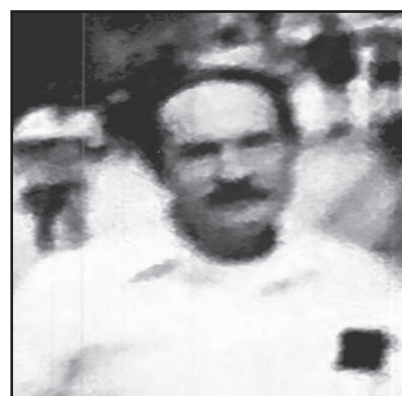

## Historically Speaking

### Mike Taylor Part Two

Benita Albert brings us more insight into the new Executive Director of the Oak Ridge Public Schools Education Foundation.

It's truly inspiring to see talented professionals return to their hometown. Mike Taylor, 1991 Oak Ridge High School alumnus, has come home to Oak Ridge to serve as the Executive Director of the Oak Ridge Public Schools Education Foundation (ORPSEF).

Cathy Toth, Chairperson of the ORPSEF Board, said, "Mike Taylor brings to the Foundation over 30 years of expertise with non-profits and, in particular, progressive school systems. He is strongly connected to the Oak Ridge community. We believe Mike's leadership will help build a stronger Foundation and enhance our success in continuing Oak Ridge School's legacy of excellence in education."

Mike serves in a unique and strategic dual capacity as an interim CEO of the National Association of Education Foundations (NAEF) and Executive Director of ORPSEF. This collaborative partnership between a leading national organization and a highly respected local foundation reflects a shared commitment to advancing the impact of education foundations, both in Oak Ridge and across the country.

In his national role with NAEF, the only membership organization dedicated exclusively to the education foundation sector, Mike leads efforts to connect, support, and elevate education foundations and their leaders. NAEF serves as the primary thought leader and convener for the industry, representing foundations that collectively impact more than 20 million students nationwide. Mike's work includes advancing best practices, leading professional development, consulting with foundations, and promoting a continuous improvement approach to address the challenges facing our nation's educational system.

A key focus of his leadership is building a unified voice for education foundations through national advocacy efforts. Mike champions the role of local education foundations in shaping equitable and innovative public education systems. He works to ensure policymakers, funders, and education leaders at every level recognize and invest in the transformational potential of these organizations.

Simultaneously, as Executive Director of ORPSEF, Mike applies his expertise to strengthen local public schools through philanthropic partnerships, student opportunity initiatives, and community engagement in Oak Ridge, the historic home of the Manhattan Project and a community with a rich legacy of educational innovation. This dual appointment creates a mutually beneficial relationship that enhances both organizations. It allows Mike to apply national insights to strengthen local impact, while also grounding national strategy in real-world, community-based work that ultimately benefits students, teachers, and education foundations at every level.

Mike's venture into education foundation work began with an effort to help provide additional monies for a new school, 6-12 grade levels, in Signal Mountain, TN. He said, "It became obvious that the Hamilton County Schools' budget fell short in adequately equipping the new school with the basic educational resources required for quality classroom instruction, such as science lab equipment, library books, computer labs, band instruments, and art enrichment opportunities."

Mike's wife Julie was a Signal Mountain native, and they were sending their young chil-

dren to the K-8 local schools she had attended. Julie and her schoolmates had to leave the community for high school, commuting to Red Bank High School. The new school, expanded through the twelfth grade, allowed their children to stay in the community.

A 3.5-million-dollar campaign was launched, with Mike successfully concluding the effort in the community. He assumed the role of the Executive Director of the Mountain Education Foundation, establishing it as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. Mike fondly remembers that time as the beginning of a refocused career move for him, an investment in not only his own children's growth and welfare, but also a much-needed public advocacy role for educational support and innovation.

Mike reported that the new school thrived, and the giving program continued, providing initial funding to support increased opportunities for students and a subsequent, increased enrollment of 20% over the next few years. He worked with Hamilton County administrators to ensure their program innovations were subsequently continued under county budgeting. Mike said, "The Foundation supported gaps in educational opportunities for students, such as expanding after-school enrichment, providing sports physicals, and coordinating volunteers to assist with after-hours transportation for the school district's 'No Child Left Behind' program."

Mike accepted a new challenge in the Henrico County School System in Virginia in 2014 after his six years of education foundation work in Chattanooga. Mike described his new job as a move to a more financially disadvantaged program with a rapidly expanding student population overflowing available school space. Mike said, "As CEO of the Henrico Education Foundation, I helped the school system launch a mixed delivery program enabling Henrico Schools to partner with private childcare centers and provide preschool programming for 3- and 4-year-old children in an alternate setting. We focused on improvement of results on third-grade reading proficiency, and we knew there was a correlation to providing early school readiness programs."

Mike continued, "We concentrated on what the community wanted, such as: ESL services, credit recovery, teacher grants, and more. The community supported us and funded more student opportunities." Mike was proud of the education his children received in the Henrico Schools. He added, "When my own children were impacted, it grew my heart and my investment in education. It's really all about the students."

Mike joined the Knox Education Foundation in Knoxville, TN, as their CEO in 2023. He described his work as furthering Knox County's programs, namely supporting the merger of Great Schools Partnership and Project GRAD Knoxville and focusing on student outcomes and advocacy. He served as the 2023-2025 Chairman of the Board of the National Association of Educational Foundations and helped bring the national

conference, impactED, to Knoxville in 2025.

At the same time as Mike was leading educational initiatives, he was pursuing his own higher education goals. Adding to his undergraduate degree in Business from UTK, he has recently earned a Master of Public Administration from Gardner-Webb University. Further professional credentials accomplished include: Certified Fundraising Executive and Certified Education Foundation Leader. Mike is a frequent conference speaker and advisor to education foundation leaders.

I asked Mike about his return to his hometown and his plans and dreams for ORPSEF's partnership with the Oak Ridge Schools.

"I never dreamed I'd be back. Oak Ridge is a unique and impactful school system. I am honored to support my alma mater. I know how much this community values education, and I credit the strong background I received in my K-12 education with my passion for supporting strong public schools. My older son has chosen education as a career and is currently teaching in Jefferson County. My two other children, a daughter and son, are in college in Tennessee. This is my home, the place where my education began, and now I want to return that by helping all students reach their fullest potential."

"An important role of an educational foundation is to support innovations, not supplant public monies; rather, serve as a research and development arm for our schools. The best way to solve problems and to innovate is through teachers. The ORPSEF teacher grants program and professional development fellowships provide teachers with the needed monies and encouragement in bringing new ideas to classroom teaching and learning. The Foundation, in its R&D mode, can collect the data and best results of each project and appeal to the school board for continued implementation and funding. This model develops new best practices, encourages creativity, and allows for new and different approaches."

ORPSEF's teacher grants program has awarded \$1.4 million over the past 16 years of the program. Awards have been given across all schools, grade levels, and academic disciplines. The new Benita Albert Innovative Educators Fellowships began awarding funds for unique professional development opportunities in the spring of 2025. All funds for the above programs are from public donations.

Mike also spoke of the exciting new changes coming to Oak Ridge in increased nuclear industry investments, the ongoing innovative programs of the Oak Ridge National Lab, and the growing school population. He praised the efforts in the Oak Ridge Schools to stay abreast of workforce needs, of emerging new Career and Technical programs, and of enrichment resources and programs throughout the schools. He realizes that the need is always bigger than school budgets, and he wants to be a part of solving needs. He comes to Oak Ridge with a strong background of accomplishments including raising more than \$43 million in previous education foundation work.

Mike looks forward to establishing close communications with the Oak Ridge community, and as such, he is eager to meet with and/or speak to civic clubs and other community organizations.

# Acts of the Apostle's Chapter 8

(Acts 8:1-3) persecution ignited: the bloody event of that day lit the fuse for a horrible persecution against the Lord's church. With the exception of the apostles, the saints fled throughout Judaea and even into Samaria. Stephen was buried by godly men. Saul went on a rampage of terror, dragging both men and women from their homes and thrusting them into prison. He was a ravenous wolf in the fold of the Lamb due to ignorance and unbelief (I Tim. 1:13).

(Acts 8:4-8) Philip's preaching in Samaria:

Saul's plan backfired. As he "scattered" the disciples they "went about preaching the word." The persecutor became a "missionary" before he became a missionary! Philip (one of the seven) went down to a prominent city in Samaria and proclaimed "the Christ," he argued that Jesus is the Messiah. Multitudes "gave heed," they obeyed gospel commands (Acts 2:38); "with one accord" suggests the unity of the plan. The people did not choose optional ideas about salvation such as what has happened in the last 200 years. There was power in Philip's message, for it was documented by certain miraculous signs which he performed, casting out demons, healing the lame, and etc. The city was overjoyed.

(Acts 8:9-13) the conversion of Simon the Sorcerer: Philip encountered a charlatan named Simon, who had a significant reputation as some "great" one. He had a sizable following, deceiving people with his "sorceries" (the word means magic) (v. 11). But the people were impressed with Philip's message and believed the "good tidings" (gospel) concerning the "kingdom of God" and the name of Christ; thus, they were immersed, both man and women (v. 12; Jn. 3:5; Mk. 16:16). And "Simon himself also believed: and being immersed, he continued with Philip" and was amazed at the miracles he observed. This shows that his tricks were not supernatural. It is an act of utter desperation to argue, as many Calvinists do, that Simon was never saved. Such flatly denies the sacred test.

(Acts 8:14-17) Peter and John dispatched to Samaria: when the apostles in Jerusalem heard of the conversion of the Samaritans, they sent Peter and John, who asked God that these new converts might receive supernatural gifts to employ in confirming the credibility of their evangelism (Mk. 16:20). Their prayer was answered and the miraculous gift of the Spirit was conferred by the laying on of their hands (the apostles).

(Acts 8:18-24) the conflict with Simon: when Simon saw that the apostles could confer spiritual gifts by the imposition of their hands, he wanted that power. (If modern charismatics could see what Simon saw, they would not labor under the illusion that they may receive gifts, tongues, independent of apostolic bestowal.) Simon thus attempted to bribe them to convey to him the same power. They could not have done so if they would, and would not have if they could! Peter took charge.

Peter's response sounds harsh to the modern mind, but it was a divine imprecation. "If you refuse to repent, may you receive the judgment you deserve!" Don't try to buy a man of God! First, Simon was not authorized to function as a provider of spiritual gifts. Second, his "heart" was not right with God, his motive was impure. The student has no idea how much time elapsed between Simon's conversion and this unhappy incident. It certainly does not indicate that Simon's initial actions were disingenuous. Peter encouraged the wayward brother to "repent and pray to the Lord" that he might be forgiven (for only Christians are instructed to pray and only they have an advocate in heaven, Christ. [1 John 2:1-2]) The fact that he was encouraged to "pray" reveals that Peter considered him to be a child of God. Simon petitioned Peter's prayers that judgment might not fall on him. There is no reason to assume that the apostle did not grant the request.

(Acts 8:25-40) the conversion of the Ethiopian: Peter and John headed back to Jerusalem but en route preached the gospel to many villages of the Samaritans. Those "fields white unto harvest" (Jn. 4:35), of which Jesus spoke, were being reaped. Around the same time, an angel of the Lord instructed Philip to journey southward (possibly some fifty miles) and intersect the road in a deserted area that leads from Jerusalem to Gaza (on the Mediterranean coast). At the most opportune time, his path crossed that of an official from Ethiopia, a eunuch, who had been to Jerusalem to worship.

The "treasurer" was riding in his chariot and reading from a Greek translation of the Isaiah scroll. (Luke does not hesitate to attribute chapter fifty-three to Isaiah, contrary to today's liberalist view.) It "just so happened" he was reading from 53:7 about the one who was led as a "sheep to the slaughter" and whose "judgment was taken away." Interestingly, he did not view this as a prophecy regarding the nation, as modern critics speculate. The Holy Spirit instructed Philip to go and join the man. The eunuch had been reading aloud (the common practice) and Philip thus concluded what was on the traveler's mind, so he asked: "Do you understand what you are reading?" (v. 30).

The treasurer acknowledged he needed help. Philip obliged. Starting with this very passage, he "preached unto him Jesus" (v. 35). He was not wresting a text from its context, as critics suggest, for Christ himself gave this section a messianic interpretation (Lk. 22:37). Isaiah's prophecy spoke of: (a) the Lord's submissive disposition (like a lamb); (b) his violent death; (c) his refusal to defend himself; (d) the humiliating treatment he was afforded and/or the humble way in which he dealt with the ordeal; (e) the "taking away" of his "judgment" of innocence by numerous illegal maneuvers; (f) the depiction of his "generation" as non-declarable (perhaps because so profuse) as a result of his resurrection and departure (ascension) from the earth.

Presently, they came to a "certain water" and the eunuch inquired about receiving immersion immediately---which implies Philip had taught him concerning both the urgent obligation and form of administration. They both went "down into the water," and Philip immersed the man. They then both "came up out of the water." The second expression might seem redundant were it not for the heresy that subsequently evolved, namely that immersion is not the exclusive mode of baptism. Philip was "caught away" by the Spirit to Azotus (Ashdod) thirty miles to the west, and the treasurer went on his way, rejoicing because of the salvation received. Philip evangelized his way up the coast to Caesarea.

The word of God produces faith in God and in the Christ. Hebrews 4:12-13 "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do." John 6:63 "It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are spirit, and they are life."

Acts 8:5 "Then Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them."

Acts 8:12 "But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women." [Philip was preaching the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ. This produces Christians.

The religious world of today has reverted back to the religion of Simon the magic working man of Acts 8:8-11. They hold revivals and with charming instrumental music and chanting of doctrines of men and handling of God's word deceitfully they manipulate unlearned souls to believe that their rhetoric will cause God to baptize those who comply to their emotionalism with Holy Spirit baptism. Those who get sucked into this foolishness will someday hear the Lord Jesus say: Matthew 7:21-23 "Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven; but he that doeth the will of my Father which is in heaven. Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity."

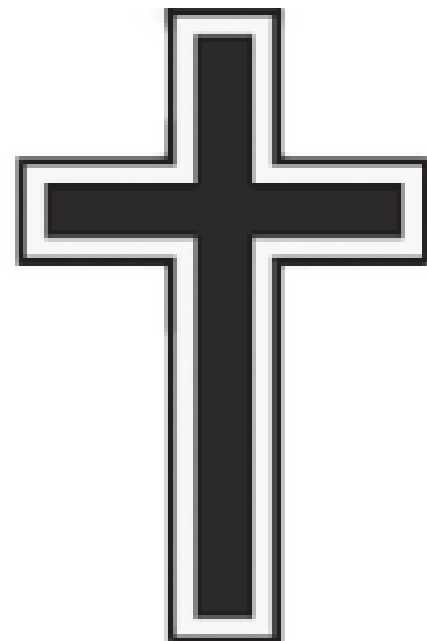
