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



## Thankful for our American Legion and for Those who Love America

The people of Morgan County and Wartburg really have an organization to be proud of and that is the American Legion Post 149. Wartburg has had down time when the American Legion building sat empty for years. To me this was not the best of times.

The American Legion brings something to a community that no other organization can. All the

members have served in one of our branches of military service, that above anything else says they love America and they respect our flag. Some have fought for America and some have earned the purple heart, without our military we would have no country. Many have died for America; 425,000 in WWII, 57,000 in Vietnam and 38,000 in Korea.

Our veterans really care about other veterans and that is a big part of our agenda. Veterans have problems; more so perhaps because the military can be pretty rough. I have a great friend who was in Iraq for over a year and he still suffers from PTSD. His suffering is still real after being out of Iraq for many years. Sometimes I think the mental problems are worse than the physical problems for soldiers when they come home. A lot of physical problems can be healed in months or years but PTSD can last on and on. We have a problem with veterans who are suicidal. The number of suicides has been increasing and we need to help veterans all we can. I think Mark Keck and others in Post 149 are reaching out to veterans who have mental problems.

Post 149 is very visible in the community. They're present at a lot of community services like the WECO outdoor show. I was at this year's

show and several veterans were recognized for their service. Surprisingly three Redmons were recognized; they were Louis Redmon (US Navy), Kelly Redmon (US Air Force), and myself (US Navy).

Another thing that the American Legion Post 149 does is they are present at military funeral services. They also do home repairs for veterans. For those who are on walkers or wheelchairs they build ramps.

The American Legion also supports Boy's State and other leadership programs. Other programs in the community are Toys for Tots, Christmas for Kids, and providing food in the community.

I am proud to say that our Post 149 is very active due mostly to our leadership and good workers. I can tell you that a few years ago the post was inactive and the facility got rundown. Now after a few short years Post 149 has come to life and a lot of work has been done on the inside of our building. I think they are updating the outside as well.

I would really love to be a little younger so I could help out more. The American Legion, nation wide is over a hundred years old. The first post was established in 1919, right after WWI in Washington D.C. It is a great organization that fights for veterans'

I would like to thank Ed

Knight of WECO Radio and Vic Davis of Davis Funeral Home for what they do for our community and for the beautiful plaque they presented to veterans at the WECO outdoor show.

I also thank Mark Keck for the work he does for the American Legion and the Tourist Alliance, and for what he does for veterans.



I am an American Legion member and I have seen how our veterans respect our flag. To all of us it is a symbol of freedom. It hurts my heart to see people disrespect and even burn our country's flag. I can't believe that many of our government organizations put up a pride flag in place of the American flag during June. To me this is a criminal.

The American Legion meets with the youth of the community in which I think is important to pass on the love of our country and patriotism for our future. I believe most of our members in Wartburg have a love for our country although I would like to see more patriotism.





### **IRS Doesn't Follow Procedures**

A Taxpayer Advocate Service (TAS) research study reported that the IRS often fails to follow its own procedures regarding certain credits.

To prevent improper claims of credits, Congress authorized the IRS to ban taxpayers from certain credits if the taxpayer claimed credits due to reckless or intentional disregard of the rules.

The study found that the IRS often wasn't following its own policies and procedures when enforcing the ban of credits.

TAS reviewed 352 cases where the IRS imposed a two-year ban in 2022 or the first eight months of 2023. The

- In 76 percent of the cases, the IRS failed to secure required managerial approval.
- In 81 percent of the cases, the IRS did not adequately explain to the taxpayer why it imposed the ban, as required.
- In 30 percent of the cases, the IRS did not previously disallow the same credit for the same reason for which it imposed the ban.
- At least 50 percent of the prior audits took place more than three years from when the IRS imposed the two-year ban. The taxpayer's failure to respond to the audit automatically resulted in the ban. 16 percent of the no-responses were due to "undeliverable mail."

The study found that on average, taxpayers whose cases were reviewed lost approximately \$4,100 each year of the ban.

The TAS made recommendations regarding the IRS not following the procedures set out by them in the 2023 Annual Report to Congress. Unfortunately, the IRS did not agree to implement any of the recommen-

TAS stated that the IRS must ensure that it is following its own policies and procedures, and that failure to do so may result in unjust application of the two-year ban. This could place financial hardship on taxpayers. They concluded by stating that the IRS should review its policies and procedures and develop safeguards to make certain auditors are following those policies and procedures.

## **Historically Speaking Hope's Classroom Bus Tour**

I am proud of my good friend Katatra Vasquez! She has taken an intense interest in the history of African Americans in Oak Ridge. She has published several books, Atomic Hope, Josie's Hope, in travel guide form and coloring book forms. All are available on Amazon.com. I was delighted to get to review her manuscripts and provide comments.

Now she expands her contribution to African American History by providing a tour of some of the most significant sites related to African American history in Oak Ridge. The tour and other events are sponsored by Oak Ridge Periodic Tables and Scarboro Community Alumni Association.

The Atomic Hope Heritage Preservation and Tourism Company and The Scarboro Monument Committee presents the Hope's Classroom Bus Tour on September 7, 2024. The tour commemorates the 69th anniversary of the Scarboro 85's amazing contribution to our Civil Rights efforts and honors those 85 Scarboro students who desegregated the Robertsville Junior High School and Oak Ridge High School on September 6, 1955.

The historical guided tour will provide information to students and adults on Oak Ridge's untapped history. Some of the Scarboro 85 students may be available throughout the tour and also at the program between the tours. There will be two tour times. The first tour starts at 11 a.m. and the second tour starts at 2 p.m. Both tours start from the Oak Ridge Civic Center/Senior Center parking lot.

Admission is \$20 per person. Proceeds will benefit the Scarboro 85 Monument Committee's efforts to erect a monument to the Scarboro 85 in A. K. Bissell Park.

Hope's Classroom is a transformative guided tour through Oak Ridge, Tennessee's Secret City, where participants explore pivotal sites marking the journey of African American students from segregation and desegregation to integration.

"These sites highlight the commitment to learning and progress, showcasing how education served as a powerful tool for empowerment and change. This interactive experience includes engaging activities that foster a shared understanding of hope and enhances intercultural relationships through historical insights."

The tour will use Daryl Lindsey's Olympus tour bus and supporting black-owned Razzleberrys with a signature historic peach ice cream. Please see the Hope's Classroom Tour Description below with proposed sites.

### **Tour Stops (1.5 Hour Tour)**

Meet at the Oak Ridge Civic Center/Senior Center parking lot at 1405 Oak Ridge Turnpike (Choose tours at 11 a.m. or 2 p.m.)

Tour Stop 1 - Former Scarboro School Site in the Scarboro Community, 160 Hampton Road (This location is where Arizona Officer moved the Scarboro School in 1949 from the location highlighted in Tour Stop 2. The students desired to bring the name of the school with them and ultimately the community chose the name, Scarboro, to designate the entire community not just the school)

Tour Stop 2 - Manhattan Project Era Scarboro School for African American Children, Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education, South Campus, 1299 Bethel Valley Road (Alden Blankenship hired Arizona Officer to start a school for African American children when they were first allowed to be brought to Oak Ridge after the World War II Manhattan Project effort which restricted African American parents from living together or bringing their children to Oak Ridge. This school building had been there prior to the Manhattan Project.)

Tour Stop 3 - Manhattan Project Era Hutment, Oak Ridge History Museum, 102 Robertsville Road (typical of the housing provided for all African Americans during the Manhattan Project as well as other construction workers in Happy Valley across the road from the K-25 Gaseous Diffusion Plant construction site as well as in the south most portion of the city of Oak Ridge where Aldi's, Panera Bread and Aubrey's restaurant are located today)

Tour Stop 4 - Oak Ridge High School
Desegregation Marker, 1450 Oak Ridge Turnpike (A Tennessee Historical Commission state
historical marker provided by the Rotary Club
of Oak Ridge [noon club] and designating one
of the two locations [Robertsville Middle School
being the second location today] where this historical desegregation event took place which is
now being recognized as the first desegregation
of public schools in the Southeast)

Katatra Vasquez, Atomic Hope author, historian, and speaker will guide the Hope's Classroom Bus Tour. On this tour participants will go through a journey of integrated education in the Oak Ridge

A 1:15 p.m. a commemorative anniversary/kick off campaign program will be held. Program participants include supportive quotes of the monument by: John Spratling, Ram Uppulluri, Ray Smith, and Pat Postma. Rose Weaver, City of Oak Ridge Poet Laureate will present poetry. Details of the Scarboro 85 Monument Project with discussion regarding Phase 2 will be provided by John Spratling, Scarboro 85 Monument Committee Chair.

Food will be provided by small business Black owned and operated businesses Razzleberrys Oak Ridge with peach ice cream and Zeke's Food Truck with soul food.

This series of events commemorating the Scarboro 85 historic desegregation which led much of the other such efforts and set the pace for civil rights advances in the entire nation by demonstrating such action could be taken even in the deep south has for way too long been unobserved. It is a delight to see attention being given to these brave young students who are now in their later years and some even passed away before proper recognition was provided.

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## Becoming the Lahmed, Psalm 119 Vs. 89-96

Vs. 89 Forever Oh Lord, your word is settled in Heaven.

Vs, 90 Your faithfulness endures to all generations; you established the earth and it

Vs. 91 They continue this day according to your ordinances, for all your servants.

Vs. 92 Unless your law had been my delight, I would then have perished in my affliction.

Vs. 93 I will never forget your precepts, for by them You have given me life.

Vs. 94 I am yours, save me, for I have sought your precepts.

Vs. 95 The wicked wait for me to destroy me, but I will consider your testimonies.

Vs. 96 I have seen the consummation of all perfection, but your commandment is exceedingly broad.

We continue our study of the incredible acrostic psalm of King David. Our focus is the Hebrew letter Lahmed. It is the 12th letter of the Hebrew Aleph-Bet with a numerical value of 30.

The letter looks like s shepherds crook or staff. It is defined as a goad or prod. It is the shepherd's staff of Moses and Yeshua. David reveals the trinity has a shepherd's staff that is also a two-edged sword, his word.

The descendants of Jacob were organized into 12 tribes by God the eternal shepherd. Jesus Christ called 12 Apostles.

John reveals in Revelation 4, 24 elders, dressed in white, seated around the throne of God in Heaven, worshipping God in heaven. The Church is never mentioned by John in Revelation after Chapter 4.

David was told by God to organize the priests into 24 courses of service. Each would serve in the Temple for two weeks. Beginning on the new moon of spring in the month of Nisan. Nisan is the beginning of months in the Bible. All biblical prophecy hinges on the calendar God established in the Torah.

Jesus Christ was born on Nisan 1. He was circumcised on Nisan 8. He was presented to Israel on Nisan 10 as their Messiah and high priest. He was crucified on 14 Nisan. He rose from the dead on 17 Nisan. This calendar was established in the flood of Noah. It is Christ's true calendar.

The High priest Ephod contained 12 precious stones. Each stone represented a birth month and a moon cycle of 30 days. When the shekinah glory of God, reflected off the high priest's ephod, it was spectacular. The high priest was a temporary replacement for Lucifer in heaven. Jesus Chris became our High Priest.

Jesus Christ was High Priest over his own sacrifice. We are called to be priest-kings after the manner of Christ. Christ as our eternal shepherd carries a true shepherd's staff with two ends.

The curved end is described in Hebrew as rechamim. It is the mercy end. It is how Jesus Christ taught what the true born- gain experience encompasses. Rechamim is a duality. A single pronoun expressed in plural form.

The root word is recham, defined as the womb of the mother. When an IM is added to any Hebrew word it has dual meanings. Rechamim is defined as eternal mercy from God. To be born again is to exist in an expression of desiring unending mercy from God.

Sheep need a shepherd to pull their head out of the water to keep from drowning. Our shepherd offers unending mercy to all who profess belief in God's single plan of redemption. Mercy is to understand that the wages of sin is death. I deserve death as a sinner.

Mercy's keys alone open Graces door. Jesus Christ stands at the door of your heart, will you request his unending mercy over your life? He is our eternal shepherd. His desire is always to show his unending mercy. Sheep need forgiveness when learning the living water of the word of God.

The mercy end of our Good Shepherd's staff is available to believers who sin 70 x 7 times. The Bible reveals God's mind in his shepherd's staff. His mind is his mercy. He ever lives to offer unending mercy

to all who have the humility to ask for it every day.

Mercy is the result of being born again. Unless a believer has the humility and courage to request mercy daily, you can not see the coming kingdom of God.

The 2nd end of the Lahmed is the ruah ha khodesh in Hebrew. It is grace revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. The spirit is given as a comforter and instructor in unwavering grace. It is the free gift of restoration, given to all those who request unending mercy from Messiah each day.

Mercy alone will lead to the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

Grace is described in the pointed end of our good shepherd's staff. The pointed end leads us to the narrow path leading to our sanctification and eventual glorification in Christ coming 1000-year kingdom in Jerusalem. If one is truly born again, the coming kingdom becomes discernible in scripture.

God gave us an incredible testimony of his entire plan of redemption outlined in the 22 characters of the Hebrew Aleph-Bet written in eternity past for our edification. Each letter was placed there by the trinity to teach us eternal truths about the true character of the living God we claim to believe in.

Religion has monetized the message of outward piety. Mercy seems devoid in those claiming faith In Jesus Christ. We are without excuse. The Gospel message is found in every letter of the Bible and encoded into the Old Testament.

We have gone through the first 12 letters and not one time has God mentioned judgement. Only unending mercy leading to the unwavering grace of the man Jesus Christ. There is a man seated on God's throne in heaven as I pen these words.

The English word for shepherd is pastor. Make sure your pastor offers mercy without judgement to all they encounter. Make sure you have not harnessed yourself to a wolf pretending to lead God's sheep.

Our world is crying out for a Messiah. Success in shepherding is found when we become Christ-like. His offer of unending mercy leading to unwavering grace, is the only true ministry calling. All else is man's thinking about God. The Bible outlines God's thinking about man.

## Matthew Chapter 27 Part 2 of 3

(Matthew 27:32-44) The crucifixion: As they left the court environment for an execution location outside the gate (Jn.19:17, 20; Heb. 13:12), the death party encountered a man of Cyrene whose name was Simon. This gentleman was "compelled" to accompany the group, bearing the cross "after Jesus" (Lk. 23:26). This would seem to suggest that, in his frail condition, the Lord weakened under the weight of the cross and required assistance to complete the journey (Jn. 19:17). Moreover, the manner in

which Mark mentions that Simon was the father of Alexander and Rufus (15:21) could suggest that this family was later converted to the gospel (Rom. 16:13), and Mark knew their names would be familiar to his reader.

Following the procession was a great crowd, accompanied by women who buffeted their bodies and sang a funeral dirge (Lk. 23:27). Ever the Teacher to the very last, Jesus pled that they not weep for him, but for themselves and their offspring, in view of the coming days (forty years later) when the Roman armies would invade and destroy this holy city and the Hebrews would pray for the mountains to fall on them and cover them up (Lk. 23:30). Luke adds this proverb: "If they do these things in a green tree, what shall be done in the dry?" (v.31). The meaning seems to be: "(If the Jews will so mercilessly murder me, the innocent Son of God, what will be the nature of God's punishment upon this wicked nation?" Luke also mentions that two criminals were led along for their executions at the same time.

Finally, they arrived at Golgotha, a Hebrew term meaning "the place of the skull" (Jn. 19:17). They gave Christ some wine mingled with gall, or myrrh (v. 34; Mk. 15:23), the narcotic design of which was to deaden the pain immediately, and possibly even prolong the suffering. After tasting, the Lord refused to drink it. He was paying the price of sin for the whole world (at least potentially), and he refused to mollify that. This nullifies the bizarre theory that Jesus and his disciples conceived a plot whereby he would retrieve his body, revive him, and he would triumphantly announce his resurrection. Such a theory also assumes that experienced Roman soldiers would be unable to distinguish an unconscious person from a corpse! Rationalists are a reckless lot.

There they crucified him. The Romans were most noted for the practice. In 71 B.C., following a slave revolt in Rome, six thousand recaptured slaves were crucified on the Appian Way leading to the city.

The prospective crucifixion victim, as a rule, was first subjected to flagellation, a beating with a three-thong whip (fashioned of plaited leather and studded with bone and metal). The victim was stripped naked and then was secured with leather ties. He was then beaten from his upper back to the lower extremities of his legs. The flesh was flayed from the muscle. Eventually, muscle could be shredded from the bone. The bones of the back including the spinal column, might well be exposed in a bloody mass. Not infrequently, these whippings were fatal.

The shape of the cross is a matter of some controversy. Some scholars believe that the victim was forced to carry only the upper crossbar (which weighed about 125 pounds) to the place of torture. At the death site, the upright post might have been secured in the ground already, awaiting the attachment of the crossbar. The criminal would be made to lie upon the ground, with the crossbar under his upper back. The arms were then attached by nails. The nails almost certainly were driven through the wrists (Ezek. 23:42), since the palm tissue cannot bear the weight of the body. The Greek term rendered "hands" (Jn. 20:27) can also include wrists. The feet were nailed as well. In 1968, the first remains of a crucified man were discovered in Jerusalem. A seven-inch spike was wedged through a young

man's heels. The Romans were not always uniform in their methods of crucifixion. The actual cause of death was the loss of blood volume and the inability to breathe due to the extension of the body. The victim could survive for days. Jesus lived only six hours.

As Christ hung there, the four soldiers divided up his garments and cast lots for his tunic, just as the Old Testament prophesied (Psa. 22:18; Jn. 19:24-25). And they sat and watched him there (v. 36). The hour of the crucifixion was nine a.m. (Mk. 15:25). A placard was placed above his head with this inscription: "This is Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews" (v. 37; Mk. 15:26; Jn. 19:19), written in three languages---Hebrew, Latin, and Greek (Jn. 19:20). The Jewish authorities attempted to persuade Pilate to adjust the wording so that it stated this was only the claim of this imposter, but the governor refused (Jn. 19:21-22). Two robbers were crucified at the same time---one on either side of God's Son (Isa. 53:9).

Both had previously reviled him, but one recanted and declared Jesus to be an innocent victim. The penitent asked to be remembered when the Lord came in his kingdom. Jesus responded: "Today you will be with me in paradise" (Lk. 23:39-43). Though crucified victims often survived for days, both of them would die that day. Both would be together after death, implying both consciousness and recognition. They would be in paradise, a figure for a place of beauty and happiness.

Strange indeed, 3 dying men on crosses, but one of them cries out. Luke 23:42 "And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom." Was he suddenly remembering this kingdom teaching of Jesus? Matthew 4:17 "From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." John 4:1-2 "When therefore the Lord knew how the Pharisees had heard that Jesus made and baptized more disciples than John, (Though Jesus himself baptized not, but his disciples,)" or perhaps John the Baptizer? Matthew 3:1 "In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judaea," and Matthew 3:5-6 "Then went out to him Jerusalem, and all Judaea, and all the region round about Jordan, And were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins." Very late this thief comes to faith in this Jesus, that he will establish his kingdom, which he did on Pentecost day in Acts 2. Matthew 16:28 "Verily I say unto you, There be some standing here, which shall not taste of death, till they see the Son of man coming in his kingdom."

By-passers wagged their heads (Psa. 22:7) and blasphemed him, quoting the false court testimony regarding his destroying the temple and rebuilding it in three days. They taunted him: "If you are the Son of God come down from the cross" (v. 40). If he had, there would have been no hope for them---or us! Similarly, the chief priests and elders mocked him, chiding: "He save others; he cannot save himself." This is most significant; the phrase, "he saved others," is a tacit admission that his miracles delivered the afflicted from their infirmities. Testimony from an enemy is the most powerful of all! As their railing taunts continued, the two robbers on either side of him reproached him in the same fashion (v. 42-44).


