possibility of a Christian being lost. It is a stake through the heart of Calvinism. In contrast, those who "overcome" will be like a strong "pillar" in God's temple (most holy place, the church (1 Cor.

3:16; Eph. 2:20, firmly established. A triple "name" is bestowed: "my God" (a family designation) (Num. 6:27), "the city of my God" (heavenly citizenship), and "my own new name" (redeemed by Christ himself). Those who are spiritual will listen to the Spirit's revelation (2:7).

(Rev. 3:14-22) Laodicea---Laodicea was forty-three miles southeast of Philadelphia. It may have been established by Epaphras (Col. 4:12-13). It was renowned for its woolen products and eye medication. There is no word of praise for this church. Jesus is described as the "Amen" (the authenticator of truth), the "faithful and true witness" (trustworthy), and "the beginning of the creation." This latter phrase does not mean he was a created being, as "Jehovah's Witnesses" allege; rather, he was the source of all creation (22:13; Col 1:18; Jn. 1:3). Jesus was aware of their "works," and such were not to their credit. They were "lukewarm" fence-straddlers who made the Lord sick! The lukewarm are more dangerous to the cause of Christ than those cold-dead.

Laodicea boasted of its riches that had piled up, perhaps attributing such to God's providence, hence being self-deceived as to their spiritual status. They fancied they needed "nothing" (Lk. 12:15-21). But they were totally blind as to the nature of their condition before God. They exhausted the lexicon of unfaithfulness---wretched, miserable, desperately poor, blind, and necked! The Lord's advice was that they access the treasures only he could provide. Then they would be truly "rich," not shamefully naked, but clothed with white (pure) garments, with eyes spiritually "medicated," thus able to see again.

Even though the Lord is "sick of" these sluggish saints, he wants them to know he still has affection for them, and such is evidenced by this epistle of reproof and chastisement. They must reactivate their zeal and repent, or they would be without hope. Christ is represented as "standing at the door" and lightly, though repeatedly, knocking. Was there not one soul who would open the door and invite him in? Were it so, the Lord would anxiously come in and "eat" with him. Was this a figure for common fellowship? Does it hint that he was not with them when they ate the sacred "supper"? Matthew 26:29 "But I say unto you, I will not drink henceforth of this fruit of the vine, until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." Acts 20:7 "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight." 1 Corinthians 11:23-27 "For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, That the Lord Jesus the same night in which he was betrayed took bread: And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death till he come. Wherefore whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord."

They would not permit the Savior to sit down with them in common communion. In his generosity he offered them a place with him on his throne---if they would only "overcome" by reclaiming their fidelity. Was it too much to ask? #### Relief for improper ERC claims

The Taxpayer Advocate recently announced relief for businesses that filed incorrect Employee Retention Credit (ERC) claims.

Many improper ERC claims have been prepared by unscrupulous companies who have preyed on businesses. The IRS included promoters of ineligible ERC on the Dirty Dozen list of tax scams. There were so many fraudulent ERC credits claimed that the IRS stopped accepting ERC applications.

The IRS is auditing the ERC claims and the penalties can be huge. If an IRS auditor believes there is fraud, the penalty is 75% of the ERC received. As an example, a business that received \$50,000 ERC would be required to pay back the \$50,000 ERC and \$37,500 in penalties. However, if an unscrupulous company claimed the ERC, you may be able to have the penalties removed due to the bad guidance you received.

If an unscrupulous company fraudulently claimed the ERC, you are still responsible. These companies often charge fees based on the amount of the ERC refund, which gives them an incentive to claim large fraudulent refunds. This option helps businesses that were misled by unscrupulous promoters. However, if you willfully filed a fraudulent ERC claim, withdrawing a fraudulent claim will not exempt you from potential criminal investigation and prosecution.

You may be able to get a first-time abatement of penalties if it's the first time you incurred them in the last three years.

If you are concerned about potential fraud penalties, your ERC claim should be corrected before you receive an IRS audit letter.

The IRS is also working on a settlement initiative for businesses

that believe they shouldn't have claimed the ERC and want to repay it.

If you improperly claimed the ERC you will be able to withdra

If you improperly claimed the ERC, you will be able to withdraw your claim as long as it has not been processed and paid. Requesting a withdrawal means you are asking the IRS not to process your ERC claim. If the IRS imposes an ERC audit penalty, it is due immediately. Failure to pay the full amount immediately can lead to more penalties and interest.

If your business is no longer in operation, you can request an installment agreement. Generally, you have up to six years to pay the full amount. If you are unable to pay the full amount, you may want to consider an offer in compromise or currently not collectible status.

If you discover the company claimed a fraudulent ERC, you should report them by filing Form 14242 Suspected Abusive Tax Promotions or Preparers.

If you suspect a company filed your ERC fraudulently, you should find a reputable tax professional to review your ERC claim.

**Cellphone Safety** 

If you've had a cellphone for several years and are now quite comfortable using it, you might be tempted to add more functions and fun to it to make it handier and more valuable to you.

However, there needs to be a line drawn somewhere.

Beware the types of apps you install on your phone. (App is short for "application," and it's thought there are nearly 9 million different apps in the world.) The thing to ask yourself before you add any app is this: If technology experts who run large computer systems struggle to keep those systems safe from scammers around the world, how much success are the techs at your bank or grocery store likely to have with cellphones?

The more apps you have on

your phone, the more at risk you are.

Clicking the wrong thing on an app, or even downloading it, can install malware on your phone. At the very least, it can send your number back to scammers. Armed with only your active phone number, they can do a reverse search for you on Whitepages and potentially find your home address and then your banking information and much more. They can lock you out of social media, barrage you with scam text messages and calls, have all your calls forwarded to another number or lock you out of your phone until you pay a ransom. They can send scam messages that appear to have come from you. If you access email on your phone, your area of risk widens substantially.

Some suggestions from the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to keep your phone safe:

Lock it. Depending on the brand you have, used a passcode or a screen lock. Keep the software updated.

Back up your data. Learn about backing up to the "cloud" or your computer.

And before you add any app to your phone, ask yourself if you trust it.
